I have been unable to get first hand information from this church during the past year. A rather unique situation exists in this church as there is not a man on the church roll. It is a very weak struggling Home Mission Church. As I do not have a complete file of Presbytery's minutes this statement is far from complete. I do not have the organization date etc., 1918 3 elders reported; 5 communicants; S.S. enrollment 20; \$27.00 contributed towards pastors salary. Church supplied by Rev. A.G. Ferguson, Superintendent of Home Missions in Athens Presbytery. 1920 3 elders, 1 deacon; 5 resident communicants, 3 non=resident; no pastor 1922 This statement is made by Rev. B.W. Beker, Evangelist in the Minutes of Presbytery, Spring Meeting, page 12: "At Dahlonega wh have a good opportunity Your evangelist held a short meeting there a few months ago. The congregations were good, and as a result six were added to this good work. Rev. B.W. Baker is giving one Sunday in this church. A Sunday School was organized which is doing good work. We need to place a man at Dahlonega to work the town and the surrounding country". 1923 "Rev. A.G. Ferguson is supplying the Dahlonega Church. The work there is at a standstill and has been for several years. There are no prospects for growth in the church. Brother Ferguson is preaching once a month also at Helen." 1926 3 resident members, 2 non-resident 1928 "Dahlonega is still without services. There are only two resident members there and we know of no way by which it can be supplied." 1929 Statement by Rev. J.A. Simpson, Superintendent of Home Missions: " In January I was in Dahlonega and preached to a good congregation in the Baptist Church. As the result of this visit a Presbyterian Sunday School was organized under the leadership of Alton Glasure, a student of the North Georgia Agricultural College and a candidate for the ministry under Athens Presbytery." Fall Meeting 1929: " I made two visits to Dahlonega during the summer and preached to good congregations in our church there. The Sunday School which was organized this year, is doing splendid work under the leadership of Alton Glasure. The average attendance has been over forty, and the interest is good." 1930 Services being supplie d by the Superintendent, Rev. J.A. Simpson Spring 1933: "In March I went to Dahlonega and arranged to preach there on the fourth Sunday, but was unable to fill my appointment because of illness. Miss Emily Gaillard has raised some money and had the church building repaired and painted. I hope we can have evangelistic meetings there this summer." Rev. J.A. Simpson, Superintendent

1936 Church being served by Rev. M.C. Dendy. Results are encouraging.

ANNUAL HISTORY OF THE DAHLONEGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The Dahlonega congregation is primarily students and serves only three local families, having a membership of only 8.

During the past year a Westminister Fellowship was organized on the college campus and Paul West, a member of the Dahlonege Church was elected delegate at large at a recent Synod's Conference in Athens and is now on Syndo's Council.

In the fall of 1948 the Sunday School was organized (first time in 10 years). Dr. Stephen Huntley is the Superintendent. There are two classes, the Adult and the children; Mrs. Stephen Huntley is the Adult teacher, and Miss Emily Gaillard teaches the children.

In December 1948, the AR Presbyterian Church of Due West S.C. presented the church with a Bible for the Pulpit.

Plans for the future include the purchase or construction of a pulpit. work on the sanctuary, abd a more adequate heating system. Other plans and also prayers include the reception of new members into the Church, prospects from a lengthy list.

The work has encouraging and discouraging features but the faith of thefew faithful workers is strong andprogress will be made with God's help.

This is a church for students. They are our reason for existing. In addition we do have a few younger children, some of them quite faithful. For these children living out in the country transportation is provided. Some among their number plan to recite the Child's Catechism before summer.

We gave a banquet at the Smith House for the college group and the few church families. Sixty-one attended.

As our student pastor for two years, Mr Neely McCarter, was leaving us on being graduated from Columbia Seminary, we entertained for him at the Community Building. A Saturday picnic has been planned for the month of May.

We have recently had all windows repaired, some having to be replaced, at a cost of \$260. Butane gas has been installed and with additional minor repairs we now worship in comfort.

The college students like young preachers, and we have had such splendid ones that sixty to one hundred fifty attend the morning service. Neely McCarter worked wonders with the students and Chilton (Chic) Thorington is following in his footsteps.

We borrow the Community Building for the College Students Sunday School Class.

Number enrolled in the Sunday School 31 not including the College Student Class.

There were 15 children enrolled in the Daily Vacation Bible School taught by Mr and Mrs Ernie Tufft. In addition to this school Mr and Mrs Tufft held a weekly Saturday morning session of Bible study and recreation for the children.

With only twelve members on the church roll, six of them minors, we find it difficult to contribute to benevolences. Through the Sunday School we contribute to World Missions, Thornwell Orphanage, American Bible Society, local charities and to other church causes whenever possible.

WESTMINSTER FELLOWSHIP

The Westminster Fellowship meets in the church every Sunday at 6:15 p.m. The student pastor with the leader plan and rehearse the programs that are well attended. After the meeting the students go to the home of one of the elders for hymn-singing, coffee and cookies. A popular series of programs on doctrine attracted seventy-two young people. In the group there are a candidate for the Baptist ministry, one for the Methodist ministry and two for the Presbyterian ministry.

We work terribly hard in our church because we are so few. Results are many compared with our assets. May God continue to bless us.

HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

Dahlonega, Lumpkin County, Georgia was the scene of a sizable gold rush in 1830. Eight years later a United States mint was established there. The Cherokee Indians had named the place Talonega, meaning yellow metal. Today the mint is closed but coins of every series minted between 1837 and 1861 may be seen in the library of the North Georgia College.

The Presbyterian Church of Dalonega was first organized in 1838 with the Rev David Hastings Mason D D serving as pastor. He came to Dahlonega from Philadelphia as an official of the mint and e rected a building, the upper part being used as a Masonic Lodge and the lower part as a church. (History of Lympkin County, page 225)

The present church building is located on the corner of Park and Singleton Streets. In 1838 the congregation used the old Academy Building to hold a Sunday School known as the Union Sunday School, which was the first organized Sunday School in Dahlonega. The original structure mentioned above, built by Dr Mason, was occupied by a garrison of Federal soldiers and greatly damaged. This building was later sold.

In 1878 the Rev R W Milner undertook to build a house of worship. Due to the failure of subscriptions being paid the brick edifice was sold and used as the office of the Dahlonega Signal. It is now used as a residence. The present church building was erected largely through the efforts of Dr B P Gaillard asaintly and scholarly man who served the church as elder for many years.

The church being primarily a church for students it is well to know something of the college they attend. The following is from the 1952 catalogue of North Georgia College:

North Georgia College, founded in 1873, owes its origin to the Act of Congress of July 2, 1862, entitled "An Act donating public lands to the several states and territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and mechanic arts." The act contemplated the "endowment, support and maintenance of at least one college in each state where the leading object will be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and mechanic arts in such manner as the legislatures of the states may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes."

While North Georgia no longer offers agricultural courses it has otherwise remained true to the general vision of its founders. A small annual income from the sale of public lands is still received by the college.

Sunday morning church attendance is required by the college authorities, therefore, although we have only eleven members, we may have as amny as fifty to seventy-five students at m orning service. The Youth Work of our church takes the form of a Westminster Fellowship for the college students. They elect their own officers but work closely with the elders of the church. Regular meetings are held at sixthirty Sunday evening.

STANDARD B&P "NOTEAR"

As it has been stated the Presbyterians held the first organized Sunday School in Dahlonega in 1838. Today the Sunday School is made up of the Primary Department, Junior Department and the Adult Class which is taught by Dr S M Huntley Sr.

In recent years the Women of the Church have carried on nobly in spite of the fact that there have seldom been more than two or three members. At present Mrs M J Youngberg serves as president.

The person having attained the most note of any member of the church seems to have been Dr Benjamin Palmer Gaillard Sr, a distinguished and beloved educator. He was associated with North Georgia College for sixty-five years. During that time he taught science in the college and served as acting president on three different occasions. With the help of outstanding Presbyterian clergy he was essentially the founder of the present Presbyterian Church in Dahlonega. He began collecting funds for the building of the church years before the work on the building was begun in 1900 For years he served as an elder and Sunday School superintendent. As an educator he was known throughout the state and beyond. Dr Gaillard was the son fo the distinguished Presbyterian minister Rev Savage Smith Gaillard.

Judge B P Gaillard Jr, son of Dr Benjamin Palmer Gaillard, was a lawyer of renown and served as Judge of the Superior Court, Northern District of Georgia, for many years. Judge Gaillard joined the Presbyterian Church early in life. For a number of years he taught the B P Gaillard Men's Bible Class in the First Presbyterian Church of Gainesville, Georgia. Because of trouble in his life he was drawn near to the Savior. This with a thorough knowledge of the Bible and his great gift of oratory brought throngs of people to hear him give an exposition on the Sunday School lesson.

Miss Emily Gaillard, a daughter of Dr B P Gaillard Sr, kept the church active almost single-handedly for years by soliciting funds for repairs and a stipend for the current minister. She now works for the Government at the Ordnance Depot in Atlanta but comes home for the seek-ends. She taught music for years both private classes and at Chicora College. It can be said that the church today owes its existence to her faithful and untiring efforts.

Rev Nathan Alpheus Pratt D D believed to have organized the church, was born in Centre Brook, Conn. Jan 29, 1796. He was a son of Ezra P and Temperance Southworth Pratt. On March 11, 1830 he married Catherine Barrington King of Darien, Georgia. He attended Yale University in 1820 and Princeton Theological Seminary 1820-1823. Licensed to preach on April 23, 1823 and ordained by the New Brunswick Presbytery on Feb 25, 1824 he served as stated supply Shrewsbury N J 1824-1826. Pastor Darien Georgia 1827-1840. Pastor Roswell, Ga 1842-1879 and died there on August 30, 1879. Received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Oglethorpe University in 1854.

Rev Isaac Watts Waddell D D was perhaps the most illustrious minister the church ever had. He served as pastor while President of North Georgia College 1893-1899 and was a man of outstanding scholarly attainments and deep spirituality. He always conducted chapel exercises and was said often to quote, "We are as prone to sin as the sparks are to fly upward." He was President of the college at the time General Robert Lee Bullard USA, then a Captain, was Commandant of Cadets. (For a full biography of Dr Waddell see binder of Hebron Presbyterian Church filed under Athens Presbytery in the Historical Foundation.)

