HISTORY OF CHURCH
Rev L B Gibbs, Stated Supply
(until Spring Meeting of Presbytery)

The commission appointed to organize the Clayton Presbyterian Church met in the Clayton Community House, with the congregation and visitors, on February 22 (1953) at 11:00 a.m. Present: Dr E L Hill, Rev Cook W Freeman, Rev L B Gibbs, Ruling Elders C C Neal and W R Ussery. Rev Cook W Freeman, who had previously been designated as Chairman, called the Commission to order. Rev L B Gibbs was elected Clerk of the Commission. The following order of service was carried out.

At some time during the winter of 1951-52, Dr. S. Wilkes Dendy, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Church Extension, Synod of Georgia, proposed to Rev. L.B. Gibbs, Pastor of the Presbyterian Churches of Rabun County, that Miss Lillian Medlin, Sunday School Extension Worker for the Synod, might work somewhere in the area of Rabun County for some time during the spring. The matter of beginning to work toward the establishment of a church in Clayton had been in the minds of the leaders in the Church Extension work in the Presbytery for some time, specifically in the mind of Rev. C. P. Phillips, Superintendent of Home Missions. Mr. Phillips and Mr. Gibbs felt that Clayton was the place to use Miss Medlin, but Mr. Gibbs, with a full schedule of services in the churches and outposts of the county, believed that it would not be wise to try to begin work in Clayton until the Presbytery's Committee could give him a student to assist him, so that services could be held in Clayton every Sunday during the summer months, the tourist season. The Committee approved the plan and agreed to furnish a student for the summer. Miss Medlin was invited to come and work, and she was sent by the Synod's Committee to work in Clayton during the months of April and May. Her time was subsequently extended through the month of June.



Working in co-operation with Mr. Gibbs, Miss Medlin did a great deal of visiting during the three months which she spent in Clayton, discovering prospects for church membership, stimulating their interest and the interest of those Presbyterians already known to be living in the community. The use of the Clayton Community House was secured for the group, and a preliminary meeting was held in the Community House on the evening of May 9, a week-day, with an attendance of thirteen. The Sunday School opened on June 1, with the following teachers: Kindergarten and Primary, Miss Opal Patterson; Junior and Young People, Miss Medlin; Adult, Mr. Ted H. Beasley.

In June, a Daily Vacation Bible School was held, with a gratifying attendance. At the end of June, after three months of most effective and devoted service, Miss Medlin left Clayton for work elsewhere in the Synod. To her, humanly speaking, is due the credit for laying the foundation of the work in Clayton.

Mr. Ted H. Beasley, who had just finished his Junior year at Columbia Theological Seminary, was engaged for work in Rabun County during the summer months, and began his work the first of June, the Presbytery's Committee paying his salary and the cost of his room and board. He assisted Mr. Gibbs in Daily Vacation Bible Schools, in pastoral visiting, and in preaching, in the other churches of the county as well as in Clayton. It was thus possible for Mr. Gibbs to preach in Clayton a good many Sunday mornings during these months, and, between the two preachers, services were held in Clayton each Sunday morning. There was a gratifying interest and attendance on the part of the local people, and a growing interest among the summer people of the community.



Because either Mr. Gibbs & Mr. Beasley was in Clayton each Sunday

morning, the preacher for each Sunday also served as superintendent of the new Sunday School. In the fall, when the preaching schedule had to be reduced to two Sundays each month, with Mr. Beasley coming up from the Seminary on those week-ends, there was no one to take the responsibility for the Sunday School. Mrs. Gibbs, the wife of the pastor, and their two sons, David and Danny, had continued to attend the Tiger Church, to which Mrs. Gibbs and David belonged, and which Danny joined in October of that year. Now Mrs. Gibbs was so much need in Clayton, since there was stronger leadership at Tiger, that she and the boys began attending the Clayton Sunday School and church services early in the fall. During the fall, Mr. William A. Patterson began to attend the Sunday School and services. Mr. Patterson had been a member of the Tiger Church since his boyhood, but had, for the most part, been out of touch with the church for several years. His children had been among those whose interest was first enlisted by Miss Medlin. Now that Mr. Patterson had begun to come, his services were soon secured as Superintendent of the Sunday School. a post in which he showed his devotion and fidelity to an outstanding degree.

During the latter part of the fall, it seemed that the time had come to consider the organization of a church. A petition, bearing the names of persons who desired to become members, was presented to the Presbytery at its Adjourned Winter Meeting, January 13, 1953. The report of the Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures, which was adopted by the Presbytery, contains the following recommendation:

"That the overture concerning the organization of the Clayton Presbyterian Church be accepted, and that this matter be handed to a commission composed of: Rev. Cook W. Freeman, Rev. E. L. Hill, Rev. Burns Gibbs, Mr. C.C. Neal, Mr. W. R. Ussery. The quorum of the above commission shall be one elder and one minister."

