Atcooga Presbyterian Church Dalton, Georgia. Brganized August 29, 1947.

The Atcooga Church has been without a pastor since August 1949, but regular services have been held by supply ministers, laymen from the First Presbyterian Church and Dr. Dendy, pastor of the First Church. This church has 68 members, 4 elders, 4 deacons, 6 Sunday school classes, 2 Young People's societies and "Women of the Church". Two evangelistic services have been held this year, totaling three weeks. A Vacation Bible School was conducted with an enrollment of 121 and young people have been sent to three conferences. The Men's Club held supper meetings while they had a pastor. With gifts from the First Church a debt of \$1800 was paid and the church is now free from debt. At a congregational meeting March 12th a budget of \$2500 was adopted and an every member convass made. A committee was appointed to sell the manse and other arrangements will be made when a new pastor comes.

THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH.

The twenty-three members of the Women of the Church have as far as possible followed the program as prescribed for this organization: the Bible study of John, the book for the general meetings, the Mission study books, reading the church papers, with gifts to the causes and with boxes to Thornwell and to White Cross.

The <u>outstanding work</u> of the women has been their encouragement and help to the large group of young people in this church. Two-thirds of the membership are young people. The women have served refreshments to the P. Y. F., to their parties, every day to the Daily Vacation Bible School and also suppers to the Men's Club.

The women have acted as adult advisers to the young people's societies, have directed the Christmas pageant and Rally Day, taught in Sunday school and Vacation School and directed choir practice every Wednesday night.

The few women in this group have grown spiritually as shown in increased tithing, Bible study and in faithful attendance on church services. They are "few in number but strong in spirit." At the March meeting an advance step was taken in making a budget and in pledging for the first time. All are praying for a pastor.

Atcooga Presbyterian Church

Atcooga Presbyterian Church was organized August 29, 1947, by the Presbytery of Cherokee, with 32 members. Mr. John Holt and Mr. F. H. Howard were elected Elders and Mr. Earle Cohen was elected Deacon. Rev. J. Clyde Plexico, Jr. was elected the Pastor. It was the hope of the building committee to start construction of the new Church building the first of September, but due to the lack of building materials we have not yet erected the building. Contractors have examined the final plans and will submit bids in the next few days. It is hoped that the construction will start around the first of January.

Final plans call for a building with five Sunday School rooms, furnace room, two rest rooms, and sanctuary. It will be located on U.S. Route 41, in South Dalton.

Since organization the membership has increased to 46 members and Mr. John Lord has been elected and installed Deacon. The Sunday School and Church worship services have increased in attendance and interest.

A Christmas play was presented December 21st and the Christmas Party for the Church and Sunday School were held December 22nd.

The Church has a prospective membership list of 400 and believes that as soon as the building is completed many of these people will unite with the Church.

Delton, Georgia 1947 - 1948

As a result of chapel work carried on for years in the school building of the American Thread Company of Georgia by the Dalton First Church, a new church was organized on August 29, 1947 and named the "Atcoogs Presbyterian Church", taking its name from the mill.

A committee from Cherokee Presbytery with the pastor of the First Church, Reverend S.W. Dendy, and four elders, Messrs. H.L. Smith, Will Denton, Walter Jones, and Ogburn Alley, formally organized the new church, and called Reverend Clyde Plexico, Jr. as pastor. and elected Mr. John Holt and Mr. F.A. Howard elders, Mr. Earl Cohen and Mr. John Lord, deacons, and they now have fifty-two members, thirty-five having joined this year with Mr. Plexico, pastor.

Contributions from members of the First Church, interested people in Dalton, and gifts from Presbyteries' Home Mission Committee amount to more than \$16,000.00, and construction of a church building has begun in a lot facing Highway 41 contributed by the mill.

A Woman's Auxiliary was organized September 29, and already the small membership has begun contributing to the causes of the church and to special calls.

Though only six months old, the church gave \$25.00 to Home Missions, \$50.00 to Presbyterian College, contributions to the Joy Gift, a generous check to the pastor, and has now adopted a budget and made pledges for the coming year. "The Presbyterian Program of Progress" has been adopted with its committees, and \$100.00 has been contributed for foreign missions.