Dr Jonathan C Rogers, former President of North Georgia College and later President of the University of Georgia, was for a while a member of the Dahlonega Presbyterian Church. He moved his membership when the church became inactive. Presidents Hoad and W D Young also were for a time members of the Presbyterian Church.

Church History

Dahlonega Presbyterian Church has had Chilton Thorinton, a senior at Columbia Seminary, as student supply since springtime when Neely McCarter left us to do student work at the University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida. During the summer the student population was so low that church attendance was not required and we had no students all summer. The home mission committee furnished a student from Columbia Seminary or an elder to preach for us all summer. We had both small gains and losses—an army family moved away and Stephen Huntley, Jr. went to Davidson College so we lost his services though his membership is here. Miss Isabel Lumsden, instructional supervisor for the county, a member of Nacoochee Presbyterian Church works with us for the college young people. Mr. James Kidd, Professor of History at the North Georgia College, and his wife who are members of the Associate Reform Presbyterian Church, help in the church whenever they are able.

Forty Presbyterian students are registered in the college as of January, 1954. The church strives to provide them with fellowship as well as spiritual help. The Student Work committee of the Synod of Georgia beginning in October 1953 proveded \$15 a month for student work of the church. Mrs. Huntley is a member of the committee of which Dr. Wade Huie is chairman. As Dr. Huie says, the money at least will help to feed the students. We serve coffee and cocoa before Sunday School and after hymn singing and Westminster Fellowship at the Huntley's serve coffee and cake.

For more than two years there has been emphasis on work with college students. In September 1952 Mr. McCarter took 13 students from the college to College Park for a Retreat. This proved to be the largest group in attendance. In September 1953 the Huntleys took a group to Camp Rutledge for a similar Retreat. This camp is between Atlanta and Augusta and is a state owned recreation park. Again in 1954 they took George Thurmond (who also took his car), Patsy Shattuck, Pat Compton, Jesse Varnadoe, Joy Hudgins, Joyce Bellamy, Bob Schlosser and Janet Simpson to Athens for another retreat. In 1954 four students went to Athens for the Retreat. In this way the church has tried very hard to do something for the students at the college.

Church History

The attendance at Sunday School is about 55 or 60. This counts the college students who meet across the street in the community house and have coffee and doughnuts served by Capt. and Mrs. Frank Smith. There are 70 to 80 attending church. Students take up the offering and sing in the choir. There is a great need for a resident minister as the town and college are both growing and something must be done to consolidate gains.

On faith and donated labor we have painted the church on the inside and hope to soon do the outside.

During the year James C. McDonald joined the church on profession of faith. On Dec. 10, Major and Mrs. Carlton Stephens joined on reaffirmation of faith. Mrs. and Mrs. James C. Kidd united by transfer of letter on Oct. 10, coming from Due West Associate Reform Church; Mr. and Mrs. William Cole from Toccoa Presbyterian Church in November; and Mr. Robert Short, a student, came from Moultrie Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Henry Lewis Smith has been student pastor since September. The Session has two members--Mr. Ben Sanders, clerk, and Dr. S. M. Huntley. In the Sunday School Mrs. James Kidd is kindergarten, Miss Emily Gaillard and Mrs. Huntley are primary and Mrs. Carlton Stephens is the junior teacher.

Again the youth work has received emphasis. We sent to Montreat five delegates for the Westminster Conference. They were George Thurmond, Patsy Shattuck, Joyce Bellamy, Joy Hudgins and Stephen Huntley. This and the conference at Athens in February (at which we had eight attendants) aided greatly in training these young people in the Christian work of the church. Patsy Shattuck was elected secretary of Synods Westminster Fellowship while George Thurmond was the out-going vice president. We also had a retreat with the Westminster Fellowship at Porter Springs at the summer home of the Joseph Whitners in the early spring.

Officers of the Westminster Fellowship for 1955 are: George Thurmond, Pres.; Janet Simpson, vice president; Joy Hudgins, program chairman; Joyce Bellamy, treasurer with Dr. Huntley as councilor and Henry Smith as song leader (student pastor).

Summary:

A recreational program was set up for the students in the Community House. This was to be planned by the students but supervised by the session.

A committee was formed by the session for church building plans and fund raising for it.

The session approved a Vacation Bible School for a week and to be held in the church.

Annual History

The Dahlonega Presbyterian Church, one hundred twenty-one years after its beginning, ended the year of 1958 with high hopes of soon having a resident minister. For the past several years we have been supplied with student pastors from the Columbia Seminary. Mr. Sam Laine acted as supply pastor from September 1957 until April 1958, and Mr. Ben Dunegan finished the year. Miss Emily Gaillard is church pianist.

Sunday School classes were held each Sunday at ten o'clock, church services at eleven, and Westminster Fellowship, Sunday evening at six. The sacrement of the Lord's Supper was observed twice during the year.

