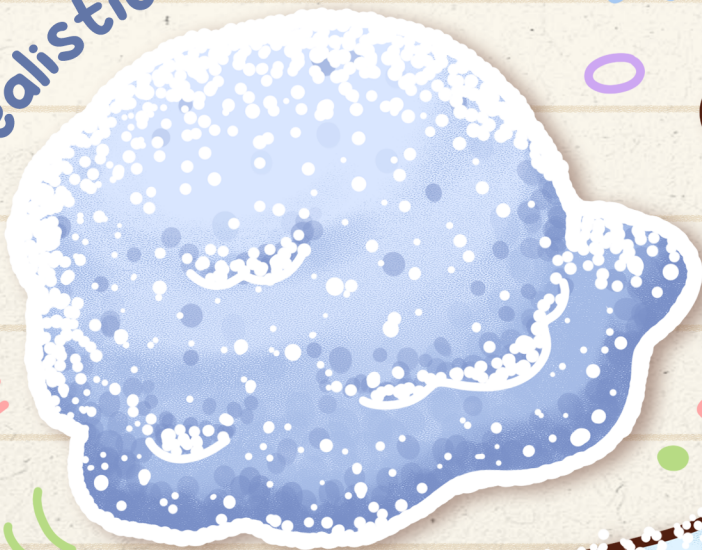

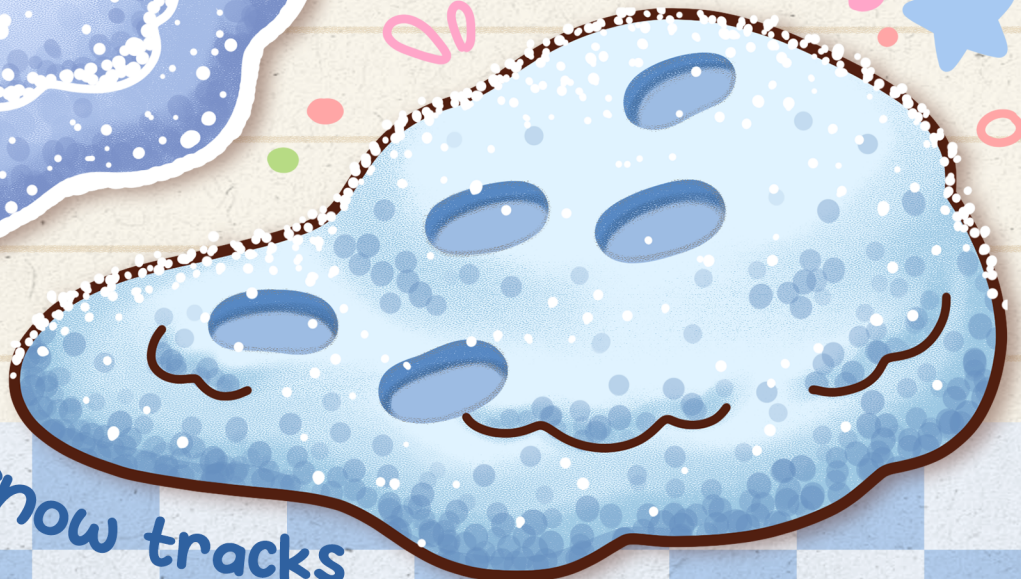

Classic Snow

Fill in the base with a light blue shade.

● B250



②

Draw random dots to add shadow using a darker blue shade.

