# Bethel Presbyterian Church

We, whose names are here unto subscribed, humbly, yet earnestly petition the Presbytery of Cherokee (to meet at Pleasant Green church on the 9th of September, 1846) to organize a church in that part of Chattooga County east of Taylor's Ridge to be known by the name of Bethel church.

Our reasons for this request are the following:

In the first place, we live at such a great distance from Pleasant Green church (of which we are now members) that we are not able to attend the means of grace instituted by Christ, without great labor at the place where our names are registered.

In the second place, Pleasant Green will not suffer any loss by a new church being organized, as we do not wish to employ another minister of the gospel, but to continue our support to that member of your presbytery, now the stated supply of Pleasant Green church.

In the third place, we live in a valley that is destined soon to contain a large population and we wish to erect the Standard of Presbyterianism, that other denominations of Christians in our midst may know and love us, as a branch of the Church of Christ; and that individuals now living among us, who have no Savior may find the Messiah, which being interpreted is the Christ; and that Presbyterians in other parts of our common country who are in quest of a home may be induced to cast in their lot among us.

In the fourth place, although we are few in number, we are as many in multitude as many of the churches under your care and we hope one day, by the blessings of the Lord on His word and ordinances to see Jacob.

The above named petition was presented to the Presbytery at its meeting at Pleasant Green church at the time above written, and the prayer of the petitioners was granted.

The Rev. John M. M. Caldwell and Andrew Y. Lockridge were appointed a Committee of Presbytery to hold a meeting in that part of Chattooga County, east of Taylor's Ridge, to commence on the 24th of October, 1846, and, if the way be opened to organize a church.

The above named committee was held at the time appointed by Presbytery. A sermon was preached by the Rev. A. Y. Lockridge from Psalm 20:5, "We will rejoice in thy salvation and in the name of our God we will set up our banners."

A vote was taken, by ballot, for two individuals to be Elders in the church about to be organized and two individuals to be Deacons in said church. When the votes were all counted, it was found that Andrew Couey and James M. Scott were elected elders and Jackson O. Scott and Thomas Kendrick were

elected Deacons.

On the 27th day of December, 1846, after assuitable sermon on the office, the duties, and qualifications of ruling elders, by A. Y. Lockridge, the above named individuals were ordained officers in the Church of Bethel by prayer in accordance with the Confession of Faith of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.

Approved this far by order of Presbytery in session at Sardis, April 21, 1846.

The foregoing account of the organization of Bethel church was taken from Bethel's first Session book, dating from 1846 to April, 1874.

(During this time, there were one hundred seventy (170) people united with this church.)

This book was kept with great care and very minutely recorded, all dates and details accurately.

The first pastor, A. Y. Lockridge, acted as Clerk of the Session until May, 1848. This office was then held by J. M. Scott from 1848 until 1851, and from June 8, 1851 until October, 1854, the record was kept by the pastor, Rev. T. C. Crawford. W. L. Groves was then appointed Clerk of the Session and took up that work December 24, 1854, and served until his death in the spring of 1873. J. O. Scott was appointed temporary Clerk of the Session while Major Groves was in the army during the Civil War.

W. S. Kendrick was then elected Clerk of the Session and served as such until he went away in the fall of 1873 to study medicine, at which time J. A. Jones was made temporary Clerk. J. A. Jones served until 1886 when the Clerk's duties were turned over to Mr. William J. Crawford, who kept the records faithfully and accurately for more than fifty years.

This first session book reveals a great many interesting things about how the work of the church was conducted. One very noticeable thing is that the church and church business was put first. The Session was often called to meet in the middle of the week to attend to some matter.

If a member did not attend church regularly or if one conducted himself in a manner not becoming a Christian, he was called up before the Session and tried. If he acknowledged his guilt and repented, he was continued as a member of the church; otherwise, he was dismissed.

At this time, there were new people moving in from other states and there was scarcely a meeting of the Session that there were not additions to the church.

The Rev. T. C. Crawford, who had lately moved to this valley from North Carolina, was elected pastor of Bethel Church in 1847.

"Four of the members of the church; viz., J. O. Scott, W. L. Groves, James Scott and Thomas Kendrick obligated themselves to see that Rev. T. C. Crawford receive one-hundred fifty dollars annually for his services."

At about this time, the Rev. Crawford was also called as pastor of Sardis Church in Floyd County and the two churches were very closely connected - one delegate to Presbytery representing both churches.

During the Civil Warg, when it was not safe for Mr. Crawford to go on horseback from his home near Bethel to Sardis, fifteen miles away, he would walk and go across the mountains.

Bethel Church was organized in a small building that stood in the forks of the road on the "Dr. Wright place." Mr. Crawford preached his first sermon there.

We have no record of when the church was built. There was a log building with a fireplace in one end, that was used for both church and school, that stood just east of where the church now stands.

The church building was erected before the Civil War but was not ceiled until 1869. It was remodeled in 1878 and painted in 1879. This work was done by a Mr. Sherman and his daughter, Miss Katherine.

The Rev. T. C. Crawford cut a sweet gum tree, had it sawed, and a gave the lumber for the pulpit.

The cloths for the communion table were made, by hand, by Mrs. Martha Kendrick, grandmother of the Rev. S. K. Dodson.

#### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

It was in the fall of 1935 that the Rev. E. R. Leyburn D. D. Of Rome agreed to serve Bethel as stated supply. This was a Blessed day for the people at Bethel when this able man of God and his good wife adopted them into their church family. Always when he comes to preach, visit or teach in the auxiliary his faithful wife is at his side until the fall of 1937 the doctors forbade because she was overtaxing her strength.

Dr. Leyburn held a series of meetings himself in the early fall of 1936, preaching only at night. His messages were heart searching and heard by appreciative audiences.

The next year he was assisted by the Rev. J. G. Kirckhoff of Calhoun. Mr. Kirckhoff had been with us before and received a warm welcome. He taught the book of Philippians at the morning hour and preached evangelistical sermons at night. There were two additions to the church: Mary Nell Woods and Jack Sydnor Scott, a grandson of Jackson O. Scott who was one of the first deacons of this church. Another grandson John D. Scott was ordained a deacon December 27, 1937, just ninety one years from the time J. O. Scott was ordained a deacon.

The fourth Sunday in October 1936 Dr. Leyburn held a short anniversary service this being the ninetieth anniversary of the organization of the church.