At the beginning of the year the officers of the church included three deacons and two elders, but, because two of our deacons were transferred from the town and one elected an elder, our officers are now as follows:

1838-1959 Athens Presbytery 94406 Presbyterian Church 53-54 Dahlonega, Georgia Dahlonega Presbyterians Rejoice Again Sixty years ago a large flag was hoisted high in the air on the Dahlonega town square in celebration of the first rafters being positioned for the new Presbyterian church building. The members were publicly rejoicing because they had been without a church of their own for some 30 years, although their organization was at that time already 61 years old. Now, 121 years after their beginning, another redletter year has arrived for this small band of determined denomination members. A call has gone out for a full-time resident pastor to minister to their spiritual needs -- a pastor whose charge it will also be to guide activities of Presbyterian students at North Georgia College. The prospective pastor, who visited Dahlonega recently, is a young, unmarried man. He is the Rev. Blake Breitenhirt Jr., an honor graduate of King College, Bristol, Va., and a 1954 graduate of Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Va. His studies included organ and church music. Following graduation, the Rev. Mr. Breitenhirt was pastor of the Albertville (Ala.) church 1955-58, and is now serving as assistant pastor of the South Highlands Presbyterian Church in Birmingham. If he accepts the call to Dahlonega he will arrive the first week in April. Except for brief intervals, Presbyterians here have been without a resident pastor. During recent years they have had a student pastor to come each Sunday from the Columbia Seminary in Decatur, the assignment being made on a yearly basis. Struggle to Live Various accounts of the church's history reveal that, though exceedingly small in membership, it has from the first been composed of town leaders -- educators, lawyers, business men, officials of the old U. S. Branch Gold Mint and officials of large gold mining companies. Despite this prominent interest, the denomination has through the years had to struggle for survival. The story of its dogged determination in the face of almost insurmountable obstacles is both insuring and respect-commanding. This story is taken from old "papers," and from quotes from Col. W. P. Price's 1897 book (about Dahlonega Baptists in particular), old newspapers and from Cain's History of Lumpkin County.

The Presbyterians were organized here in 1838 by the Rev. David Hastings Mason who was sent here from Philadelphia to be chief coiner at the Branch Gold mint which began operations that year. The Rev. Mr. Mason was also the first pastor, and 10 years later he built the first church house. Available records do not show where meetings were held during the first years, but the statement was made that whenever without a church, the Presbyterians held their services, baptisms and communions in the Baptist and Methodist churches. Both of these denominations were organized here around 1835 and built small meeting houses by 1840 or 41. In 1848, Col. Robert Hughes Moore deeded one-eighth of an acre of land in the west side of town to the Rev. Mr. Mason as trustee. The minister then built a house for church downstairs and . Masonic Lodge use upstairs.

Athens Presbytery Dahlonega, Ga. Dahlonega Presbyterians Rejoice Again p.2 Early church members are listed as the Mason family, the Frederick Boartfields, Hugh A. Frasers, A. F. Morrisons, James Kellys and John Swantons. Damaged in War A garrison of federal soldiers took over the building after the Civil War, damagint it extensively. It was later claimed as private property by a son-in-law of the Rev. Mr. Mason, sold and torn down. The materials from the house were used in the famous old water mill on Yahoola Creek known as Wimpy's Mill. Dr. B. P. Gaillard, for 60 years a professor at North Georgia College, and one of the staunchest members of the Presbyterian Church beginning with the time he moved here in 1873, later wrote a newspaper article telling something of the church's struggles.
"When I came to Dahlonega in 1873, there were a few members left but the church was in a dormant state ... In 1874, the Rev. James Washburn of Nacoochee Valley visited us and reorganized the church. Under his ministry several new members were added." Dr. Gaillard further tells that this pastor moved to south Georgia and was succeeded by the Rev. R. W. Milner who undertook to build a house of worship on a lot donated by Col. Moore. Whether this is the same lot as before is not known, but the

efforts to build were thwarted by lack of funds, and only partial construction resulted.

The building committee was organized into a board of trustees consisting of D. W. Lewis, first president of North Georgia College; N. H. Hand, mining engineer and owner of prominent gold mining properties; Col. W. P. Price, founder of NGC, and two other well-known lawyers. Weir Boyd and James R. Lawhorn. Funds Needed

However, not even these powerful men could raise enough money to complete the building, so both it and the lot were sold to Col. Price. The house was finished and became the Dahlonega Signal office.

In 1879 a petition to be incorported "as the trustees of the Presbyterian Church of Dahlonega in connection with the General Assembly of the United States," was filed by Dr. Gaillard, Boartfield, Boyd, Kelly and Lawhorn.

During the 1880's, the women of the church decided the time had come for the females to take a hand. They started their own fund campaign, and "with the aid and cooperation from others worked wonders in the matter."

Mrs. John Moore Sr., widow of one of the sons of Col. Moore, tells today of buying aprons from the women who made them to sell in their drive for building funds.

The woman's touch combined with the gold mining boom which was on at the time resulted in complete success and at the turn of the century the present Presbyterian Church building was constructed. New Church

In 1900, Dr. Gaillard wrote, "We now have a neat little church house, and while it is right that we should feel proud of it, we should also be mindful of our ever increasing responsibility to work for the Master, and welcome within its walls those who wish to worship God."

