

#### EATONTON CHURCH HISTORY

We cannot find a written record of the organization of the Eatonton Presbyterian Church.

We know by tradition and by Sherwood's Gazeteer of Georgia published about 1827 that four denominations, Methodist, Baptist, Christian, and Presbyterians united in building the first church in Eatonton seventeen years after the Indians ceded this country to the Whites. We know that the Rising Star Lodge F. A. M. and wealthy citizens subscribed liberally. It was, also, said by Rev. Adiel Sherwood in 1827 that Eatonton had the finest church building in Georgia in the up country out of Augusta in these early days.

The written records of Rising Star Lodge F. A. M. tell us that the lodge laid the corner stone of the new church June 24, 1819. This corner stone is preserved in the new Presbyterian Church built in 1896.

The records of Hopewell, now Athens Presbytery, shows that the Eatonton Church was first mentioned in 1820, reporting with a list of twenty members, and that the fall meeting of the Presbytery was held in Eatonton in 1820, and that Dr. S. S. Beman was S. S.

The sessional records of the Eatonton Church seem to be written

in 1849 from memory by Elder A. C. Mason who became a member in 1846 and was ordained in 1849.

These records are as follows up to 1849:

The Presbyterian Church of Eatonton was, according to best information to be obtained, organized in 1816 by Rev. J. C. Stiles or Rev. F. R. Goulding, and the following members constituted the church, Viz: James A. Meriwether, Chas. P. Gordon, Brice Gaither, Benjamin Chaooer, Mrs. Susan Meriwether, Mrs. Gordon, Mrs. E. Gaither. In 1843 William Clark was ordained Ruling Elder. Mrs. Isabella Prudden was received by letter from Old Bethany Church and Mrs. R. C. Meriwether and Miss Susan Meriwether were received on profession by Rev. J. W. Baker and Elder Clark. The following persons were received on profession in 1846 by Rev. J. W. Baker and Elder A. M. Nisbet:

N. S. Prudden, Abigail S. Penniman, Miss Mary Fielder, Wm. T. Young, Mrs. Susan Harwell, and Mrs. Eliza Cobb.

Before the "War Between the States" the church building was often used as a place of assembly, political meetings, etc. being held there. During the war the pews were removed and the building used as a hospital. After the war the pews were replaced and the building was never again used for anything secular. It was held in great veneration by all the people and was spoken of as the "Old Union Church".

The Baptists sold their interest in it in 1895 to the Presbyterians, the Methodists declared in writing that they had long abandoned all claim, they ever had to it, and the presbyterians sold the building to be

taken down to save desecration. They reserved the bell and hung it in their new church built in 1896.

We know that each denomination had the use of the building one Sunday in each month and the Masons had the fifth Sundays when they wished. Later when the denomination called the Christians ceased to exist here, the Methodists, being the stronger, used it two Sundays in each month. This continued until 1857 when the Methodists built a new church and left the old church to the Baptists and Presbyterians.

From 1819 to 1842 we suppose Eatonton was supplied with preaching irregularly. Rev. F. R. Goulding, Rev. Jos. C. Stiles and Rev. John Brown are mentioned. Oglethorpe College was opened in 1835 at Milledgeville and from that time, for a number of years, preachers from that school supplied Eatonton.

Following is a list of supplies and pastors as far as known:

Rev. Geo. T. Goetchins, pastor at Milledgeville, gave us several days service during 1873 and '74 with results of several additions.

Rev. O. P. Fitzsimmons came as our first installed pastor in Dec. of this year. He served half time.

- 1880- Rev. J. T. Bruce, licentiate, served one-half time as stated supply for several months.
- 1881- Rev. A. M. Hassell came in the spring of this year and
  was installed as pastor. From this time until 1902 the
  pastor divided time with Monticello. A manse was built
  here, so Eatonton became the home of the pastor.
- 1885- Rev. A. S. Doak, 1904- Rev. J. W. Lafferty, 1905- Half time. Full time.
- 1889- Rev. Samuel Scott, 1906- Rev. J. S. Montgomery, 1910- Half time. Full time. A new manse
- 1891- Rev. W. T. Palmer, was built during this 1892- Half time.
- 1893- Rev. J. M. Plowden, 1911- Rev. B. W. Mebane, 1914- Half time. Full time.
- 1889- Rev. J. P. Anderson, 1915- Rev. A. G. Anderson, 1902- Half time. Full time.
- 1917- Rev. James Thomas came on our call in August of this year.

  He is still with us. Up until 1937, he also served the church at Sandersville. He preached for them on the second Sunday in each month, giving us the balance of his time.

Rev. James Thomas who was called as pastor of this church

in August of 1917, resigned the last of December of this year, after serving this church ably for more than twenty-two years. He was retiring from the ministry, having reached the age of retirement.

During his pastorate quite anumber of persons were received in the church by profession and certificate. A new piano was bought; anew communion service with individual glasses was provided, the old service was given to the Sandersville church; a new furnace was installed and the church building reroofed.

In February of this year Curry Davis, a seminary student was called to serve as pastor for one year. A revival was held in September, seven members were added to the church by profession. He was young and enthusiastic, the church building and manse were badly in need of repairs. He worked with the Auxiliary and created much interest among the church members, so all working together plans were made to repair these buildings. Quite abit of money was raised by contributions, but not enough

to complete this work. A loan was obtained and both buildings were repaired.

Mr. Davis, also, began an outpost mission. He resigned at the end of his year to accept a call to the Waynes-boro church.