At a congregational meeting in the fall of 1936 it was agreed to do some much needed repair work on the church and add S. S. rooms. This work was never pushed but in the spring of 1937 a much needed roof was put on.

At the regular service the fourth Sunday in December 1936 there were two collection plates presented to the church. One given by A. A. Jones, Mrs. Mattie Wright and Mrs. Agnes Kendrick Jarvis in memory of their aunt, Miss Clarissa A. Kendrick and the other in memory of Mrs. B. F. Weesner given by her children and grandchildren, 25 of whom were present. The presentation was made by Miss Lula Weesner and accepted by Mr. W. J. Crawford who was a personal friend of those honored.

The elders, with exception of Mr. Story average more than 80 years of age and many years of faithful service.

The church had a revival meeting the last week in August and the preaching was done by the pastor. There were two additions to the church: Mrs. John D. Scott by letter from Druid Hills Presbyterian Church, Atlanta, and Virginia Woods by profession and baptism.

After serving faithfully for three and one half years Mr. Talbot gave up the work in January 1942. His resignation was accepted by the congregation the fourth Sunday afternoon in January at the close of a Communion service conducted by the Rev. W. W.Glass, pastor of the Summerville church. Mr. Glass agreed to take the work until other arrangements could be made-preaching each fourth Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Talbot 's brother the Rev. George Bird Talbot, a returned missionary from China came to us for two services the fourth Sunday in February. His messages were very touching and inspirational.

The Church School or Sunday School began the year without a regular superintendent, but the work was carried on without interruption, sometimes by the women of the church until the first of August, when our hearts were made glad by the return of Prof. and Mrs. Jack Hyatt to our community.

R.F.D.#1 Mr. Hyatt had been made superintendent of the Sunday School when he had lived in the community two years ago, and just took up the work again when he came back as principal of the Gore Consolidated School. Social Service- - Miss Margaret Weesner All of Summerville, Georgia, R.F.D. 1 Bethel Auxiliary has only one circle of thirteen members known as the "Nancy Leyburn Circle" which meets once each month on Friday afternoon before the second Sundayin the homes of the members. Occasionally we have all day meetings for a season of Prayer and Self Denial or to review a mission study book. We had a very extensive study of the book of Peter conducted by Mrs. H. T. Agnew.

We used two mission study books: "Why Stand Ye Idle" and "Foundations of World Order". The former was reviewed by Mrs. Agnew at her home in November, and the later by Mrs. J. C. Crawford at her home in February. Special collections were taken each time for Home and Foreign Missions respectively.

The third Sunday in August 1941 we invited Dr. and Mrs. J. K. Levie to speak at the church. The fact that they had worked in Korea with Mary Bodson who is a daughter and grand-daughter of Bethel Church added interest. Her grandmother, Mrs. Martha Kendrick, was a charter member of the first Womans Organization of our church. Her parents were also members of Bethel Church.

The president, Miss Mary Sue Scott attended Presbyterial at Menlo and Mrs. H. T. Agnew went to the Group Conference.

At the Birthday Party in May we welcomed Mrs. John D. Scott who had recently come to our community a bride. She was formerly Miss Ruby Blair of Druid Hills Presbyterian Church, Atlanta.

Another new member, Mrs. J. H. Hyatt came into the community as a public school teacher and joined the Auxiliary in November.

With the closing of the year we lost one of our oldest and most faithful members, Mrs. T. B. Cummings who fell asleep March 22, 1942 to awake in that Land Eternal.

We closed the year with an enrollment of thirteen which did not prove to be an unlucky number since we had increased our contributions to all benevolent causes and made progress along other lines.

Miss Mary Sue Scott has served as president four successive years. Not because she chose to but because there was no one else available and because "Where duty calls, 'tis honor to obey."

(In the meantime she cared for a home and an invalid mother, and taught a class in Sunday School. All of this was done faithfully and efficiently, without complaint.)

The auxiliary is deeply grateful to her for her long, faithful and efficient service.

At the close of the year we changed most of the officers and elected Mrs. J. H. Hyatt, president.

The Rev. W. W. Glass of Summerville served the church as supply-preaching the fourth Sunday afternoon in each month until he moved to Decatur Alabama the last week in December.

The Rev. Elmer Enlow of Menlo then took up the workpreaching each third Sunday afternoon. Mr. Enlow is now serving six congregations.

Mr. Glass conducted a series of revival services at Bethel. Preaching each night during the last week in august. There were no additions to the church.

A quartet of young ladies from Shorter College, who were guests of the Storeys furnished beautiful music for the service the fourth Sunday in May. Ruling Elder Samuel E. Jones attended this service and seemed to enjoy it to the fullest. He was very feeble then and this was the last service he attended in the historic old church that was so dear to his heart and that he loved so much to talk about.

Mr. Jones passed to his eternal reward September 15, 1942. His wife Tecoa Crawford, daughter of the beloved Rev. T. C. Crawford having preceded him a little more than a year.

Another elder, Thomas B. Cummings passed away March 12 1943--less than a year after his wife's death.

We had as guest speaker in November the Rev. Sohn Cunningham, a blind minister of Virginia.

This little church has felt the weight of the war as has every other church in the nation. Six very dear to us have answered the call of the colors: Tommy Christian, Henry Everett, J.D. Weesner Jr., Oliver W. Scott, Jack S. Scott and Harold Storey.

The Rev. Elmer Enlow of Menlo served the church as supply pastor until June of 1943 when he turned the work over to the Rev. Harry Foster who had just moved to Summerville and taken up the work there. Mr. Enlow had already applied for a chaplaincy in the Army and was accepted soon after. The people at Bethel were sorry to give him up, but were fortunate to have Mr. Foster take up the work in July and carry on without a break.

Mr. Foster is employed for his full time by the Summerville church but has unselfishly given up his rest each fourth Sunday afternoon to come to Bethel to preach and is always accompanied by his loyal wife.

There were no revival services held this year. A Mr. Crumpton joined the church, by letter, from Maryville, Tennessee, First Church.

Mr. Hyatt also left us in June to go into training in the U. S.

Navy. The Sunday School was loathe to give him up but bade him Godspeed and gave him a handbag as a mark of appreciation of his faithful
service as superintendent.

The Sunday School was carried on without a superintendent until the session appointed E. P. Scott to take up the work in January, 1944.

The Rev. Harry Foster, pastor of the Summerville church continues to serve Bethel as supply, holding one service each month on fourth Sunday afternoons.