Athens Presbytery Dahlonega, Ga. Dahlonega Presbyterians Rejoice Again p. 3 Col. Price, a Baptist, in 1897 commented: "The Presbyterians, though never strong in numbers, have always put forth their full influence in the scale for piety and temperance ... " Listing later members in addition to Dr. Gaillard as being the Cartledges, Allens, Waddells, Dupre and Witherspoons, he said: "The influence of all these people went to the right side of every question. And it is no wonder that the evils which once ruled the town should give way under the opposition of such people...when united in church work, the walls of wickedness had to come down." Today, 1959, the membership is still small (23 regular members) but the determination to survive is just as strong as it has been all during the past 121 years. This progressive and typical pioneer spirit has won out for the loyal group, and a new day will begin with the coming of a resident pastor. Elders in the church are Ben W. Sanders, James C. Kidd and Frank Smith, all members of the NGC faculty. Trustees, elected only this month, are Norris Little, an official of Pine Tree Company, and Miss Julia Oates, of the college library department. Mrs. Ralph Surasky, wife of another NGC faculty member, is president of the Women of the Church. The Sunday School superintendent and teacher of a class for college students is Fred Hill who is currently attending NGC and plans later to study for the ministry. Only two of the members are descendants of the past membership. These are two daughters of Dr. Gaillard, Miss Emily Gaillard who is the church pianist, and Miss Sally Gaillard. DAHLONEGA CHURCH HISTORY September, 1961-June, 1965 The Reverend Lowell Beach Sykes preached his first sermon in our church on the last Sunday in September, 1961. He and his family had moved to Dahlonega the day before from Comer, Georgia. Mr. Sykes was installed as pastor of the Dahlonega Church on October 1, 1961 by the following commission of Athens Presbytery: The Rev. Samuel M. Inman, Executive Secretary of the Presbytery, presided; The Reverend Dr. Samuel A. Cartledge, professor of New Testament at Columbia Theological Seminary, preached the sermon; The Reverend Dr. A. Hoyt Miller, retired missionary to the Congo, charged the minister; and Ruling Elder Dallas N. Fields of New Hope Church, charged the congregation. A reception was held to welcome the new minister and his family that afternoon in the Community House. The church bought an electronic Baldwin organ from Mrs. William C. Boyd, organist. This greatly improved the congregational singing. The Pastor began a mid-week service of prayer and Bible study, a weekday communicants' class for children in school, and a Sunday communicants' class (during the Church School hour) for adults. We were thrilled by the number of college students worshipping with us. We sometimes have to bring in extra chairs, and the church is always full whenever the college New members added to the church during 1961 were as follows: October 15, 1961 Col. and Mrs. Marvin D. On April 8, 1962, the following were ordained and installed as Ruling Elders after having been duly elected to that office by the congregation, instructed by the pastor, and examined by the church session: Lawton Baggs, Albert B. Kitchen, Jr., and Marvin D. Bennett. The session approved a "pastor's fund" not to exceed \$25 per month, which the pastor will be able to use at his discretion to meet emergency needs of people in our community. During the spring much work and planning went into the prospective new building. Arrangements were made with a local man to remove the old building on the new property so that work could begin as soon as a contract was let. Because some of the older people in town thought that a gold mine shaft was on the property for the new building, during the spring a company from Atlanta was employed to check this out by drilling. They found no shaft.

In July the contract to build was let to the Sherrill Construction Company, Gainesville, Georgia. On the Lord's Day, July 22, after morning worship in our old building, the congregation adjourned to the site for the new building for a service of ground breaking. Work actually began on the new building on August 10.

New hymnals were badly needed because of the greatly increased size of the congregation. The session voted to purchase TRINITY HYMNAL, published by the Orthodox Presbyterian Church, because it seemed to meet the particular needs of our congregation better than other available hymnals. The new hymnals were used for the first time by our congregation at Morning Worship on September 9, 1962. Mr. Sykes preached on "The Gospel in the Hymnbook" from Col. 3:16b.

On September 16, 1962 in a duly called congregational meeting, the following trustees were elected: Lawton Baggs, chairman, Mrs. G. E. Kidd and Ben W. Sanders. Said trustees were empowered to transact the following motion which was unanimously approved: "That we accept the \$7,000 offer for our present church building from the

Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Atlanta with the following provisions:

1) that we will vacate the present church building by June 1, 1963, or upon completion of our new building-which ever occurs earlier;

2) that we will retain possession of the organ and that the purchaser supply us with an acceptable bell;

3) that a lawyer be employed to work out the transaction."

Our new building, of contemporary design, has already been described as a "land-mark in Dahlonega". From the village square, and from the campus of North Georgia College, the free-standing, seventy-two feet high spire, topped by a celtic cross, can be seen pointing, as a finger, heavenward. In the spire hangs a bell which "calls to worship."

As one enters the sanctuary he feels "an upward lift" given by the high arched ceiling supported by exposed laminated wood arches. He sees - not a chancel - but what

might better be called "a setting for Reformed worship."

A large wooden cross, high on the front wall, reminds him that "we preach Christ crucified," "for the preaching of the cross is to them that perish, foolishness; but unto us who are being saved, it is the power of God." This truth is set forth in the Word and the Sacraments.