● PB5



③

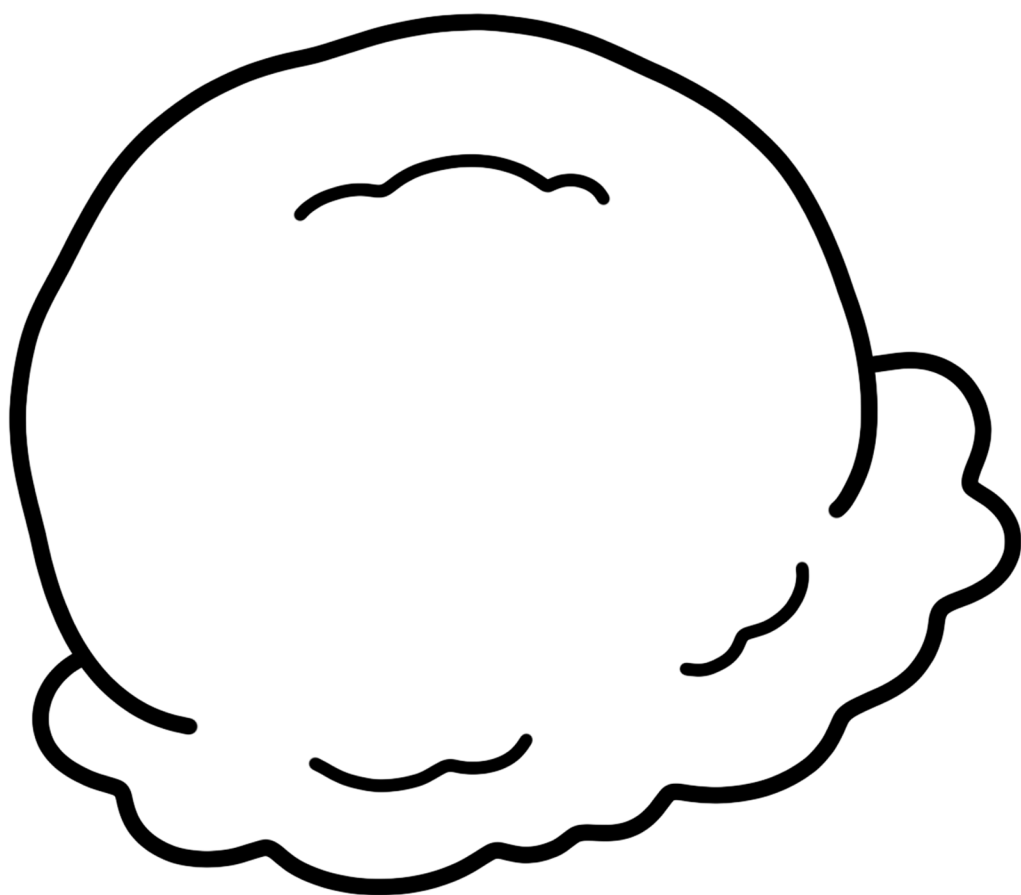
Repeat step 2 using an even darker blue shade. Draw random small dots using a white gel pen.

Add highlights with a white colored pencil or by smearing out a bit of acrylic paint.



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Glowing snow

● Y121



①

Start by adding a light yellow shade where you want the highlights to be.

● R080

Lightly add the pink shade using the dotting technique.

● B340



③

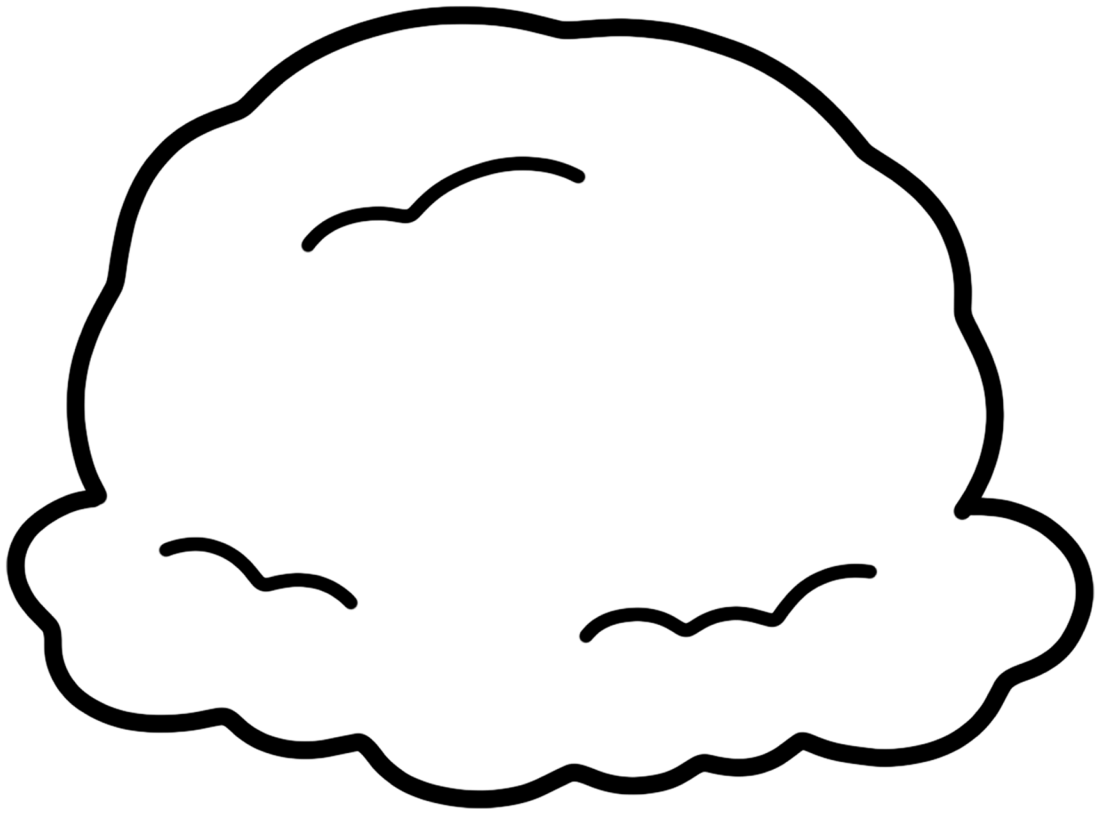
Repeat step 2 using a blue shade.