There were no evangelistic services held this year, but two additions to the church: Mrs. John Jones by letter and Sybil Christian by public profession.

The oldest member of the church was Mr. James E. Crawford, who died November 3 at the age of 89 years and 8 months. His death came soon after the death of Mrs. J. C. Crawford and Mrs. Emma Crawford Vann, a former member who lived in another state. "Mr. Jim" and "Miss Emma" were children of The Rev. T. C. Crawford who was pastor of the church 38 years. The Rev. Crawford reared a large family who have lived long and useful lives.

This year marked the one hundredth anniversary of the organization of Bethel church and was a very eventful year in its history.

The first church service of the year was Easter Sunday, April 21, 1946. At this service two babies were christened. Samuel Orr Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Jones and Joseph Henry Sanders, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Sanders. The former was a grandson of Samuel E. Jones and Tecoa Crawford Jones, and a great grandson of the Rev. T. C. Crawford who was the beloved pastor of this church for thirty-eight years. The latter was a great-grandson and a great-great grandson of the same.

In May it was our time to secure the speakers for the commencement services of Gore High School. For this we called on two of Bethel's own sons. Professor Paul King of Darlington School, Rome, made the Sunday School address and the Rev. S. K. Dodson of Menlo preached the baccalaureate sermon.

We quote from the minutes of Cherokee Presbytery:

"The Presbytery of Cherokee met on October 15, 1946, at 10:00 A.M. in Bethel church and joined that church in the celebration of its one hundredth anniversary.

"Rev. S. K. Dodson, a son of Bethel church, was elected moderator.

"Elder W. J. Crawford, Clerk of the Session of Bethel for the past sixty years and representative to Presbytery was introduced. Mr. Crawford who is almost 90 years of age bears the unusual distinction of being the son of the first pastor of Bethel, Rev. T. C. Crawford, and out of a remarkable memory gave interesting reminiscences covering 80 years of the church's life. "Elder T. H. Gore of Bethel welcomed the Presbytery in behalf of the congregation. Elder Walter Jones, of Dalton, whose forbears were members of Bethel, responded for Presbytery.

"Resolved that the Presbytery of Cherokee by rising vote express to the Stated Supply, Rev. H. K. Foster, the Session, the Deacons and members of Bethel Church, and to the women especially, its pleasure in the hospitality given to it at this fall meeting of 1946.

"And that Presbytery express its congratulations to the Bethel Church upon the event of the centennial of the church and its good wishes for the second century of witnessing for Christ."

The church had its Centennial Anniversary service the fourth Sunday, October 24, which was very near if not the exact date of its organization. All former members and friends of the church were invited to this service, and some drove a good distance to attend.

Prof. Paul King was again the speaker at the Sunday School hour and the Rev. S. K. Dodson preached the anniversary sermon.

The afternoon speakers were the Rev. James F. Merrin, Superintendent of Home Missions in Cherokee Presbytery, and Dr. Irvine S. Ingram, President of West Georgia College. Dr. Ingram is a grandson of Capt. Irvine who was also an educator, a member of Bethel church and a teacher in Bethel Academy and at his death he was laid to rest in Bethel cemetery.

We were blessed with "October's bright blue weather" for this occasion as well as that of Presbytery, and dinner was served each time on an outdoor table near the church.

There was an abundance of fall flowers and the church was decorated with gorgeous dahlias and chrysanthemums. One beautiful arrangement of white chrysanthemums was brought by Mrs. Agnes Kendrick Jarvis in memorial of her grandmother, Mrs. Martha Kendrick, and her aunt, Miss Clarissa Kendrick. Mrs. Kendrick was a charter member of the church and "Miss Clarissa" was a charter member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Sunday School had already contributed towards buying new hymn books that are not yet off the press, and a number of visitors left money to buy a hymn book or books that will be dedicated to the memory of deceased relatives who were former members of Bethel church.

E. P. Scott continues as superintendent and secretary of the Sunday School.

# Mr. Crawford, 91, Moves For First Time in Life

Ninety - one year old William Crawford moved this year for the first time in his life.

Mr. Crawford, who says he finds doing nothing "the hardest job" he ever had, left the old Crawford home place in Gore last January to reside in Summerville.

"He didn't want to move," confides winsome Mrs. Crawford "because he wanted to die on the place just as his father did. But we just had to get closer in and our nephews, John Jones and Crawford Bailey, have just been wonderful taking care of us here."

Mr. Crawford was a member of a family of seven boys and three girls. Four of the boys are still living and those deceased lived beyond 70. None of the sisters are living.

The Crawford place is located south of Tidings and Mr. Crawford says he believes the house was built in 1842 or 1843. His father brought his first wife there from North Carolina. The first Mrs. Crawford and their child never survived a typhoid epidemic, and the story is popular in the Crawford family of her father's return here from North Carolina three months after the death and taking the body back in a two-horse wagon.

Mr. Crawford, whose name was Thaddeous Constintine, then married a Gore girl and became a pastor of the Bethel Presbyterian Church.

The younger Mr. Crawford recalls his father telling of riding a horse and leading a horse to the home of his prospective bride where the ceremony was to take place. After the marriage, the new Mrs. Crawford rode the horse back to the Crawford place which was a distance of about four miles.

"They both lived right between mountains, but it was some distance apart," Mr. Crawford said.

There used to be a post office in that section, and it was called Dirttown, but since that name wasn't very appealing it was changed to Kartah, which has the same meaning.

Recalls War

Having been born in 1858, Mr. Crawford can recall the War between the States.

"I was just a chap then, but things like that are stamped into your memory so that even youngsters don't forget. It wasn't so much the Yankees that bothered us as it was our own boys. They killed our hogs, took our horses and killed every chicken but one."

He told of standing with an old darkey on a roadside and watching a portion of Sherman's

army go down the road.

As for himself, Mr. Crawford has never been in combat, nor was his father, having been a minister.

For 63 years, Mr. Crawford has been an Elder in the Bethel Presbyterian Church, and attended services regularly until his hearing became defective.

his hearing became defective.

Mrs. Crawford displayed a
Bible, whose frayed edges and
torn leaves told of it's constant
usage, and pointed out the fine
print which Mr. Crawford is able
to read.

A recent physical check-up indicated, Mrs. Crawford said, that he was in fine condition with the exception of one leg which has been lame since childhood.

The Crawfords have been married for 38 years and although they have no children they find their nephews are as attentive and considerate as any children could be. Before her marriage, Mrs. Crawford was Alice Henderson.