A Sunday School with six classes and a very enthusiastic "Youth Fellowship" Group are eagerly waiting for the better equipment of the new church building which will be completed in a few months.

As you know, our Church Year begins Sunday, April 1, 1949, and continues through March 31, 1950. In order that our Church can make the most beneficial progress I want to acquaint you with the Church Budget, the Every Member Canvas, and a Congregational Meeting. I an enclosing a copy of the budget for 1949-50, which has been worked out by your Diaconate and approved by your Session. You will note that this budget is an increase of \$1,000.00 over last year, but our membership is almost double what it was when the 1948-49 budget was adorsed. Last year the budget called for \$2,525.00 and we actually raised around \$5,000.00! This year the total budget will be \$3,680.61, but your Diaconate is confident that we can reach this amount, and more. The purpose of a budget for the church is that every member can know what we are spending the money for and in order that we might have a goal to strive for in our work. Every type of business is run on a budget and the church is the greatest business in the world. In order that we can set our sights toward the completion of this budget, we have the Every Member Canvas. The purpose of this is that each member of the Church can have an opportunity to pledge a certain amount toward the expenses of the local church, as well as benevolences. I am enclosing a pledge card, asking that you consider now your pledge for the new year and on Sunday, March 6, in the Congregational Meeting, to give this card to our Deacons. You may ask, why make a pledge? One reason is that if we all make pledges, then our Diaconate can know about what the Church will be capable of raising during the year. The pledge is a yard-stick for the financial obligations of the church. The purpose of the Congregational Meeting, March 6, will be to adopt the Church Budget for 1949-50.

THE ATCOOGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The Atcooga church is the outgrowth of chapel services held for six years in the schoolhouse of The American Thread Co. It was organized into a church on August 29, 1947 with thirty-two charter members and Rev.J.Clyde Plexico as pastor. Today, after one and a half years, the church has 83 members, 4 elders and 4 deacons. Twenty-six new members were added this year and there were two infant baptisms.

Following are some of the activities this past year: Seven departments in the Sunday school.

A teachers' conference each month.

The Sunday school superintendent sent to Montreat last summer.

Revival services held during the summer by Rev. Clyde Plexico, Sr.

A men's club has held regular supper monthly meetings.
The church adopted the Presbyterian Program of Progress.
A manse was bought to be paid for on installments.
The church sponsors a troup of Boy Scouts and also
Brownies.

Hand some church furniture has been installed. Concrete walks and shrubs add to the grounds, this

latter work being done by the men of the church.
The Atcoga church has been active in support of the
newly established Youth Mission on East Morris

Street. The superintendent of that Mission, a Baptist minister, has with his family united with Atcooga church.

A fine movie projector has brought Bible and Missionary pictures to our young people frequently.

The elders attend all meetings of Presbytery and held monthly conferences at the church.

The most outstanding work of the Atcooga church has been that done by the pastor with out large group of young people in Bible study and in choir singing. More than thirty-five young people are being trained for service by him.



7264 3 THE WOMEN OF ATCOOGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. When the new church building was completed last May, the women of the church, with joy, got busy! And the outstanding work this year has been for their own church. They gave a refrigerator, stove, china, cooking utensils and silver, for the kitchen. Curtains for class rooms, a baptismal bowl and collection plates and have made sixteen choir robes, costing \$40. They have served supper once a month to the Men's Club; also to the Cherokee Young Peoples' Rally and many times to our Youth Fellowship group. When each member was given \$5 to invest as a "talent", our women baked and sewed, sold candy and cards, and from the \$150 given out \$600 was returned an "Talent Night." A very elaborate "Harvest Festival" was put on by them at the school house and numbers of suppers which brought in money. So that, with the help of the whole church, \$11,000 was paid on the new church pews which are seen on the outside cover of this history. We still have a debt on them to work for. The women have met twice each month, using the guide book "Fitly Framed Together" and the Survey for circle programs and "The Christian Home" at Auxiliary. They have observed Home and Foreign Mission weeks and helped put on Rally Day program and an elaborate pageant for the Joy Gift at Christmas. and a Christmas tree and social during Christmas week. A "Family Night" supper was given with fifty in attendance. The social life of the new church has helped greatly in creating goodwill, friendliness and interest among its members. Several sunstantial pantry showers and a baby shower were given our pastor and his wife, who are greatly loved by the membership of the church. Our women were the teachers in the Vacation Bible School with an enrollment of 95. They served on the committee of the Presbyterian Program of Progress and sent a large box of clothing to Europe. We are members of the Historical Foundation at Montreat and the Dalton Council of Church Women. Our membership has increased this year from 11 to 22 and our gifts from \$71 to \$128, which does not cinclude all the money spent on the local church. The book of Exodus was taught by the pastor at prayermeeting and during the fall, and Revelation after Christmas. These classes were attended by numbers of women and by large groups of young people.