Finish with some snow sparkles on top.



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Realistic snow

Fill the base with a light blue, then add random darker blue dots for shadow.

● B530

Go in with another layer of random dots using an even darker blue shade.

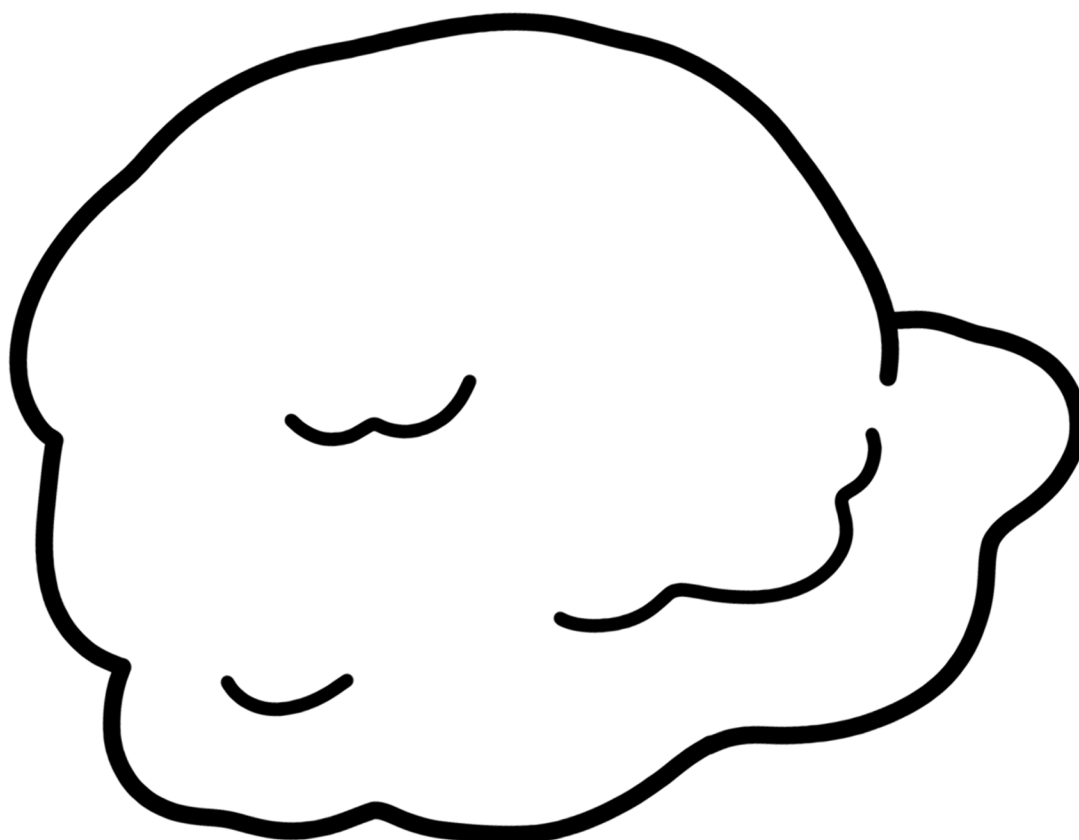
Outline the snow using a white acrylic marker.