The Word and the Sacraments "go together" in Reformed worship. Therefore, the pulpit for the reading and preaching of the Word, the Lord's Table for the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and the font for the Sacrament of Baptism form

one unit which is clearly visible to the congregation.

The Lord's Table, centrally located, is not an altar on which a sacrifice is made. Our Lord's sacrifice on the Cross was "once for all." Therefore, it is a real table "with legs on it" to symbolize the fact God gathers His people around His table to give them spiritual food. The Table, raised two steps for visibility, is essentially on the same floor level as the congregation to emphasize our fellowship with God and with each other.

The Font is to one side and on the same floor level as the Table, insuring good visibility. This enables the whole congregation to actively participate whenever Baptism is administered. Thus, each one can, in the words of the Larger Catechism,

"improve his baptism" when another is baptised.

The Pulpit, on which rests the Holy Bible, is at one side in this setting, but actually predominates because of its height and size. This is in full accord with the Reformed and evangelical emphasis on the reading and preaching of God's Word. Because the preached Word must never be separated from the written Word, there is no separate lecturn for reading the Scriptures. The shape of the pulpit is that of the bow of a ship - reminding us that as Noah and his family were saved from destruction by entering into the ark, so we are saved when we hear and believe the Gospel according to the Scriptures.

The organ and choir are placed in the balcony to emphasize the fact that the choir is a part of the worshipping congregation - not performing for the congregation, and

that the primary function of the choir is to support congregational singing.

The stained glass window over the balcony, made in Chartres, France, is a symbol of the hely Trinity. The hand symbolizes the creative hand of God the Father, the cross the sacrifice of God the Son, and the dove the Holy Spirit.

One hundred and ninety people can be seated in the pews on the main floor and in the balcony. With folding chairs on the main floor and in the narthex an additional 75

can be accommedated, bringing the total seating capacity to 265.

The building also includes four class rooms, the Pastor's study, a lovely fellow-ship hall, and a small kitchen. The whole unit is heated and air conditioned by electricity. Future plans call for the addition of a two-story educational building.

During the summer we held joint Sunday evening services with the Methodist Church. Services were held at the Methodist Church during the month of July and at the Presby-

terian Church during the month of August.

Because Colonel Boyd was transferred and the Boyd's moved, we had several substitute organists during the year from June 1963 until June 1964. The Westminster Fellowship gave a piane for the Fellowship Hall in appreciation of the fine work that Mrs. Boyd had done at the organ and with the Junior Choir.

In September 1963, the Church employed Albert Anderson as part-time sexton.

Because of the great number of students that began worshipping with us in the fall, we began having two Sunday morning services.

On Monday, the 14th of October, the church spire was put up. A special effort had been made to get it up before the meeting of the Presbytery of Athens. The Presbytery met in this church on October 15, 1963 in stated meeting. As far as anyone could remember, this was the first meeting of Presbytery in the Dahlonega Church. Although there were still a few things incomplete in the new building, it had been for all practical purposes completed by this time.

DAHLONEGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The Presbyterian Church in Dahlonega was organized in 1840 by Dr. Nathaniel Pratt. Its first report listed 17 communicants. For 123 years the work has been carried on with varying degrees of success. The largest membership, 60, was reported in 1866. The low ebb was between 1928 and 1934, when only four communicants were reported for seven years. Beginning in 1948, when only five communicants were reported, there has been a slow but steady growth until, at the present time, the communicant membership is 50. Of this number 32 have been added during the past two years.

The student community of North Georgia College numbers nearly 1000. With about ten per cent of the students giving a Presbyterian preference, the church is faced with a tremendous challenge to minister to them. This past Sunday 214 people attended Morning Worship here.

Four years ago the Church Extension Committee of Athens Presbytery decided immediate action was necessary. Over one hundred years had passed, and one opportunity after another had gone by. The committee acted. A beautiful tract of land was purchased, high on a hill, overlooking the campus. It is the tract on which the original Presbyterian Church was built, and the old building, later converted into a residence, was still standing until last summer when it was torn down to make way for our present building.

Preston McIntosh, Architect, of Atlanta, was engaged to design a building which would meet the needs of our ministry both to the community of Dahlonega and to the students of North Georgia College. In July, 1962, the contract to build was let to the Sherril Construction Company, Gainesville, Georgia. The new building, without furnishings, would cost \$80,000.00.

Athens Presbytery authorized its Church Extension Committee to borrow up to \$50,000 for this project. The Board of Church Extension of the General Assembly gave \$10,000, and the Campus Christian Life Committee of the Synod of Georgia contributed \$10,000. The local congregation, when numbering only 18 communicants, pledged \$10,000. We note that every court of our Church has contributed to make this new building possible. Several individuals in Dahlonega and throughout Georgia have also made contributions.

On the Lord's Day, July 22, 1962, after Morning Worship in our old building, the congregation of the Dahlonega Presbyterian Church climbed this hill for a Service of Ground-breaking. Work actually began on August 10, 1962.

On May 26, 1963, we had our Service of Dedication, having been assured that the building would be completed by that time. However, as you can see, there is still work to be done. The contractor has promised that everything but the stained glass window over the balcony will be finished by the end of this month.