The account of the organization of the church is given in following minutes of the above-mentioned commission, quoted from the Minutes of the Presbytery:

"The Commission appointed to organize the Clayton Presbyterian Church met in the Clayton Community House, with the congregation and visitors, on Sunday, February 22, at 11:00 a.m. Present: Dr. E.L.Hill, Rev. It will be noted that no officers were elected at the time of the organization of the church. For the time being, Mr. Gibbs, using the powers of an evangelist which the Presbytery had conferred upon him, to be exercised where needed in the Rabun County field, performed the functions of a Session.

At some time during the fall of the year, Mrs. J.E. Hemphill gave the first donation for the Building Fund, in the amount of \$100.00, and this was deposited in the Atlanta Federal Savings and Loan Association. In December, a gift of \$500.00 came, through the Presbytery's Committee of Church Extension, from the Synod's Executive Committee of Church Extension. This, along with smaller gifts which were being received, was deposited in the same bank, to draw interest until needed for building.


There was in the hands of the Trustees of the Presbytery at this time about \$4,500.00 for the Clayton project. The Assembly's Board of Church Extension had made a grant of \$2,500.00 to the Presbytery in April, 1948, for the building of a church in Clayton. The balance of the \$4,500.00 had come from the sale of the Tiger Manse, and had been allocated for the Clayton work by the Presbytery or its representatives. In addition to this, the Trustees were also holding the title to a small lot which they had purchased some years before, situated behind the Clayton Tribune Building, on a side street, and altogether unsuitable for use as a church building site, as all interested parties now agreed.


A suitable lot was found on the corner of Church and Hamby Streets, belonging to the estate of the late Thomas J. Hamby, and it was found that it could be purchased for the church. The family offered to sell it to the church for \$4,000.00. Although the donation from the Assembly's Board had been made specifically for a building, the Board, upon the request of Mr. Gibbs, with the concurrence of the Presbytery's Committee of Church Extension, agreed to let this go toward the purchase of the lot. The lot was purchased, during the summer of 1952, for the above price, by the Trustees of the Presbytery, Messrs. George T. Rice, Chairman and Treasurer; J.N.Hartford, and Fred W. Auld.

At a congregational meeting held at the close of the morning service, April 12, the congregation adopted a motion requesting Athens Presbytery to allow Rev. L.B. Gibbs to serve the church as Stated Supply. At its Stated Spring Meeting, on April 14, the Presbytery granted the request.

At a congregational meeting held at the close of the morning service, August 2, the congregation elected the following Building Committee: Mrs. J. E. Hemphill, Mrs. George B. Prime, William A. Patterson, J. T. Burden, Mrs. L. B. Gibbs; and Rev. L. B. Gibbs to serve as Chairman. Mrs. Gibbs was elected to serve as Treasurer of the Building Committee.

During this year, with the church still using the Clayton Community House, there was a growing interest on the part of the local people and the summer tourists.

Mr. Robert Gray Barron, who had just finished his Junior year at Columbia Seminary, was employed by the Presbytery's Committee of Church Extension to assist Mr. Gibbs in the work during the summer months. The preaching services were divided between the two so that Mr. Gibbs could be in Clayton for a good many of the services, and still not neglect the other churches in the county. Mr. Barron was a young preacher of unusual ability for one who had just completed one year in the Seminary. The schedule of services each Sunday morning in Clayton was maintained from June through September.

A Vacation Church School, with encouraging enrollment and attendance, was conducted in the early part of the summer.

At the end of the summer, the Clayton Church entered into a plan with the Rabun Gap-Nacoochee School for the use of a married Seminary student and his wife. Mr. and Mrs. James Grubb were secured for this work, and they served with eminent satisfaction to the church and to the School, with responsibility to the School for work with the students on Saturday evening, and for the Sunday evening vespers, and both of them being in the Clayton Church and Sunday School, with Mr. Grubb preaching there on Sunday morning; all of this being done twice each month.

Mr. George B. Prime, a charter member of the church, died on September 5. Mrs. J. A. Earl had expected, when the church was being organized, to live in Clayton, but her plans had changed, because of business reasons.

and she requested her church letter. Thus, the church early in its life experienced the loss of two of its charter members.

Late in the fall, Rev. Cook W. Freeman, Executive Secretary of the Presbytery, and Rev. James D. Matthews, Chairman of the Presbytery's Executive Committee of Church Extension, became interested in a plan by which Mr. Gibbs' salary could be increased. They proposed that he take over the preaching services then being conducted by Mr. Grubb, by his holding two services on each of two Sunday mornings a month. This would make it possible for the money being paid to Mr. Grubb to be added to Mr. Gibbs' salary. After considerable discussion, and after it had been ascertained that the change would be satisfactory to Mr. and Mrs. Grubb, and to the Rabun Gap-Naccochee School, it was agreed that the plan would be tried at the first of the next year.