April 1-8, 1951, a week of revival services were conducted by Rev. Mr. James Merrin, of Rockmart, Ga., with 4 additions to the church. He also taught the book of James. During the two years of being without a pastor the members of Atcooga became discouraged after several calls had been declined, but all the time they were praying that God would send to Atcooga the right man to lead them. These prayers were answered, in the acceptance of Rev. Mr. Henry L. Sneed, a man of rich experience, a forceful preacher and a true evangelist. A new manse was bought across from the church - 3 Crescent Street. On May 2d a family night supper was given to selcome Mr. and Mrs. Sneed and his first service as pastor was on May 13.

He is our first full-time pastor and already the church has taken on new life.

The new manse was opened for an "At Home" arranged by the Sneeds, and many members and friends of the Church called during the afternoon and evening.

The church now has two preaching services, prayer-meeting and choir practice each week. The Sunday-school has been reorganized and teachers' meetings are held twice a month, and the PYF is very alive. Mr. and Mrs. Sneed are visiting in the village and his fine, helpful sermons are drawing back many members who had dropped out during the absence of a pastor.

The outstanding event of the year, and an occasion of great happiness was the dedication of the church.

Atcooga Church, south of Dalton, was formally dedicated on August 26. The church, organized on August 29, 1947, is now free of debt and a special dedicatory service was arranged, including corner-stone-laying ceremonies. Rev. Clyde Plexico, Jr., of Seneca, S. C., first pastor of the church, was special guest and principal speaker. Rev. Henry L. Sneed, pastor, presided. Dr. S. Wilkes Dendy, pastor of the First Church, who was founder of the Atcooga church, gave the history of the new church. Rev. Jim Merrin, of Rockmart, Ga., superintendent of home missions for the Presbytery of Cherokee, brought greetings from the home mission committee. Articles placed in the cornerstone were by Mr. Sneed. Dennis Ketchum, Sunday-school superintendent, placed the articles in a container and put them in the stone. Mrs. Lee McWilliams, church historian, had prepared the history of the church and copies were available at the services. Following these exercises, which were attended by the officers of the First Church and many friends, and by members of the Atcooga church who stood during the roll-call. Members and visiting guests were entertained at the manse at a picnic supper by the Women of the Church. This was a happy occasion in the life of this church of sixty members.

Writing the history of Atcooga Church was my main work for the year, from accounts of her twelve years of existence, found in old church bulletins.

HISTORY OF ATCOOGA CHURCH, DALTON, GA. 1951-52 (continued) In as small a church as Atcooga, the Women of the Church take a leading part in all of the work. They taught and served refreshments every day in the two weeks! Vacation Bible School, June 3-17. Miss Lillian Medlin, extension worker for the Synod of Georgia was in charge and 103 were enrolled. Some of the high-lights of the fall and winter months are as follows: The Women of the Church helped in all. Rally Day, attending Presbyterian and Group Conference, reading study books and church papers, programs and offering for Church Extension, Joy Gift, World Missions, with a visit from Rev. Lachland Vass, of Luebo, Africa. Boxes of clothing were sent to Korea, Africa, Quitman Home, Sarah Murphy Home, and White Cross quota given. Twenty-three childrens' dresses were sent to Luebo hospital. Supper served to many groups, young people and family nights. Three receptions given by the Sneeds. Assembly's Youth Night, College Night and Thornwell programs were given by our young people and a picture showing "The Call". Our young people and others are very active, and with our fine pastor and his wife we look forward to a better year at the Atcooga Church.