This building, of contemporary design, has already been described as a "land mark" in Dahlonega. From the village square, and from the campus of North Georgia College the free-standing, seventy-two feet high spire, topped by a celtic cross, can be seen pointing, as a finger, heavenward. In the spire will hang a bell which "calls to worship."

As one enters the sanctuary he feels "an upward lift" given by the high arched ceiling supported by exposed laminated wood arches. He sees - not a chancel but what might better be called "a setting for Reformed Worship." A large wooden cross, high on the front wall, reminds him that "we preach Christ crucified. "for the preaching of the cross is to them that perish, foolishness; but unto us who are being saved, it is the power of God." This truth is set forth in the Word and the Sacraments.

The Word and the Sacraments "go together" in Reformed worship. Therefore, the Pulpit for the reading and preaching of the Word, the Lord's Table for the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and the Font for the Sacrament of Baptism form one unit which is clearly visible to the congregation. The Lord's Table, centrally located, is not an alter on which a sacrifice is made. Our Lord's sacrifice on the Cross was "once for all." Therefore. it is a real table "with legs on it" to symbolize the fact that God gathers His people around His table to give them spiritual food. The Table, raised two steps for visibility, is essentially on the same floor level as the congregation to emphasize our fellowship with God and with each other. The Presbytery or "elders bench" is behind the Table, showing the parity of the ruling elders with the teaching elder.

The Font is to one side and on the same floor level as the Table, insuring good visibility. This enables the whole congregation to actively participate whenever Baptism is administered. Thus, each one can in the words of the Larger Catechism

(Q. 167), "improve his baptism" when another is baptised.

The Pulpit on which rests the Holy Bible, is at one side in this setting, but actually predominates because of its height and size. This is in full accord with the Reformed and evangelical emphasis on the reading and preaching of God's Word. Because the preached Word must never be separated from the written Word, there is no separate lecturn for reading the Scriptures. The shape of the pulpit is that of the bow of a ship - reminding us that as Noah and his family were saved from destruction by entering into the ark, so we are saved when we hear and believe the Gospel according to the Scriptures. The anchor cross on the pulpit hanging carries out this theme, and emphasizes Christ our Anchor.

The stained glass window over the balcony, has been ordered, but will not be here for several months. It is being made in Chartres, France, and will be a symbol of the holy Trinity. Two hundred people can be seated in the pews on the main floor and in the balcony. With folding chairs on the main floor and in the narthex, and additional 100 can be accommodated, bringing the total seating capacity to 300. The building also includes four class rooms, the Pastor's study, a lovely fellowship hall, and a small kitchen. The whole unit is heated and air conditioned by electricity. Future plans call for the addition of a two-story educational building.

PRESBYTERIANS HOLD DEDICATION CEREMONY

The Presbyterian Church, founded here in 1840, today will dedicate a new modern meeting house on a hill overlooking North Georgia College campus and the town of Dahlonega.

Formal dedication ceremonies will be held in the new church building

at 3 p. m.

The Presbyterian Church was organized in Dahlonega in 1840 by Dr. Nathaniel Pratt. The doctor's first report listed 17 communicants. A later report, in1866, reported the largest number of members the church

has enjoyed since its beginning 123 years ago, 60.

Work for new membership was carried on with varying degrees of success over the years and a low of only four members was reported for seven consecutive years between 1928 and 1934. In 1948 the church could boast only five members, but since that time growth upwards has been steady and today the number stands at 45.

A challenge to Presbyterians here is North Georgia College. The student body at the college numbers 900 and 10 per cent have indicated their religious preference to be Presbyterian. The challenge was there, but the facilities to handle it were not.

Land

In 1959 the church extension committee of Athens Presbytery decided something must be done. A tract of land was purchased by the committee high on a hill in Dahlonega overlooking the college campus and the town square. It is the same tract of land on which the original Presbyterian Church was constructed 123 years ago.

The old church building was converted into a residence and last summer

was torn down to make way for the present building.

The new church will cost \$80,000 without furniture. Athens Presbytery authorized its church extension committee to borrow up to \$5,000 to finance the project. The committee gave another \$10,000, campus Christian life committee of the \$ynod of Georgia gave \$10,000, the Dahlonega congregation, numbering only 18 at the time, pledged another \$10,000 completing the cost. Other contributions from Dahlonega citizens and Presbyterians throughout Georgia also have made pledges.

Groundbreaking

Groundbreaking was held on the site of the new church July 22, 1962. Described as a landmark, the building began to rise on August 10 of the same year.

After its completion, the new church will boast a 72 foot spire topped by a celtic cross. As on enters the sanctuary he senses an upward lift caused by a high arched ceiling supported by exposed laminated wood arches. A large wooded cross is high on the front wall.

The organ and choir are placed in the balcony. A stained glass window over the balcony was made in Chartres, France, and is a symbol of the holy Trinity.

One humdred and ninety people can be seated in the pews on the main floor and in the balcony an additional 75 can be accommodated with folding chairs, bringing the total seating capacity to 265.

The building also includes four class rooms, a pastor's study, a fellowship hall and a small kitchen. It is heated and air-conditioned by

electricity. Future plans call for the addition of a two-story educational building.