1941- William T. Mulcay, another seminary student, was called to serve as pastor. He served more than two years. He continued the mission work at the outpost and created so much interest there that our Sunday School was greatly increased, as was the Vacation Bible school. He, also stimulated more interest in church attendance.

In May of 1942 Mr. E. A. Wingfield who was holding a note against the church, presented the canceled note, a gift of \$1250.00. to the church.

Mr. Mulcay resigned in May of 1943 because he and his wife were going as Missionaries to the Belgian Congo in Africa.

1943- Warren Thuston, still another seminary student, was called in July of this year to serve as pastor. He continues the mission work at the outpost.

EATONTON WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The first society for Woman's Work in the Eatonton Presbyterian

Church was organized in 1868 or '69 by Mrs. S. M. Young and was

called "The Ladies' Aid". Funds were raised by oyster suppers,

selling ice cream, etc. for repairing the church and buying a

manse; some money being sent from time to time to Foreign Missions.

This society continued its good work for a number of years, when it was merged into a missionary society with Mrs. S. M. Young as president. She continued in office until with advancing age, she could no longer engage in active work, then Mrs. J. M. Boone was elected president.

In 1892 a children's society was formed by Rev. W. T. Palmer, the pastor, with Miss Nona Young as president. He requested the women to disband their society and become honorary members of this society. This was done but continued only a few months, the woman's society being reorganized and the children's society disbanded, forming the Older and the Younger Woman's Societies.

The Augusta Presbyterial was organized here in 1900. The young woman's society joined the presbyterial soon after but the older society did not come in until some years later. These two societies were then merged into one and organized according to a circle plan, and was known as a Woman's Auxiliary. This auxiliary contributed to all causes of the church.

In 1906, again, a Young Woman's Society was organized by Mrs. J. S. Montgomery, wife of the pastor, who was president for several years. This was an active society, good work being done in both Foreign and Home Missions. During this time a new and commodious manse was built.

During this last year a Junior Auxiliary was organized of girls and boys. Mrs. I. H. Adams was leader of the girls circle and Mrs. James Thomas, wife of the pastor, was leader of the boys' circle.

In January of this year the two original circles were merged and became Circle No. 1, then a Younger Woman's Circle was organized, known as Circle No. 2. Much good work was done by both circles, much interest was shown in, and contributions made to the dearly loved church's benevolences and its schools. It was during this year that one of the auxiliary's goals was reached, when with the co-operation of the deacons, a new furnace was installed in the church.

In the early part of this year Mrs. E. A. The auxiliary was able to raise over five hundred dollars to contribute to this cause.

The old chandelier which originally used oil lamps, but later had been made into electric lamps, was restored to its original design and rewired, making a very beautiful lighting fixture.

A bronze memorial plaque was placed in the church vestibule. This is in memory of the departed members and officers of the church.

The auxiliary assisted the church in entertaining the Aug gusta Presbytery which held its fall meeting here.

A gift was presented Mr. Curry Davis, who had served as supply pastor for one year, and was resigning to accept a call to the Waynesboro Church.

1944- Mr. warren Thuston served as stated suppl pastor until he graduated from Columbia Seminary. He then accepted a call to a church in Spartanburg S. C. While he was here four members were added to our church: W. D. Stribling, III and Frank H. Spivey by profession and by letter, Mrs. R. R. Spivey and Mrs. Corinne B. Morris. He continued the work with the young people and aroused much interest.

In 1945 we lost by death two of our young men. Both were killed in action in World War II. W. Sidney Griffin who was in the Field Artillery of the famous Seventy-seventh Division was killed April 20th in the fight for Okinawa - the last big battle of this war. J. W. Poole who was in the Air Corps was killed in May of this same year. He went down in a plane crash over Burma.

1946- In March of this year Mr. George A. Anderson, a student of Columbia Seminary, was invited to serve as stated supply.

He was a real Bible student and a true servant of the Lord.

While he was here Mr. E. A. Wingfield and Mrs. Henry D.

Bizzell, Jr. were united with the church by profession.

The inside wall of the church were redecorated.

Mr. Anderson resigned in August of 1947 to accept a position as teacher of Bible in Presbyterian Collge, Clinton, S. C.

After Mr. Anderson resigned we were priviledged to have for three Sundays Rev. William T. Mulcay, a former supply pastor, who was on furlough from the mission fields of Belgian Congo, Africa. He brought us interesting and inspiring messages pertaining to his work on the mission fields. For the remainder of 1947 our pulpit was supplied by students from Columbia Seminary.

In January of 1948 Dr. E. R. Leyburn, a retired minister, came to supply for a few months. His sermons are real messages from God; inspiring and soul lifting.

Anderson, our stated supply pastor and wife, before they moved to Clinton, S. C. where Mr. Anderson had accepted a position as teacher of Bible in Presbyterian Collge.

For our mission study we studied "Committed Unto Me" with Dr. E. R. Leyburn, our stated supply who came to us in January of 1948, as teacher.

The Auxiliary furnished paint to redecorate the inside walls of the church.

All causes were contributed to by free will offerings.

Three hundred thirty-two dollars were contributed.

1950-51

Mr. R. A. Petrie continued as student pastor until April 1951, at which time he accepted a call to a church in Williston, Fla., having completed his studies at Columbia Seminary.

The interior of the manse was redecorated and a sink and hot water heater were installed in the kitchen. The Petries moved into the manse in early summer.