Many Changes

"A lot of things have changed in Summerville since I first came here 77 years ago," declares Mr. Crawford. "There was a hotel where Chattooga Mercantile is now and a Branner

Mr. Crawford has never been farther away from Chattooga County than when he attended Davidson College, Davidson, N. C.

"I got sight of Virginia," he said, "but just never did actually get into the state. I have been in Alabama and Tennessee though."

Mr. Crawford retired from farming several years ago, but at the age of 86 he was plowing. "I really didn't quit until just

"I really didn't quit until just a year or two ago, if you call milking, feeding hogs and chickens farming," he said.

During young manhood, Mr. Crawford pursued two occupations, that of farming and teaching school.

# HISTORY OF THE CHURCH AND SUNDAY SCHOOL

After the history was written for last church year. our oldest and most beloved elder, Mr. William J. Crawford, passed to his reward March 19, 1950, at the age of 92 years.

He was the son of the Rev. T. C. Crawford, first pastor of Bethel Church. He was a life-long member of this church and served as Clerk of the Session for more than fifty years. He also served as Superintendent of the Sunday School and was teacher of the Adult Bible Class for a number of years. His teaching was most valuable because he was an ardent Bible scholar and had a most unusual memory. He passed on to his class much valuable history and sound doctrine of the Christian faith and teachings of the Presbyterian Church. In his young manhood he studied at Davidson College and later was a public school teacher.

He lived in his father's old home in Dirttown Valley ninetyone (91) years, moving to Summerville just one year before his death. He and his hospitable wife, the former Miss Alice Henderson, kept this old home open to any minister who served Bethel Church.

This year marked the passing of two other sons of this family: Mr. Robert N. Crawford, Sr., of Lyerly who died Feb. 16, 1950 and Mr. John C. Crawford, a retired deacon of Bethel Church, who died November 22, 1950. This leaves only one of this large and long-lived family, Mr. George Crawford of Summerville.

The church is fortunate in securing the services of one of Bethel's own sons, the Rev. Samuel K. Dodson, as pastor. He took up his work in this field the first of June and was installed the second Sunday night in July, July 9, 1950.

This service was an unusually impressive one, conducted by the Rev. James F. Merrin, Superintendent of Home Mission. He was assisted by the Rev. Atkinson, Chaplain of Battey State Hospital, Dr. Wilcox of Darlington School, and the Rev. Harry Foster of the Summerville Church. Special music was furnished by Mrs. John D. Taylor of Summerville and Miss Anna Sue Gamble of Chattanooga, a granddaughter of Bethel.

In July Mr. Dodson and some members of Bethel Church sponsored a Daily Vacation Bible School at Silver Hill. Those helping Mr. Dodson were Misses Mildred Center and Mary Powell, furnished by the Home Mission Department, and Miss Cordelia Weesner and Kathryn Manning of Bethel.

Mr. Dodson conducted a revival meeting at Bethel the last week in August.

When the Thanksgiving Season came around, we were indeed thankful that we had at last been able to get a power line by the church and had the old lamps wired for electricity. This marked a new era in the history of this old church.

When Foreign Mission Season came and we reviewed the book, "A Story to Tell," we were able to show a sound picture depicting conditions in Japan since its occupation by the United States.

Late last year Mr. John S. Jones was elected Superintendent of the Sunday School. He is following in the footsteps of his uncle, John A. Jones, and his father, Samuel E. Jones, who served for many years in this capacity.

E. P. Scott was retained as Secretary and Treasurer of the Sunday School and was also responsible for getting the church and lamps wired for electricity at a cost of One Hundred Dollars.

The last week in August Mr. Dodson was assisted in a revival meeting by the Rev. Leroy Obert of Trion. Mr. Obert's messages were sincere and timely. The congregations were the largest we have had in several years. One young lady, Shirley Holt, united with the Church.

We failed to mention in last year's history that Elizabeth Sanders, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Sanders, was baptized in this Church on Easter Sunday 1950 by Rev. Harry Foster of the Summerville Church. Elizabeth is the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel E. Jones and the great granddaughter of the Rev. and Mrs. T. C. Crawford, and bears the name of her great grandmother Crawford.

We had Miss Mary Dodson, sister of the pastor, as our guest speaker the second Sunday night in July. Miss Dodson joined Bethel Church when she was a child and before she moved with her family to Texas. After graduating from college she went to Korea and worked there as a missionary for almost forty years. She was detained for some time in a prison camp but was finally released and allowed to come home on the ship in June 1951. She was very much concerned about world affairs and especially about the Christians in Korea who were so faithful to her and to the God she served. She exorted us to humble ourselves and pray without ceasing.

Mr. Dodson resigned in September to go to Hamburg, Arkansas. It was with regret that we accepted his resignation. He had done his work well.

"A workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

He was highly esteemed by every member of the congregation from the oldest to the youngest.

We were without a pastor for two months until a call was extended to the Rev. William L. Merrin of Bristol, Virginia. He and his family moved to Lyerly in December and he took up the work at Bethel, preaching fourth Sunday morning's and second Sunday night's. So far as we know he is the first Presbyterian minister to live in this little town.

### THE CHURCH SCHOOL

The Sunday School continues to function with Mr. John S. Jones as superintendent and Mr. E. P. Scott as secretary and treasurer. The attendance is small but has increased some in numbers during the past year. Besides contributing to other causes, the Sunday School had the organ rebuilt last summer which improved the music.

### THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

The Women of the Church have managed to hold together and keep functioning in spite of many difficulties. Miss Margaret Weesner, president, has worked faithfully on and was able to attend Group Conference and Board Meeting.

We observed the seasons of prayer and self-denial for both home and foreign missions. The foreign mission books were reviewed at the Church on Sunday night with the young people taking part in "He Wore an Orchid", and Mrs. Merrin gave "The Americas -- North and South."

We also contributed to the other special causes and met our quota of White Cross supplies.

Mrs. Merrin taught the Book of James.

There is no young people's organization, but the Women of the Church helped send Kathryn Manning to the Young Peoples Conference at Shorter College.

### OUTPOST MISSIONS

The annual Daily Vacation Bible School at Silver Hill was sponsored by our Church again this year in July. Mr. Dodson was assisted by his sister, Miss Mary Dodson, Miss Ann Broom of Dalton, and Miss Cordelia Weesner and Kathryn Manning of Bethel. The attendance was good and parents came for the picnic supper and commencement exercises. Mr. J. F. Merrin was guest speaker.

### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

### 1952 - 1953

The work of the Lord was carried on this year under the guidance of the pastor, the Rev. Will L. Merrin, and his wife.

After the death of his wife, our senior elder, Mr. Thomas H. Gore, went to Texas to live with his sons. This leaves us with two resident elders: Mr. S. I. Storey and John S. Jones; two deacons: E. P. and John D. Scott.

Mr. Merrin was installed pastor at the beginning of the church year. His brother, Rev. James F. Merrin, Superintendent of Home Mission, was in charge of the service and was assisted by the Rev. Harry Foster and elder M. M. Allen of the Summerville Church and the Rev. Leroy Obert and elder W. B. Simmons of Trion.

The Session secured the Rev. Robert Smith of Cedartown to conduct a series of revival services the last week in August. This was the second meeting Mr. Smith had conducted at Bethel and he was welcomed by not only the members of this Church but neighboring Churches as well.

We continue to have services each fourth Sunday morning and second Sunday night. World Communion was observed the first Sunday night in October.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School continues to function with Mr. John S. Jones, superintendent; E. P. Scott, secretary; and Misses Margaret and Lula Weesner and Miss Mary Sue Scott, teachers. Mrs. John Scott and Mr. and Mrs. Merrin were substitute teachers.

The Merrins and Miss Margaret Weesner have worked in an outpost Sunday School at Silver Hill. Miss Margaret Weesner is the faithful organist at both places.

For the first time in history, we had the Daily Vacation Bible School at Bethel. This was brought about by a shift in population. We had been doing the same work at Silver Hill for a number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Merrin were at the head of the school with the support of several other workers who helped with teaching and transportation. The last night we served a picnic supper just before the closing exercise.

### WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

The Women of the Church are carrying on with the same officers as last year. Our Group Chairman, Mrs. John Bankson, met with us in April.

Mrs. Merrin represented us at Presbyterial, and Mrs. Merrin and Miss Margaret Weesner attended Group Conference at Ringgold. Mrs. Merrin taught Colossians at each monthly meeting.

Mr. and Mrs. James F. Merrin, of Rockmart, came to the Church Easter Sunday night and showed slides of the work at Stillman College, also pictures of Sunday School extension. Our negro neighbors were invited to see the work at Stillman and filled one row of pews. They sang two selections by themselves, then all joined in singing "At the Cross." A prayer was led by Rev. Will Barber, pastor of the Negro Church.

At our regular Birthday Meeting in May, we took an offering for these causes.

We studied "Frontiers of Hope" by Charles Gibbony during the Home Mission season and "Led in Triumph" by Ethel Taylor Wharton was our Foreign Mission study. This book was reviewed at Church one Sunday night. An offering was taken for both causes. We also filled our quota for White Cross work.

### YOUNG PEOPLE

The Young People were organized at the beginning of the church year and met each Sunday night at the Church. Kathryn Manning, whom the Women of the Church have been sending to Young Peoples Conference at Shorter, made an excellent president and leader. Their organization gave the Christmas pageant.

### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

### 1953

The work of the Lord was carried on at Bethel with the same pastor and officers as last year, but owing to the change in the church year to correspond with the calendar year we've had only nine months and many handicaps.

The pastor, Rev. W. L. Merrin, had a very serious throat condition that necessitated an operation and this hindered his work both before and after the operation.

Rev. Robert Smith of Cedartown conducted our revival services in the summer beginning the fourth Sunday in July. This was the third meeting that Mr. Smith had conducted at Bethel and in that time he has endeared himself to the people of this community of all denominations.

Our organist, Miss Margaret Weesner, was unable to play for these services but we were very fortunate to have Mrs. Arthur Cummings of the Unity Baptist Church to play for us.

World Communion Day was observed in October.

### The Church School

The Sunday School continues to function with Mr. John S. Jones as superintendent. No large numbers but a few faithful ones refuse to give up. Every year we have one or more transient families whose children are taught and whose lives are brightened and blessed as they pass this way.

### The Women of the Church

This organization had the same officers as last year.

The president, Miss Margaret Weesner, attended Presbyterial at Menlo in April and we started the year with high hopes.

Mrs. W. L. Merrin taught the first bible study from Mark at our circle meeting in April but was in an automobile wreck on her way to Presbyterial and was not able to resume her work for some time. About the time she was able to come back, our president was sticken and our meetings have been very irregular this year.

Mrs. Agnew was brought into the church in a wheel chair the fourth Sunday in October and gave a preview of the Home Mission study book, "Jacob's Ladder."

We have no young peoples' organization but "The Women of the Church" sent Kathryn Manning to Shorter College to her third "Young Peoples' Conference." Kathryn brings back a good report and is highly complimented by the faculty each year.

### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

### 1954

The work of the Lord was carried on this year under the leadership of the same pastor, Rev. Will L. Merrin, and with the same officers as last year.

During the year Bethel's senior elder, Mr. Thomas H. Gore, entered his final rest at the home of a son in Texas. Mr. Gore was the last of his line, and Bethel lost a devoted and faithful officer, a man strong in the faith and true to the cause of Christ and His Church.

Mr. Merrin preaches each second Sunday night and fourth Sunday morning. He secured his brother, Rev. James F. Merrin of Rockmart, to conduct revival services in August.

Two students from Columbia Seminary, Mr. Charles Stowe and B. C. Cole, came to Bethel the second Sunday night in February and conducted a service stressing the work of foreign missions.

### Sunday School

The Sunday School has been carried on with the same superintendent, Mr. John S. Jones, and with the same teachers and organist.

The Vacation Bible School was held in the Gore School building with the four churches of the valley, Pleasant Grove and Unity Baptist, Methodist Bethel and Bethel Presbyterian, taking part. There were three or more teachers from each church. Our pastor, Mr. W. L. Merrin, was superintendent and Mrs. Bernard Storey of Unity was the assistant superintendent. The enrollment was 107.

### Women of the Church

"The Women of the Church" have carried on under difficulty with sickness and other valid excuses.

We, too, have lost a loyal and faithful member with the passing of Mrs. Mary Omberg Agnew. She was loyal to her family, her church and her God.

Her last act the Sunday that she was sticken was to write a letter to the church assuring us of her interest and prayers, even though she was unable to attend. This letter was read at her funeral. "She being dead yet speaketh."

