Practical steps for saving money and shrinking your footprint

	Turn off lights and other electronics when not in use	
	Try using a power strip to turn off electronics to avoid "phantom drain"	
	Switch incandecent light bulbs to LEDs	
	<ul> <li>LEDs contain no mercury and save ~\$100 per bulb over their lifetime compared to incandescent lights</li> </ul>	
	Adjust your thermostat to match the weather	
	Change your HVAC air filters regularly	
	Wash clothes in cool water and dry outside if possible	
	<ul> <li>Clothes dryers can use as much power as a new refrigerator, dishwasher, and clothes washer combined</li> </ul>	
	Set hot water heater appropriately	
	<ul> <li>If your water can get too hot to hold your hand under, it's too hot</li> </ul>	
	Keep fridge & freezer clean and tightly sealed	
	<ul> <li>Keep your fridge between 28-42°F and your freezer between 0-5°F</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>If you can easily pull out a dollar bill shut in the door, replace the gasket</li> </ul>

	Install automatic/motion sensor lights & programmable thermostat	
	<ul> <li>Using a programmable thermostat can cut your energy bill by 20-30%</li> </ul>	
	Check your insulation and replace when needed	
	Invest in ENERGY STAR appliances	
	<ul> <li>Find products and rebate offers at energystar.gov</li> </ul>	
	Tell your local government that you support Community Choice Energy (CCE)	
	<ul> <li>Monterey Bay Community Power (mbcommunitypower.org) is the CCE for Monterey, San Benito, &amp; Santa Cruz</li> </ul>

	Install insulating windows where possible	
Ш	Invest in solar panels & energy storage systems	
	<ul> <li>Check out Property Assessed Clean Energy programs in your city or county for affordable financing options</li> </ul>

	Carpool, walk, bike, or take public transportation when possible	
	Drive more efficiently	
	<ul> <li>Avoid rapid starts and stops to decrease fuel use up to 40% and toxic emissions by up to 500%</li> </ul>	
	Keep your engine well maintained to boost fuel economy by up to 50%	
	<ul> <li>Try not to idle for more than one minute – turn off your engine instead (except in traffic)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Park in the shade when possible to minimuze fuel evaporation</li> </ul>

	Lobby your local elected officials to get more (and better!) public transportation options

	Water	
Easy		
	Shut off water when you aren't actively using it	
	Check toilets and sinks for slow leaks	
	Take shorter showers and showers instead of baths	
	Use dishwasher and washing machine only when full and limit hand washing	
	Use a home water filtration system instead of bottled water	
	Bottled water is up to 10,000x more expensive and is subject to fewer health regulations (and is often just tap water!)	
	If your tap water has a chlorine taste let it sit for an hour to allow the chlorine to evaporate, try a refillable water filtration pitcher, or look online for a local company to install an under-the-sink system like a reverse osmosis (RO) filter

	Promptly repair leaks	
	<ul> <li>A 1-drop-per-minute leak can add up to 2,700 gallons of water wasted in a year</li> </ul>	
	Install low-flow toilets, faucets, and shower heads	
	<ul> <li>Low-flow or duel flush toilets can cut water use by 40-50%</li> </ul>	
	Reduce outdoor water use with water efficient landscaping	
	<ul> <li>Using drought-tolerant plants, drip irrigation, and reclaimed water can give you a beautiful (and cheap!) eco-friendly landscape</li> </ul>	
	Switch to a front-loading washing machine instead of a top-loading one	
	Invest in a water-efficient dishwasher

	<ul> <li>Go paperless at home, church, and work as much as possible</li> </ul>	
	Vote with your wallet – shop responsibly!