The revised schedule of services, which made it possible for one preacher to hold all the services, without the help of a student, during the winter months, was put into effect the first of January. as follows:

First Sunday: 10:00 A.M., Clayton 11:00 A.M., Tiger Second Sunday: 11:30 A.M., Wiley 10:00 A.M., Clayton 11:10 A.M., Rabun Gap

Fourth Sunday: 10:00 A.M., Tiger 11:30 A.M., Wiley Fifth Sunday: 11:10 A.M., Rabun Gap

Fifth Sunday: 11:10 A.M., Rabun Gap
As this change of schedule did not affect the other churches in the county, with their afternoon and evening services, they are not listed here. This was, however, a decided change for Tiger, Wiley, and Clayton, with some services being held at 10:00 A.M. instead of the generally accepted hour of 11:00 A.M., and with the afternoon service at Wiley changed to the morning hour. The people of these congregations responded to the proposed changes with a fine spirit of co-operation. With the coming of a student for the summer months, it was necessary to have only the fourth Sunday service at Tiger at the early hour.

There had been some discussion of a plan proposed by Mr. and Mrs. Gibbs to change the name of the church from the Clayton Presbyterian to the Hemphill Memorial Presbyterian Church, in honor of the late Rev. Dr. James Edwin Hemphill. Dr. Hemphill was for many years a summer resident of Rabun County, had been deeply interested in the work of the Presbyterian churches of the county, and had been especially concerned that a church should be started in Clayton. After the death of Dr. Hemphill in 1942, Mrs. Hemphill had worked for some years as a house-mother at the Rabun Gap-Naccochee School, had continued to spend the summers at her home in the Chechero community, and was a charter member of this church. She had made the first contribution to the Building Fund, in the amount of \$100.00. The proposed change of name, which was already being discussed, was presented to the Presbytery at its Adjourned Fall Meeting, January 12, 1954. The Minutes of the Presbytery in regard to this read as follows:

"At the request of the pastor, the Clayton Church was given permissions, if the congregation so voted, to change the name of the church to

Hemphill Memorial, in honor of the late Rev. J.E. Hemphill."
At a congregational meeting, February 7, 1954, the congregation voted to make this change in name.

At the same congregational meeting, February 7, 1954, Messrs. William A. Patterson and James Thomas Burden were elected Elders. They both accepted the office, and time was given Mr. Patterson for preparation for ordination, Mr. Burden having been ordained as an Elder in the Carnesville, Georgia, Church before he moved to Clayton in 1953. Using the evangelistic powers conferred upon him by the Presbytery, Mr. Gibbs ordained Mr. Patterson on September 12, and installed both Mr. Patterson and Mr. Burden as the first officers of this church.

The Minutes of Athens Presbytery, January 12, 1954, record the fact that "The Presbytery adopted a motion instructing the Trustees of the Presbytery to approve the church building project at Clayton." This instruction of the Presbytery was carried out by the Trustees. This was necessary because the lot for the church, and some of the funds designated for the building, were in the hands of the Trustees of the Presbytery.

The Building Committee secured the valuable assistance of Rev. O.V. Caudill, of the Department of Church Architecture, Board of Church Extension. Mr. Caudill made a visit to Clayton, looked over the lot, met with the Building Committee, and made most helpful recommendations concerning the type of building to be erected.

On January 24, 1954, the Building Committee met with Mr. W. P. Dickson. who had been chosen by the Committee to be the builder, Rev. Cook W. Freeman also meeting with the Committee. Mr. Dickson preferred to work for his regular hourly wage as a carpenter, rather than working by contract. He was so engaged by the Committee, and accepted the responsibility for employing other needed help, keeping the pay roll, assisting and advising in the purchase of materials, and giving his supervision to the work, in addition to his own work as carpenter. At this meeting of the Committee, an adaptation of the plan recommended by Mr. Caudill was adopted. This called for the construction of the educational unit of the church, a two-story unit, concrete blocks on the lower story and frame construction on the second story, the whole to be veneered with brick at a later time. Mr. Burden was elected by the Committee to serve as Purchasing Agent. a post which he filled with great faithfulness and outstanding ability. The pastor was authorized to use the needed amount of the funds in hand to send out letters asking for gifts of one dollar or more for the church. The Presbytery's Church Extension Committee had granted permission for this to be done, only within the bounds of Athens Presbytery.

At the aforementioned congregational meeting on February 7, the plans for the building were presented to the congregation. The congregation approved the plans, and authorized the Committee to proceed with the building when the Committee judged it wise to do so. The Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery gave its approval, and these actions opened the way for the Committee to proceed.