Mrs. Agnew was an ardent Bible student and taught the Bible at the circle meetings for the "Women of the Church."

### HISTORY OF BETHEL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

1955

The work of the Lord has been carried on this year with the same pastor and officers as last year.

The revival meeting was conducted in March by the Rev. James Mann of Winsboro, North Carolina. Mr. Mann was a forceful speaker and held his audience spellbound.

Rev. and Mrs. Frank McElroy, representatives of the Presbyterian Home at Quitman, were at Bethel the fourth Sunday in June and he preached at the eleven o'clock service. Saturday afternoon before, Mr. McElroy put up attractive signboards pointing to the Church.

Mr. James Marks and Dr. William Martin of the Summerville Church visited Bethel at a Sunday night service to stress stewardship and we promised to increase our gifts to benevolence.

There has been a great deal said about the "Larger Parish" but there has been nothing done about it.

Ben Weesner, a son of Bethel Church, died at York, Alabama, August 27, and was buried in the Shorts Churchyard near there. He joined Bethel while young and served as secretary of the Sunday School for a number of years.

There is no Young People's Organization in the Church now but two students, Richard Merrin and Kathryn Manning, gave reports the fourth Sunday in December of the work they are engaged in in their respective schools. The celebration of the Lord's Supper was observed at the close of this service.

### The Church School

The Sunday School meets regularly if sometimes with small numbers. Mr. John Jones continues as superintendent and Miss Margaret Weesner as the faithful organist.

Miss Medlin, a field worker in the Synod of Georgia, did some work in this County during the summer. She held several meetings preparatory to the Vacation Bible School which was held in the Gore School building by the four churches of this valley.

Our pastor, Rev. W. L. Merrin, was superintendent and the helpers from Bethel were Mrs. John S. Jones, Misses Margaret Weesner, Shirley Holt and Kathryn Manning. There was an average daily attendance of 100.

The Women of the Church

The Women of the Church have survived another year with the exception of one: Miss Eva Omberg went to her eternal reward on the last day of the year 1955. She was indeed a virtuous woman — strong in her faith and convictions and the last of three generations to belong to this Church. Her grandfather, Milas Bailey; her mother, Mrs. Maggie Bailey Omberg; and her Aunt Letitia Bailey, who reared and taught her, and her sister, Mrs. Mary Omberg Agnew, deceased.

Miss Omberg represented the Women of the Church at Presbyterial in Cedartown in the fall and attended the last meeting of her own Circle. She was very fitly Secretary of Spiritual Life and had also assumed the duties of her sister as Secretary of Church Extension.

In spite of many interruptions and handicaps, the Women of Bethel Church had a very successful year from a financial standpoint and look forward to the New Year with faith and courage, believing that "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are the called according to His purpose."

### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

1956

The Rev. W. L. Merrin continues as pastor of Bethel Church with the same officers and appointments, preaching each fourth Sunday morning and second Sunday night.

We had one visiting minister in the summer while Mr. Merrin and his family were vacationing in California. The Rev. Mr. Andrews, a son of the Cedartown Church, preached for us. This was Mr. Andrews' second visit to Bethel and "The people heard him gladly."

The year marked the passing of the two oldest members of the Church: Miss Cordelia Weesner 87 and Mrs. William J. Crawford 84 years old.

"Miss Delia" joined this Church during her adolescent years under the pastorate of the Rev. T. C. Crawford and cherished the memory of his visits as long as she lived. Her favorite work was in outpost Sunday Schools at Shackelton, a mining town, Silver Hill and various other places. Sometimes in the open. She loved little children, nature and nature's God.

Mrs. Alice Henderson Crawford came to Bethel the bride of Elder William J. Crawford and put her letter in the Church with her husband. They lived in the old home of the Rev. T. C. Crawford and, until they moved to Summerville shortly before the death of Mr. W. J. Crawford, there was always a prophet's chamber and a warm welcome for any minister who served or visited the Church.

Mrs. Crawford was instrumental in changing the women's organization from the "Missionary Society" to the "Woman's Auxiliary" which is now "The Women of the Church."

### The Church School

The Church School continues to operate under the leadership of Mr. John S. Jones with only one change in teachers. Mrs. John S. Jones is now teaching the juniors.

The Bethel School joined with the Unity Baptist Church in their Daily Vacation Bible School. Mrs. Jones was one of the instructors and Mrs. Henry Everett helped with transportation and refreshments.

### The Women of the Church

The Women of the Church, with the smallest number of active women, made the largest contribution to benevolence they have ever made. We observed as many special days and seasons as possible, but not all. We did contribute to all causes and filled our quota for White Cross work.

Our Bible Study was based on "Bible Homes and Family Life Today" by Carolyn and William Ward. Since each lesson was a separate unit, we took turns teaching the lessons and leading the discussion. This proved very satisfactory.

### HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH

1957

The work of the Lord was carried on in this place under the leadership of the Rev. William L. Merrin the first half of the year. He retired the last of June and went to live near his children in Heyward, California, later moving to a daughter at Tacoma, Washington.

As a token of appreciation for his faithful service to the Church, he received a substantial gift at the closing service.

He was appointed as a delegate to the General Assembly which met in Birmingham, Alabama, and was in session the fourth Sunday in May.

In his absence, we had a Mr. Watson from Columbia Seminary to preach for us. He was a forceful speaker and an excellent leader in the song service. This was enjoyed by everyone present — both old and young.

During the months of July and August, we had a Mr. Wilkerson of Richmond, Virginia. He was a student from the Training School there and a pupil of Dr. James Sydnor, Minister of Music and son of our beloved Dr. G. G. Sydnor, former pastor of Rome's First Church and a frequent visitor and staunch friend of Bethel.

For the months of September and October, we had a young couple from Columbia Seminary, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Womack. Mr. Womack is a promising member of the Senior Class and she is truly his helpmeet.

Mr. Robert Pooley, Jr., Secretary of Cherokee Presbytery, came to us in November and December. The celebration of the Lord's Supper was observed in November and in December plans for calling a pastor were discussed.

The Church School is functioning under the leadership of descendants of the Jones, Crawford, Scott and Weesner families, who have been carrying on this work for more than a century.

The Women of the Church are truly the connecting link between the home and the Church. With one small circle, we had our Bible Study, observed the special days and seasons and contributed to all benevolent causes. The Women of the Church sponsored the drive for the Presbyterian Survey and made it one hundred per cent.