Add lots of random dots using a white gel pen to create snowflakes.

Fill in the footprints using a dark blue shade.

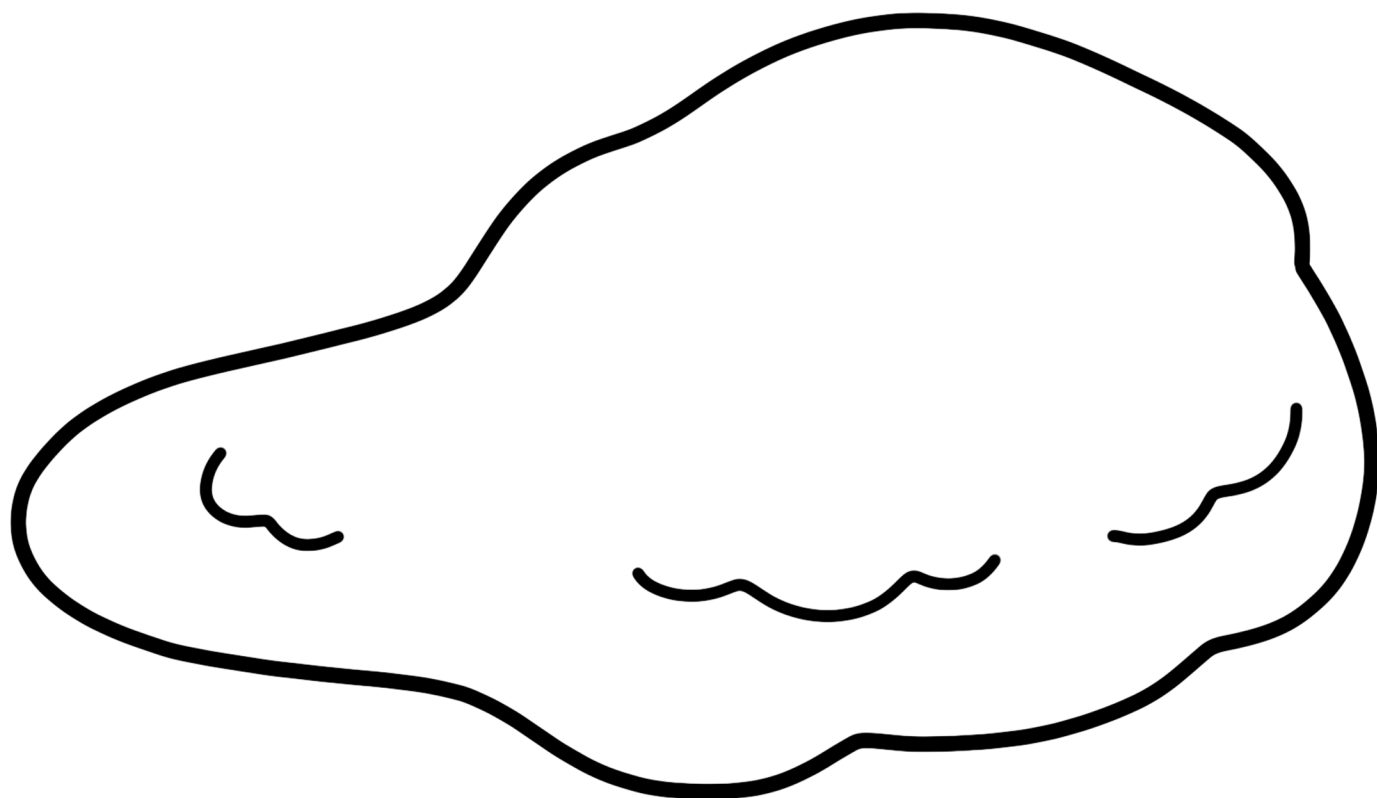