This group has met regularly in homes of members, using literature

prepared for the W.O.C., has observed all spiritual emphases and, as is always the case in a small church, has assumed responsibility of taking the young people to group conferences, entertaining them in their own church, and of teaching and serving refreshments at Vacation Bible School.

Mrs. Howze, our pastor's wife, teaches the senior young people in Sundayschool; holds choir practice and youth fellowship meetings and has also taught the Bible Study in all circle meetings.

Later, in her High School days, whenever she would mention the fact that she wanted to be a Missionary her friends thought that she was a "prude". So Ann decided she would say she wanted to be a D.R.E. (now a D.C.E.). In spite of the ridicule of her friends she continued to spend most of her time going to church meetings.

Ann finished High School in Dalton, Georgia, and began working at Montreat, North Carolina, where she entered college in the fall. There she became a member of the College Chorus, Secretary of the Athletic Board. In her senior year, she became President of the Student Christian Association.

During her summers she worked first as a waitresss in the dining hall of the Assembly Inn at Montreat, then as Vacation Church School worker in Cherokee Presbytery, then next summer she served as Assistant to Montreat College Registrar, and finally as D.C.E. at First Presbyterian Church, Seneca, S.C.

After graduation she served as D.C.E.for two and a half years at First Presbyterian Church, Cartersville, Georgia. Ann then went to graduate school in Richmond, Virginia, Presbyterian School of Ghristian Education.

In her junior year she was one of three representatives on Student Council. In her senior year she was President of the Student Body,

In her first year of graduate school, altho she still had not given up the idea of being a Missionary, she began to look back on her life and to ask the question: I have been wanting to be a Missionary so long, is this just my plan of what I want to be, or is God really calling me into this field of service?

There were many times when the thought of being a Mission-

There were many times when the thought of being a Missionary grew dim, but through much struggle and only by the guidance and strength received through prayer—only by God's grace did this dimness grow into a radiant light.

Application was made to the Mission Board. Then came the biggest blow of all; "Wait a year."

"Wait? I've done nothing but wait for fifteen years."

Soon, however, Ann began to accept this as part of her testing and came to realize that "waiting time for God is not wasting time."

Meanwhile Ann spent a summer as Vacation Church School Worker in Canoe, Kentucky, with the Home Missionary, Mrs. Patsy Turner.

At present Ann is serving as Director of Youth Work at First Presbyterian Church, Huntington, West Virginia.

Future? Ann has been accepted by the Board of World Missions, Presbyterian Church in the United States, and, God willing, will be commissioned August 3,1960 in Montreat, and will become an Evangelistic Missionary to Taiwan, with emphasis on Youth Work.

Ann writes: "My heart is running over with joy as I look back to that little Sunday School class of junior girls, and to that dear lady who has been so willing to let God use her in her teaching and in her life to spread His love to others. This gracious 'saint' is still living today, and is still my spiritual backbone as she continues to give me her love and encouragement in my work for Him. I feel that it was

God speaking through her and through the life of Paul to me, "Go, because I am to send you out and far away among the heathen."
Both the First Presbyterian Church and the Atcooga Church in Dalton rejoice that the seeds sown by them are bringing such an abundant harvest

God grant that others from our churches may be led to say: "Here am I. Send me!"

HISTORY OF ATCOOGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Dalton, Georgia 1960

The Atcooga Presbyterian Church, Dalton, has held regular services during this year and has observed all the special causes of the church, making contributions to them and also to the budget of the church.

The Women of the Church used the literature prepared and sent to them, for their meetings and observed World Mission Week. Read Mission Books and letters and entertained the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. James Montgomery, retired missionaries from Taiwan. These missionaries spoke at a service.

The WOC held vacation Bible school which had an average daily attendance of sixty. Our women taught classes and served refreshments.