The first church erected in 1847 was a log building that stood just east of the present building and had a rock chimney and an open fire. The present building, which was erected before the Civil War and remodeled after the War, had no heat at all until a Rome concern gave the congregation two box heaters in/872. Until then they would build up a big bonfire outdoors and warm before going in for services. A few of the older ladies had charcoal heaters to warm their feet. The box heaters were fired with pine stove wood. We later got a circulating heater and burned coal.

Mr. Gwaltney and a group of young people from Trion and Rome's First Church spent several Saturdays in the fall painting the outside of the building. S. I. Storey furnished the paint and some of the Bethel women furnished lunches and drinks.

The custom of celebrating the Lord's Supper the first month in each quarter has been revived after being sadly neglected during recent years.

There were no revival services held during this year but two young men, James Thomas Holt, Jr., and John Daniel Weesner, Jr., joined the Church and were baptized the fourth Sunday in August.

### THE CHURCH SCHOOL

The Church School continues to function with Mr. John S. Jones as superintendent; E. P. Scott, secretary and treasurer; and Miss Margaret Weesner, organist.

We have Sunday School each Sunday morning at ten o'clock. The Sundays that we have preaching this comes after the nine o'clock preaching service.

Our Church and the Unity Baptist Church worked together in the Daily Vacation Bible School held at Unity with our pastor as superintendent. Mrs. John Jones and Miss Margaret Weesner taught in the primary department.

### WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

Although there are thirteen women on the Church Roll, only five attend the regular meetings. Some help with contributions, White Cross work and other activities.

We observed the special seasons of prayer, birthday party, contributed to all benevolent causes and filled our quota for White Cross.

Miss Margaret Weesner, who had served faithfully and well as president for twelve (12) consecutive years, asked to be relieved of her duties since she is not able to represent us at Presbyterial and other meetings. She did this for many years because there was no one else that could. Mrs. John Scott, the vice-president, agreed to exchange places with her.

HISTORY OF BETHEL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Synod of Ga. 1960 Cherokee Tresbytery The work of the Lord was carried forward in 1959 under the leadership of the Rev. Roy Gwaltney of Trion as supply pastor with elders: John S. Jones and S. I. Storey; deacons E. P. Scott and John D. Scott; and Miss Margaret Weesner, the faithful organist, carrying on in spite of her handicap, arthritis. Mr. Gwaltney continues to preach each second and fourth Sunday mornings at nine o'clock. This year we had a revival the last week in August. He did the preaching each evening and the Rev. J. B. Cantrell, pastor of Unity Baptist Church, was in charge of the song service with Mrs. Clyde Packer at the piano. (Mr. S. I. Storey furnished the piano for these services.) The singing was both spirited and inspirational. The congregations were good with visitors from all sections of this County and some from Floyd. A beautiful floral arrangement occupied the communion table throughout the week, given by Bernard Murphy, Jr., honoring his mother, the late Mrs. Bernard Murphy of Trion, on her birthday. The interior of the Church was painted in August just prior to these services by Mr. Joe Pursely. We kept the traditional white Wednesday night was Family Night with supper-on-the-ground. This proved to be a very pleasant and profitable hour. On the first Sunday in May, Misses Margaret and Lula Weesner represented our church at a semi-annual communion service at Sardis Church where their grandfather, William John Smith, was an elder. He traveled from Coosa, near Rome, to Philadelphia in a horse drawn carriage with a Negro driver to attend a meeting of the General Assembly in 1860 or 1861. He came back greatly disturbed because there was talk of a division in the Church, North and South, and he was afraid that it would be years before it would be reunited — which was only too true.

The Rev. Robert Pooley preached for us the second Sunday in May while Mr. Gwaltney was conducting revival services in another state.

The Rev. Gerald H. Kirby, Associate Pastor of Rome's First Church. preached for us the fourth Sunday in June and the second Sunday in July while Mr. Gwaltney was working with the young people of Cherokee Presbytery and vacationing in Florida.

At the close of the Sunday School the fourth Sunday in June, our treasurer, John Scott, was giving a report when he was stricken with a tumor of the brain and he was buried just one month later, the fourth Sunday in July. This was a shock and a great loss to the church. He had lived a quiet, unpretentious life. His going left a vacancy in our church that is felt by the entire membership. His brother, E. P. Scott, took up his work as treasurer.

On the fourth Sunday in August, two men, Thomas J. Holt, Jr., and Arthur B. Cummings, were elected deacons. They were ordained September 10, 1961.

Our revival services were held the last week in September, beginning Sunday night, September 24. We were fortunate to have the Rev. Mr. Kirby with us again. His discourses were forceful and unusual. His theme for the week was, "Where a Man Found God." Mr. Gwaltney conducted the song services and Jan Packer of the Unity Baptist Church was pianist.

Mr. Gwaltney tendered his resignation the second Sunday in December and preached his last sermon the fourth Sunday, which was Christmas Eve. The Lord's Supper was observed at the close of this service.

After the service he was presented a silver coffee pot (or urn) and a sum of money as a gift to try to show the love and esteem we had for him and his family.

The Rev. Robert C. Pooley, Jr., Treasurer of Cherokee Presbytery, gave the following notice recently:

> "The Bethel Church had a net loss of one member in 1961, and gave \$838.00 to all benevolences and \$994.00 to current expenses. This represents \$36.43 per capita to benevolences and \$79.65 per capita for total contributions. Congratulations !"

Cummings The deacons reported that we were the only church that met our quota for benevolence, regardless of the fact that we were without a paster the first five months. We were very fortunate to have the Rev. Robert C. Pooley, Jr., to preach for us two Sundays in each month, except two: The second Sunday in January we had Rev. David Lehman, Missionary to Brazil, and one other Sunday we had preach for us. The Rev. Earl Hall graduated from Columbia Seminary and took up m the work at Bethel the fourth Sunday in June, preaching each second and of fourth Sunday mornings at nine o'clock before his regular appointment at Trion at eleven o'clock. The death of Miss Margaret Weesner, March 21, 1962, was felt in every department of the church because she was active in every phase of the work. No task was too insignificant and no undertaking too great. She served as janitor, sometimes by herself and sometimes with others. She was the faithful organist for fifty (50) years and played for Sunday School the last Sunday before she went to the hospital. When she could not carry on she asked that Lynda Storey of the Unity Church play for her, never anticipating that she would not come back. In spite of the fact that she had been walking on crutches two or three years, in the meantime she was carrying on her work in the church and the community and driving the family car to take people to church and to the doctor. If there was a sick person, either white or black, who needed transportation to the doctor or hospital they knew they could call on "Miss Mag" because she never refused. This took a teacher out of the Sunday School and the two remaining ones carried on until December when Miss Lula Weesner moved east of Taylor's Ridge. This not only took a teacher out of the Sunday School but a home out of the church. For eighty-one (81) years the B. F. Weesner home had been open to every preacher and Sunday School worker who came into the Bethel Community and the members of this family had been active participants in the church and civic affairs.

### WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

"The Women of the Church," which was organized by the Rev. T. C. Crawford as a "Missionary Society," has held together until this day largely due to the women in the Scott family. We met once during the year with Mrs. John Scott, two or three times with Mrs. Henry Everett, and the balance of the time with the ever faithful Miss Mary Sue Scott.

Her door was always open and she welcomed us as did her mother before her. "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it."

Mrs. John Scott continues as president and the vice-president's place held by Miss Margaret Weesner is left vacant. The other officers are the same as last year.

He and his wife also took the job of keeping the church, voluntarily, when others were disabled.

At a congregational meeting the fourth Sunday in January (Jan. 26, 1964) we elected two officers for the church: John S. Jones nominated E. P. Scott for elder, and J. D. Weesner Jr. for deacon. They were elected by acclamation. The fourth Sunday in February (Feb. 23, 1964) they were ordained and installed.

It was suggested that the organ be given to "Miss Mag" since it meant more to her than any one else, but after she had gone to join the heavenly choir it was sold to Miss Iona Mae Storey, a faithful member of Bethel church. We were glad for her to have it because she has had it overhauled and refinished and it has a certain sentimental value to her. One little boy remarked "It certainly is lonesome without the organ". This was understandable because this was the instrument that Miss Margaret Weesner had used the entire fifty years that she was organist and the analy one the majority of the membership could remember. It was bought in 1911.

E. P. Scott looked after the church grounds and cemetery again this year and did a wonderful job. The cemetery was moved three times and was in fair condition when fall came.

By some arrangement of the session the Presbyterian Survey is being sent to every family in the church.

The work of the Lord was carried on this year by the above named pastor and officers with Lynda and Karen Storey the faithful and efficient pianists.

We continue having preaching each second and fourth Sunday mornings at 9 o'clock. The congregations are small but faithful and liberal. We reached the high-water mark by contributing \$98.00 (ninety-eight dollars) for one Sunday's offering.

When they called the Rev. T. C. Crawford, as the first pastor of the church, they promised to pay him \$150.00 (one hunred fifty dollars) per year. At that time, there were 21 charter members 1 about the same as we have today. However, during the 120 years that have intervened, there have been scores of faithful and influential men and women gone from this church. The membership was more than 100 at one time.

Recently, on September 25, 1965, Mrs. Emmie Echols Davidson of Miami, Florida, came to Bethel, made a public profession and was baptized; joining the church of her forbears, her mother, Maria Storey Echols and her grandfather, Pinkney Storey, Sr., of Crystal Springs, Georgia.

Lula Weisner 1965 Mrs. Sara Scoggins Chandler, who had not been with us very long, died very unexpectedly in February. Her three children, two of whom were members of our church, went to live with an uncle and aunt, who were Baptist.

Naturally, they attend church with them.

The Storey family, in fact this whole section, was saddened in June when Mr. S. I. Storey was involved in an automobile accident that took the life of his grandson, Philip Storey.

The Sunday School continues small but constant with Mr. John S. Jones as Superintendent, E. P. Scott, Secretary and Treasurer, Miss Mary Sue Scott, Miss Janie Scott and Tommy Holt, teachers.

E. P. Scott deserves much credit for the interest he has shown in the church building, the grounds, and the cemetery. He did much of this work himself. He furnished the mowing machine, collected the money, and hired Mr. Ernest Rampley to mow the cemetery four times during the year; the best it has ever been kept.

The women of the church were finally forced to disband. So few women were scattered over such a large area that it made it almost impossible for us to meet. The organization was started eighty-odd years ago by the Rev. T. C. Crawford and has done much good through the years.

I am resigning after writing the history for thirty consecutive years, gathering historical facts from old church books and by talking with older people. I sincerely hope that some one will take the work up here and carry on for future generations.

Services were held on the Second and Fourth Sundays at 9:00 A. M. with the Rev. R. C. Pooley, Jr., Executive Secretary of Cherokee Presbytery, as Supply Pastor.

Mr. John S. Jones represented Bethel at Presbytery, which met at Midway Church, Lost Mogntain, Georgia, on January 21st.

The Annual Reports submitted to Presbytery showed Bethel's membership as 23. Gifts \$2,219.00 with \$1,133.00 going for Benevolence. Mr. E. P. Scott, Treasurer of Bethel Church, reported a balance of \$1,663.00 including Savings and Stocks.

Rev. Gerald Kirby preached for us on February 23rd. We had as guests the Pastor of Unity Baptist Church, Rev. Mike Holdridge, Mrs. Holdridge and four girls from Shorter College who gave special music.

We had no special service at our church on Easter Sunday but attended a 9:00 A. M. Service at Unity. Rev. Holdridge had charge of the service and Rev. Pooley brought the message.

On April 18, 1844 Cherokee Presbytery was organized at the Summerville Church which was an offshoot of Pleasant Green Church located about three miles west of Summerville. Pleasant Green was the first Presbyterian Church organized in Chattooga County, being organized in 1835. The first church was called "Enon". The four members present when the Cherokes Presbytery was organized were: James Gamble, Moderator, N. A. Pratt, A. B. McCordele and Isaac W. Waddell. Cherokee Presbytery celebrated it's 125th Anniversary when it held its Stated Spring Meeting at the Summerville Church. Presbyterial met that morning at the Trion Church and then the ladies joined the men at 2:00 P. M. for the Anniversary Service which included Music, Drama, and Addresses. The Berry College Singers contributed their talents with several choral selections. A series of Tableaus depicting scenes from the early days were presented. Dr. S. Wilkes Dendy, who for over thirty years was pastor of the First Presbyterian Church at Dalton, before retiring in 1966 brought out many interesting thoughts as he gave "A Backward Glance". Greetings from Synod were brought by the moderator, Dr. Harry A. Fifield, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Atlanta and Dr. John J. Diefell, Stated Clerk of Synod.