The churches of Athens Presbytery responded very graciously in furnishing mailing lists of their membership. The first letter asking for donations was sent out on February 26, and the response was generous. In March, the funds which had accumulated in the Atlanta Federal Savings and Loan Association, amounting now to \$749.22, were transferred to the active account in the Bank of Clayton, leaving only \$5.00 in Atlanta to keep the account

open. IN April, Mrs. J.E.Hemphill gave \$1,000.00, and the Trustees of the Presbytery sent the balance which they had for the project, now amounting to \$1,004.27. There were many smaller gifts, too numerous to be listed here, from the people of the church, and from friends of the work, from far and wide. In January, the Sunday School began giving the offering on the first Sunday of each month to the Building Fund, and the plate offerings during the greater part of the summer months also went into the Fund.

On March 15, Mr. Dickson and Mr. Gibbs drove up the first stakes on the church lot, to mark the location of the building. The first check for work, other than the payment of \$12.00 to Mr. Dickson for work on the plans, was a check to Mr. Dick Hunnicutt, March 24, in the amount of \$28.00, for making an excavation, with a bulldozer, for the building. On April 2, the pastor's two young sons, David and Danny, helped their father to begin cleaning off the lot in preparation for the building, the first of much unselfish service which these two boys were to give to this project. Mr. Dickson began his work late in April, and during the months of May, June, and July, the work went forward apace. The beginning of the actual construction of the building stimulated new interest on the part of the congregation and their friends, resulting in many gifts for the Building Fund.

At a congregational meeting on May 2, the following were elected to serve as Trustees of the church: James Thomas Burden, William A. Patterson, Mrs. Kate B. Prime (Mrs. George B.), Mrs. Nellie Jackson Hemphill (Mrs. James Edwin), Mrs. Ruth Perry Gibbs (Mrs. Leonard Burns); and Messrs. Patterson and Burden were authorized by the congregation to sign all papers for the Trustees, after due process. On June 16, the Trustees of the Presbytery gave the church lot to the church, and, at the same time, the small lot behind the Tribune Office. At a congregational meeting on September 12, the congregation authorized its Trustees to sell the small lot for the price of \$1,000.00.

The work on the church progressed so that the first service in the new building was held on Sunday morning, July 25, with a congregation of about ninety packed into the three rooms of the ground floor, with the middle room being used as a temporary sanctuary, and the overflow going into the rooms on either end. At this time, the building was very much unfinished, but in usable condition on the ground floor. The storm sheeting on the second story had been covered with felt, to make the building weather-proof. Only the sub-flooring was laid on the second floor. There were lights in the building, but no permanent light fixtures. The seats which had been given by the Toccoa Church were in use. Mr. and Mrs. Roy Mize. Bratist friends and close neighbors of the church, had offered the use of a reed organ which belonged to one of their sons, and it had been placed in the church. Life and Service Hymns, which had been borrowed from the Tiger Church when the Clayton work was begun in 1952, were the hymn books. At this first service, Mr. Gibbs preached on "The Secret of the Church's Strength", Matthew 16:18, the same text on which Dr. E. L. Hill had preached on the occasion of the organization of the church, February 22, 1953. The secrets of the Church's strength, as presented in this sermon, are: A Divine Founder, A Divine Message to Be Proclaimed, Divine Gifts to Enable Her to Perform Her Ministry, and the Devotion of Her Members.

At a meeting of the Session, at the church, September 26, before the morning service, Mr. James Shook was examined and received into the membership of the church on profession of faith. At the service that morning, he made his public profession and was baptized.

The funds in hand were not sufficient to bring the building to that stage at which it would be usable and would not be damaged by the weather. It was necessary, therefore, for the church to borrow money for this purpose. The amount of \$1500.00 was borrowed from the Bank of Clayton, and a note for \$200.00 was given to C.M.Dickerson for materials.

In the fall of this year, small gas heaters were installed in three of the rooms on the ground floor, one of the rooms having been subdivided after the building was put in use. Mr. Willis M. Everett, of Atlanta and Lakemont, very graciously lent the church an oil heater which was used for the remaining room.

At a meeting of the Session on September 29, Mrs. MyrtlesSmith Shook (Mrs. Clifford) was received by letter from the Tiger Presbyterian Church. Elder James T. Burden was elected Clerk of Session. The Session authorized the pastor to request \$1,000.00 from the Board of Church Extension, to pay for the laying of brick to veneer the building.