Our young people attended camps. Our pastor, the Rev. T. M. Howze and Mrs. Howze taught at several of these camps.

The church held a Sunday-night study course on the book of Genesis, for about ten weeks.

The high point of this year for Atcooga Church was on August 3rd, when at Montreat one of her young women, Miss Ann Broom, was commissioned a missionary to serve in Taiwan. This has been the greatest blessing possible to a small church.

September 7,1960

Hi Everyone!

What an exciting trip I am having! We are now sailing down and through the Inland Sea between the main Island of Japan and the two smaller islands of Shikoku and Kushu. So far, I have visited Yokohama, Tokyo--which was just fabulous-- Kobe and Osaka. The next stop will be Moji on the island of Kyushu. One other stop at a smaller port in Japan and then we sail for Korea- Pusan and Inchon Harbor, where I hope to see my sister Jeannette and her family. The I am quite anxious to get to the beautiful island of Taiwan, I am very happy to have this wonderful opportunity of seeing so much of the Orient. Right now, we can see land on both sides of the ship and believe me, it is perfectly beautiful!

Let me tell you about a wonderful experience I had in Kobe As you know, this is one of our mission stations in Japan. One of my friends; Katherine Womeldorf, who is a missionary can the island of Shikoku, came to Kobe to meet the ship. After visiting with Mr. and Mrs. McLauchlin in the morning, Katherine, another friend, Barbara Yonteck, and I went to a Japanese restaurant for supper. Yes, we took off our shoes and sat on the floor and ate with chopsticks! After supper we went shopping- I can't say window shopping because these little stores did not have windows- but really that is what we did. It was so interesting and exciting just walking up and down the little streets and the big streets watching the people and looking at all the beautiful things. It sure was a help to have someone with me who could speak Japanese! For those of you who like to sew- you should see the wool and silk material here- just scrumptious (not in the dictionary probably) ! Well, after sitting on my legs all during supper and walking all that time, I was beginning to fold up, so we headed toward home. Home for the night was at Barbara's which is the upperpart in a Japanese home. Barbara lives with two Japanese ladies and lives completely Japanese style. I have heard of finding beauty in simplicity-well, this is it! This was all quite an experience for me-especially the bath in Japanese style. You can ask someone about this - probably Mr. Fitts. Barbara and Katherine really enjoyed watching me do everything, and I always forgot to remove my shoes. It was a little strange eating waffles from beautiful china, lovely silver, and sitting on the floor in an almost completely empty room. Oh yes, and we slept on the straw mat floor with very thin cottonpads. Really, it was quite comfortable! We had such a wonderful visit and I was so glad to have time for this experience.

I forgot to tell you about one exciting thing, and that is shopping (window again) in Toky... Believe me, we think New York is something-you should come to Tokyo. Really, I could hardly believe I was in Japan. The department stores are just fabulous!

However, within all these beautiful and exciting structures, one is never able to forget the strong impact of Buddhism and Communism in this country. We saw a communist high school in Kobe that is larger and more beautiful and more modern in its structure than any I have ever seen anywhere. Then, too, the lady with whom Barbara lives is a devout Buddhist though a lovely and lovable lady. She has had three of our missionaries to live w ith her over the years but is still a Buddhist. This is a task that only prayer and the work of the Holy Spirit can do. Wont you join us in our grayers for her?

It was a real joy to me to have some of you at my commissioning service thank you so much for coming.

In just another eight days I will arrive in Taiwan, an island smaller than the state of Georgia with a population of 11,000,600 people, most of whom are without Christ! I ask that you will pray that I will be able, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to love these people as Christ loves them, that they, too, might accept Him as their personal Saviour! Also, I ask that you pray for me that I will have the self-discipline which I lack and which I so greatly need for my language study! All this can only be done by the work of the Spirit, so my real request is that you pray that I might be willing for the Holy Spirit to work in me, through me, and in spite of me. I know that you will do this because I have felt your prayers all through my life as I have been so richly blessed!

May "the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship Of the Holy Spirit be with you all".(11 Cor. 13:14) Isn't it wonderful that we have the fellowship of the Holy Spirit who is not limited by distance?