The Rev. Lowell Beach Sykes is pastor. The building committee is composed of Frank M. Smith, chairman; James C. Kidd, secretary; Marvin D. Bennett, treasurer; Miss Julia Oates, Albert B. Kitchen Jr., Ben W. Sanders, and Lawton Baggs, representatives from Athens Presbytery's church extension committee, representatives from Synod's Christian Education Committee and advisory members.

The Minister's Report:

THE STATE OF THE DAHLONEGA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

As the Dahlonega Presbyterian Church faces the close of 1966 and the beginning of 1967, it is on the threshold of a new day. Within our ranks may be found a decidedly growing concern as to the mission to which God has called us. No longer is a simple "plan of salvation" approach agreeable to the majority of the congregation. This fact alone is indicative of the concern in the midst of the congregation for an understanding of the relevance of the Christian message. With a growing number of young people of junior highschool and high school age, there is also a further corresponding growth in the amount of questioning and discussion taking place in the church. This is all good and healthy. Certainly much of this stems also from the fact that the church is closely college oriented. Thus, it is my feeling that God has richly blessed the congregation, for through the younger segment of the congregation he has seen fit to begin a process of renewal within the church.

To return to the church as a whole, I feel that several things must be noted:

1) The attendance of the adults of the congregation in the worship service service of the church has been down for two or three months. This is indicative of two things: First, it is indicative of a confusion on the part of the congregation as to their role as the worshipping body, who must listen for the word and respond to it. Secondly, and more importantly, it is a necessary part of the growing process, whereby the church must grow through a transition, from those who understand worship as a spiritual exercise to one which can understand the worship of Jesus Christ. Thus, it is my own feeling that the attendance is in essence part of a searching, and searching is good, for it indicates a degree of openess, whether this be seen as obvious or not, and openess is necessary for the Lord of the Church to speak to his church. 2) A highly significant part of the church has assumed some of the major leadership in the total community in terms of the way in which the community deals with problems of poverty, juvenile delinquency, and other problems of the whole man. In a word, the church is beginning to bear witness in a tremendous way in the community to the Lordship of Christ over the community. 3) The members of the academic community, and particularly the students of North Georgia College, are feeling that they are more a part of the church's life, rather than just guest who are allowed to worship in the church. Thus, the church is beginning to pioneer in a field which is vital to the entire denomination, by demonstrating that a local church can have a relevant and dynamic campus ministry.

With these things in view, it would seem that the church is in a healthy position. Its problems are to be seen as points of encouragement, i. e. growing pains, and its accomplishments bear witness to the tremendous way in which the church is being used by God to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ to relate to the community in which God has set his congregation. The minister's report:

The period is question is a period that I have not had complete first hand experience with for the reason that I have only been pastor of the Church since September, 1967. However, my remarks will attempt to access the situation that I have seen and also that which I have been able to deduce.

It is often difficult for a small congregation to switch pastors. The pastor is many ways sets the tone for the congregation's life in many Churches and to have a change is to upset some patterns and begin to rebuild some others. This has been such a time here. Most would say that it has been a hard time. The Church has been involved in some controversy, and in some soul searching, and it has not been a time of statistical success. This has been especially hard after some years of steady prosperity after many years of impossible struggle. Thus it has taken a lot out of people and there are marks left from the months past that will remain for some time. This is a hard time in the life of many Churches, a time of transition, and the old ways and the new ways are not easily reconciled. This seems to be especially true in a college community when a Church is entrusted with the task of nurture to students and faculty. How do you communicate with those seeking a "more relevant" gospel and still provide support for those whose faith is framed in older forms? Another aspect of this Church's situation has been the relation to congregation by a student oriented minister. Which is to claim the main focus, the campus or the local congregation?

In the past few months, there have been some important changes occuring. The session is beginning to move ahead toward some commonly accepted goals. Two new elders have been added, a thing which has given the session a shot of new vision that is of critical importance for our future. The Church has taken some important steps toward a more responsible financial base. There is a stated budget of the Church's program and ministry that includes benevolences. There is a file of congregational pledges which covers the year's budget and to which the majority of the congregation have given their support by means of a pledge card. We are starting to see some more young people in the Church's life, and we believe that this is the beginning of some good development in youth work for the congregation. The session's sommittees are beginning to take responsibility for the Church's life, and a much better job is being done in all areas. A monthly newsletter. The Focus, goes out that helps tie the congregation together. Currently the Church is on the verge of buying a manse for the first time in recent history, and will be committing itself in this way to a more solid support of the pastor. In short, the state of the Church is difficult but promising as we move into the Tern. Ross parter year 1968.

Rev. Johnston, director. Junior and Senior High School students make up this group which meets twice a month for study. Social activities are also enjoyed at various times. This group entertained the you the of the other churches of Dahlonega at a New Years Eve party held at Dahlonega Methodist Church.

Remarks:
In July 1967 the Session authorized the rental of the George
Lipscomb house on North Hall Road to be used as a manse. The
Session, also at this time, voted unaminously to send 10% of the
monthly offerings to benevolence.

In August 1967 the Session agreed to allow the Episcopalians to use our church for Sunday Morning Services. Their service time not to conflict with ours. A rental fee is charged.