During the summer, Mr. and Mrs. Gibbs had gone to Highlands, N.C., to see Mr. and Mrs. Henry K. Burns, Sr., of Macon, Georgia, at their summer home, to lay before Mr. Burns a request for help toward veneering the building with brick. Shortly after this, Mr. Gibbs reveived a letter from Mr. Burns, dated August 16, 1954, from which we quote:
"Since mg return from Highlands, we have discussed the matter of brick for your church at Clayton, and we decided to donate 21,000 brick, which are worth between \$700.00 and \$800.00, toward the building fund for the Clayton Presbyterian Church. Before any brick are to be delivered, we want to be sure you have funds available to meet the expenses of laying the brick and that your bills have been paid in order that all liens outstanding have been paid. We do not want to make a donation the size of this to a church that may become involved with liens from other parties."

Athens Presbytery Women of the Church Hemphill Memorial Presbyterian Church Clayton, Georgia 1954

The women of the Clayton Presbyterian Church met in the home of Mrs. James Burden on the evening of January 13, 1954, for the purpose of organizing themselves into a Women of the Church group. Only five women were present. Mrs. L. B. Gibbs presided, and Mrs. W. R. Ussery gave the devotional from the first chapter of Acts. After the group had discussed the organization of a women's group, they elected the following officers: President, Mrs. James T. Burden; Vice-president, Mrs. J. E. Hemphill; Secretary and Tressurer, Mrs. George B. Prime; Historian, Mrs. Elizabeth O Knox; Chairman of Spiritual Growth, Mrs. L. B. Gibbs.

The group decided to invite themselves to join the Tiger women in their covered dish supper and to review the foreign mission study book. This meeting was held during the foreign mission season, when the pastor, Rev. L.B. Gibbs, was to lead the study. Plans were made for purchasing the necessary literature for programs and Bible study for the year. It was decided that since the work of the Women of the Church was new to many of the women, we would spend the year without assigning chairmen for the various causes. Each cause was to be presented in its season.

Mrs. Knox presented an interesting article on "The World Church", this being the program for this meeting. In closing the meeting, Mrs. Gibbs led the group in the study of the first chapter of Acts. The five women present at this meeting were: Mrs. James T. Burden, Mrs. Elizabeth O. Knox, Mrs. L. B. Gibbs. Mrs. W. R. Ussery, and Miss May McDowell.

Twelve meetings were held during the year. Bible study from Acts and the circle conversation period were a part of each meeting. The group was not assigned a White Cross quota, but made ten little dresses just the same. the group was encouraged by letters of congratulations and encouragement from the Synodical President, Mrs. A.M. Bowen; the President of the Women of the Church, Athens Presbytery, Mrs. P. L. Hutchins; and the Chairman of Group Three, Mrs. A.J. Walter. We were the 219th local organization in Georgia.

On February 7, 1954, the name of our church was changed to the Hemphill Memorial Presbyterian Church, honoring the late Dr. J. E. Hemphill, who had longed to see a Presbyterian church in Clayton.

The group sent gifts to two Thornwell girls from time to time during the year. We joined all the Presbyterian women of Rabun County at Rabun Gap for the Birthday Party. This county-wide meeting had become an annual affair. The women of the Presbyterian churches in the county take turns acting as hostesses for the Birthday Party. We contributed to all the causes of our Church, but our greatest interest, perhaps, was in our own Building Fund. We co-operated with our Daily Vacation Bible School by furnishing refreshments for the children each day.

During the year our member ship has grown, and our attendance during the tourist season has been especially good. Our first year in the work of the church has been a joyous one, filled with satisfaction and spiritual blessings. We feel that our women have grown in the knowledge of the Bible and of our Church. 

The Session made plans for the participation of the church in the Assembly-wide Evangelistic Campaigh, but, through no fault of the church. the plans were not carried out. In March, when the meetings were to be held, the church did not have a meeting-place large enough to have evangelistic services and to invite the general public. Therefore, it was

The Sessi on called a meeting of the congregation, to be held on March 20. The meeting was held on that date, was moderated by Dr. James H. Gailey, Jr., of Columbia Seminary, and the following actions, all of which had been included in the call for the meeting, were taken:

1. A Donation Contract with the Board of Church Extension, to secure a grant of \$500.00 to be used on the church building, was adopted, and Elders Burden and Patterson were authorized to sign this instrument.

2. Mr. William R. Ussery, who had been an Elder in the Tiger Church from October, 1922, until he became a member of this church on January 3,1955, was elected Elder.

3.Mr. Randolph C. Ussery, who had been a member of the Tiger Church for a number of years before becoming a member of this church on January 3, 1955, was elected Deacon.

4. Rev. L. B. Gibbs, who had served this church from the date of its organization, first as Evangelist and then as Stated Supply, was called to become its Pastor, with the church paying \$192.00 per year as its share of his salary, with participation in the Ministers' Annuity Fund. Elders Patterson and Burden were authorized to sign the call.

On May 10, Rev. L.B. Gibbs was installed as Pastor, by a Commission of the Presbytery, consisting of Rev. Messrs. Cook W. Freeman, Fred Clark, and Jerry D. Otwell; and Elders Karl Anderson and William T. O'Neal. Mr. William R. Ussery was installed as an Elder, and Mrg. Randolph C. Ussery was ordained and installed as the church's first Deacon, on June 26.

Mr. Robert Teed, who was finishing his Junior year at Columbia Seminary, was secured to assist the Pastor during the summer months. He preached at this church and at the other churches in the county, assisted in Daily Vacation Bible Schools, and in pastoral visitation. His assistance made it possible for this church to have service each Sunday morning during the summer, and, with the help of other supply preachers, this schedule was kept up through Spetember. Mr. Teed was given the responsibility for organizing a Youth Fellowship, to be centered in Clayton, but to be open to the young people from all the Presbyterian churches in the county. There was a good response from the young people of the Timpson outpost, and this group became a joint undertaking of the Hemphill Memorial Church and the Timpson outpost. The young people from the Tiger Church attended several times, but this was not maintained for very long. Mrs. Frank Abrams was Mr. Teed's assistant in this work with the young people, and became Adult Advisor when his work ended on August 31.

In the spring of this year, oak flooring was laid in the auditorium and the room on the second floor, and the outside entrance to the auditorium was made usable. Much labor was given on this work by Mr. Burden, Mr. Patterson, Mr. Randolph Ussery, Mr. Willis Everett, and David and Danny Gibbs. The room on the second floor was ceiled, and it became the home of the Intermediate-Senior Class, with Mrs. Abrams as teacher. In the fall, a small gas heater was installed in this room, so that it could be used during the winter.

Pews were moved into the auditorium on the second floor, and services were held there during the summer months. When cold weather arrived in the fall, it was necessary to move back to the ground floor for services, as there was no heat in the auditorium, and it was not ceiled. The congregation did this, however, with the definite goal and purpose of going forward with the finishing of the auditorium during the next year to such an extent that it would not be necessary to move downstairs again.

The Sunday School had continued to give its offering on the first Sunday in each month to the Building Fund. Numerous gifts had continued to come in for the work. The note of approximately \$200.00 which had been given to C.M. Dickerson for materials in August, 1954, was paid on January 26, the amount being \$210.66. The Board of Church Extension made a grant of \$500.00 in May of this year. Mr. John E. Clarke, a summer resident of Clayton, a Methodist, had attended this church and had been greatly interested in its development. He had made a gift of \$100.00, and had included the church in his will for \$500.00. Mr. Clarke died on April 9. and Mr. Gibbs was called to Atlanta to conduct his funeral on Monday, April 11. The bequest was paid to the Building Fund in August by Mr. Clarke's neice, Mrs. Gilbert Stokes, of Atlanta. In September, the Presbytery's Committee of Church Extension gave the Fund \$100.00 which had come to it from the Synod's Committee for this purpose. The \$1500.00 note was paid off, the final installment on July 2. In September, the church was given a car, a 1949 Oldsmobile "88", by Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Floyd, of Athens, Georgia. As the pastor and his family, with occasional help from others, had for some time been transporting two families to and from Sunday School and church services, it was decided that the car should be kept and used, rather than being sold. The Session agreed to Mr. Gibbs' using it personally, as well as for the church, with him paying the operating expense for his own use of it. The Session put \$10.00 into the operating expenses, and soon \$10.00 per month was secured from the committee which administered the money coming each month from the Men's Class of the Druid Hills Church. Atlanta.

IN September, Rev. John M. Ash came to the Rabun Gap-Nacoochee School to teach Bible. Even before he was definitely engaged by the School, the Session of the Rabun Gap Church had talked about the possibility of his working also with the church, as an assistant to, or associate with, Mr. Gibbs. This developed so that he was called by the church there as Associate Pastor, and was to do as much preaching as called for by the schedule of the Rabun Gap Church and the Betty's Creek Outpost. Mr Gibbs, still being Pastor, was still to preach at these places occasionally, at which times Mr. Ash would preach at one of the other churches in the county. This made it possible for the Rabun Gap Church to have a morning service on the first, as well as the third Sunday in the month; and also enabled Mr. Gibbs to have a full-time schedule in the other churches of the county. At a congregational meeting held on December 10, the Hemphill Memorial Church approved a schedule of services for every Sunday morning, at 10:00 o'clock during the winter months, and at 11:00 o'clock during the summer, June through September.

At the Congregational Meeting on December 10, Mr. and Mrs. William R. Ussery were elected as additional members of the Building Committee. Mrs. Prime had become infirm and was spending the winter in Florida; Mrs. Hemphill was in North Carolina in the winter months; Mr. Burden had moved to Rabun Gap, and consequently the Committee had been reduced to a number which was considered inadequate.

In the early fall, Mr. Gibbs wrote to Mr. Burns about the gift of bricks for the church, which Mr. Burns had promised for use, when the church was out of debt and able to use them. The company was behind with its orders, and could not send the bricks immediately, but they were shipped later, and arrived in Clayton just after Christmas. This carload of very good bricks came as the gift of Mr. Henry K. Burns, Sr., a life-long Presbyterian who had grown up in Maysville, Georgia, and had been in the brickmaking business at Macon for a number of years. The Building Fund paid the freight and drayage costs, amounting to \$142.06. The bricks were stacked in the church yard, and covered to protect them from the weather until weather conditions would permit their use.

In December, through the kind offices of Mr. Willis M. Everett, who had already befriended the church, a number of pews were given to the church by the First Presbyterian Church, Atlanta, Georgia. These pews had first been used in the old First Church building on Marietta Street, and subsequently used in Sunday School departments at the church on Peachtree Street.

The Women of the Church of the Hemphill Memorial Presbyterian Church began its second year with the following officers: President, Mrs. James T. Burden; Vice-President, Mrs. J. E. Hemphill; Secretary, Mrs. L. B. Gibbs; Treasurer, Mrs. George B. Prime; Historian, Mrs. Elizabeth O. Knox; Chairman of Spiritual Growth, Miss May MeDowell; Chairman of World Missions, Mrs. Frank Coleman; Chairman of Church Extension, Mrs. Elizabeth O. Knox; Chairman of Christian Education, Mrs. A.M. Oxner; Chairman of Annuities and Relief, Mrs. W. R. Ussery; Chairman of Stewardship, Mrs. Frank Abrams; Chairman of General Fund Agencies, Mrs. James Coleman.

Our pastor, Rev. L.B. Gibbs, led us in the study of Romans for the year.

We joined with the Wiley and Tiger women in our World Mission study, "Face to Face with India", in February. We sent dresses through the White Cross to Africa.



At the beginning of this year, the church asked, and secured, the permission of the Presbytery to amend its call to the pastor by raising its share of his salary from \$192.00 to \$300.00 per year. At the end of the year, it accepted, as its share of the pastor's salary for 1957, \$360.00; and accepted the Presbytery's asking of \$200.00 for benevolences for 1957, twice the amount which had been asked, and more than paid, in 1956. Up to this time, this church has always given more for benevolences than was asked by the Presbytery.

In January, a gift of \$500.00, unsolicited and unexpected, was received from Mr. and Mrs. Floyd K. Zeigler, friends of the church, of Sarasota, Florida. During the year, as has constantly been true since before the building was begun, there were numerous smaller gifts coming from numerous friends.

IN April the work of bricklaying, veneering the church, was begun. Mr. Wilbur Garrison, of Dillard, Georgia, was employed as the head mason, and as his associates, Messrs. Tom Hopkins and Russell Cabe, of Otto, N.C.; Mr. Elbert McClure, Jr., of Dillard, Georgia; Mr. T. J. Hamby, of Clayton, Georgia. Mr. William Dickson and Mr. Julian Wheeler, as carpenters, with Mr. Dickson in charge of all the work, were also employed at this time.

To help in the brick-laying project, the Rabun Gap-Nacoochee School, and the contractors who were working on the shop building there, were most co-operative in releasing scaffolding material as soon as possible. The Ritter Lumber Company donated some of the lumber for the scaffolding, and Mr. Berry A. Floyd, County Superintendent of Schools, very graciously lent a goodly amount of lumber which belonged to the County School Board. Mr. William Duncan, a builder, the next-door neighbor of the church, very generously lent lumber for for scaffolding. All of this resulted in a substantial reduction in the cost of the undertaking. Mr. Robert Vickers, Ordinary of the County, assisted materially in shaping up the church yard by having dirt hauled in from a grading project which was under way.

The bricklaying was completed in the latter part of May. It was necessary, in order to pay for materials used in connection with the bricklaying (mortar mix and sand) and some other work which was done on the church at this time, to borrow \$325.00 from the Bank of Clayton. Through the generosity of friends, and the gifts of the congregation, it was possible to pay this note off by August 6. The pews which had come from Atlanta were set up in the second-floor auditorium, and the congregation moved upstairs early in the summer.

0

Gifts of shrubbery by the late Mr. and Mrs. A. I. Yarn, of the Clayton Methodist Church; and later gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Homer Cook, of Clarkes-ville, provided for the future beautification of the church grounds.

The family of the late Dr. and Mrs. Gillespie Enloe, summer residents of

the county for many years, had pledged \$400.00 as a memorial to their parents, payable \$100.00 annually, 1954-57. All that had been paid up to this time had been used in the general fund, with the pledge to the family that a suitable memorial would be provided. Early in 1956, the Newton Bible Class, of the Central Presbyterian Church, Athens, Georgia, sent a memorial gift of \$25.00 in honor of the late Charles H. Newton; and later in the year Mrs. Newton sent a memorial gift of \$100.00. With her knowledge. this was also used, at the time, in the general fund. In August of this year, Mrs. L.B. Gibbs received some special gifts which made it possible to designate these memorials and go ahead with the work on them. Accordingly, a plan was put before the Building Committee by Mrs. Gibbs, and having been approved there, was put before the congregation in a meeting on August 26. The plans were approved by the congregation, as shown by this extract from the minutes of the meeting: "It was proposed that different groups of the Women of the Church should be responsible for the completion of different rooms downstairs. This plan had been approved by the Building Committee. One woman would be chairman in charge of each room, and would be responsible for her room. Mrs. Gibbs requested that she be allowed to use \$400.00 which had come to her in special gifts and had been set apart in a special fund, to complete two downstairs rooms as memorials to Dr. and Mrs. Enloe, and Mr. C. H. Newton. The following were to be in charge of various rooms: Mrs. Gibbs and Mrs. Watts, co-chairmen; Mrs. Hemphill; Mrs. Bagwell and Mrs. Thornton, co-chairmen; Mrs. Oxner and Mrs. Kennedy, co-chairmen; Mrs. Weatherly (upstairs classroom). A motion to accept the above plan was made by Mrs. Weatherly,

seconded by Mr. Patterson, and passed unanimously. Mr. Ussery made a motion that the auditorium ceiling of sheetrock should be put up. The motion was seconded by Mr. Patterson and passed unanimously."

In carrying out the above plan, the overhead ceiling and sheetrock sidewalls were completed, the walls of all the downstairs rooms and the upstairs classroom were painted, recessed ceiling light fixtures were installed, and folding doors were put in between the Kindergarten and Primary rooms. The sheetrock ceiling was put in the auditorium and was painted. Mr. W.T. Palmour, a house finisher, of Greenville, South Carolina, a friend of Mrs. Bagwell, was most generous in giving work for the large room downstairs, in purchasing materials at a special price, and in giving the church a special tate on the work of putting up sheetrock and painting, both upstairs and downstairs.

Mr. Willis M. Everett, Jr., of Atlanta and Lakemont, secured valuable gifts for the church this year, in addition to what he had already done. From a bank which was being remodelled in Atlanta, he secured the six beautiful light fixtures for the auditorium. He brought, from the First Presbyterian Church, Atlanta, thirty chairs and two tables, for the Kindergarten and Primary rooms; and approximately two hundred copies of the Hymnal which had been used in that church, all in good condition. He raised, among his friends in Atlanta, \$225.00 for the purchase of a gas heating unit for the auditorium, which Mr. Bob Holcomb, President of the Blue Flame Heating Co., sold to him for \$200.00, at a reduction of \$150.00, leaving \$25.00 to help with the installation. All this was done in addition to his having secured donations for the Building Fund in 1954, and it is not known how much he has given, himself, in money as well as in service. Mr. Earl King, representative of the Tugalo Gas Co., gave his services in the installation of the heating unit, and Mrs. Hemphill had the light fixtures installed in the auditorium.

As this account is being written, in December, 1956, the auditorium still lacks the wainscoting and the finishing of the floor.

In August, the Session approved a proposal for an evangelistic meeting, the first for this church, and the date was set for the week beginning September 23. Rev. Robert Dobbins, Pastor of the Thomson, Georgia, Presbyterian Church, was secured to hold the services. The response in interest and attendance was encouraging. As a result of the services, Mrs. Beulah Thomton, Mrs. Florence Sanders, and Mrs. Grover Thompson united with the church. There was one boy who made a profession of faith, but he did not unite with this church.

At a congregational meeting, held on October 28, Mr. Roy Hodgson was elected Elder, and Messrs. Edgebert G. Watts and George Weatherly were elected Deacons. The church voted to enter the proposed Rabun County Larger Parish of Presbyterian Churches, and elected Mr. Roy Hodgson, Mrs. George Weatherly, and Mrs. Mary Bagwell as representatives on the Parish Council. At a congregational meeting held on November 25, the following were elected as additional Trustees: Mrs. George Weatherly, Mr. E.G. Watts, Mr. Randolph Ussery; and the following were elected as additional members of the Building Committee: Messrs. Roy Hodgson, E.G. Watts, and Randolph Ussery. Our budget was increased and met, and we were able to increase somewhat the amount we pay our minister. The Every Member canvass was successful. The church was represented at all Presbytery meetings and at Synod.

We indeed feel God has blessed us by sending us a fine man to guide our work, and we are grateful. We have been able to make our church into a beautiful sanctuary.
