4-H General Rules, Herdsmanship, Fitting & Showmanship

4-H ANIMAL SCIENCE GENERAL RULES

1. READ [GENERAL RULES](#) AND 4-H RULES
2. READ [Washington State 4-H Policies](#). The WSU 4-H Youth Development Program Policy provides a consistent framework for 4-H programs throughout the state. The WSU 4-H Youth Development Policy is a guide for the management of these 4-H programs in Washington State. Policy is created to ensure that 4-H programming is consistent, fair, and legal. The most current copy of the 4-H policy can be found on the WSU 4-H Youth Development Program website under member resources (<https://extension.wsu.edu/4h>). All WSU Extension faculty, staff, Certified 4-H Volunteer, parents, and youth must adhere to these policies. Policies of the local 4-H county office and local 4-H Council will not contradict, violate, or supersede the WSU 4-H Youth Development Program or National 4-H policies.
3. All exhibits, including animal entries, must be submitted through the [Fair Entry](#) online system. All animal entries are due **July 1**, via the online [Fair Entry](#) system. All 4-H project animals must be entered in [4HOnline](#) **FIRST** before starting fair entries using the online [Fair Entry](#) system.
4. All 4-H exhibitors who show animals must show their own 4-H project animals (those entered in [4HOnline](#)) in both Showmanship/Fitting & Showing and type (or companion/performance/obedience classes) to receive premiums and awards. Requests to use another animal, due to health or safety concerns, must be submitted to the 4-H project superintendent. Only the 4-H project superintendent, in partnership with 4-H staff, may approve animal substitutions. Two 4-H members may share project animals as long as State 4-H Policy is 8.5 is followed.
5. 4-H member animals shown in both 4-H and Open Class must be housed in designated 4-H areas.
6. Animal shown at Thurston County Fair must be the same for Washington State Fair Fitting and Showing.
7. Total animals per exhibitor may be limited depending on available space.
8. Blankets are to remain off animals between 10am and 10pm. See your Superintendent for exceptions.
9. 4-H members may not exhibit the same entry in FFA and/or open class except as designated in General Rules under 4-H and FFA only.
10. Each exhibitor must allow his/her animal or animals to be used in judging contest or forfeit his/her premiums.
11. All livestock judging participants will attend contestant's meeting prior to contest.
12. Market steers must be polled or dehorned. No dairy cattle animals with horns are permitted except in the Junior Heifer Calf class.
13. Showing Horned Goats: Horned, non-dairy goats or sheep may be exhibited in 4-H showmanship and type classes where animals are not exchanged between youth in the show ring. For a horned animal to be exhibited it must have its horn tips covered. See State 4-H Policy 8.7. Horn tips must be covered for the entire time the animal is on the fairgrounds (haul-in, on exhibit, when showing, and during haul-out). If the sheep or non-dairy goat has scurs (horn re-growth), these scurs cannot exceed 1" in length without the horn tips being covered. Non-dairy horned goats and sheep may be shown in market and breeding classes, but they must have horn tips covered as a safety precaution. No horned dairy goat animals are allowed. No horned animals allowed in market sale.
14. We encourage parents/guardians to be active participants in their child's 4-H experience. However, the 4-H project animal is the 4-H member's responsibility. The 4-H member is responsible for the care, handling, and fitting of the 4-H project animal. Parents/guardians and other adults should refrain from doing the 4-H project work for the child. Young and/or novice 4-H members may ask for assistance from an older 4-H member if help is needed.

Public opinion regarding the quality of care given to animals has become most critical and needs to be considered. The purpose and guiding principles of herdsmanship are for exhibitors in the 4-H program to care for their livestock, pens, and equipment properly; ensure safety; and keep stalls, surrounding areas, and animals clean and attractive at all times. Educational displays and public relations are important components of herdsmanship.

RULES

1. Exhibiting 4-H members are to perform their own herdsmanship chores. Herdsmanship done by non-exhibitors can result in forfeit of all awards and premiums by the exhibitor(s) involved.
2. Exhibitors may perform herdsmanship as individual clubs or several clubs together (such as whole project barn duty).
3. All animal superintendents will notify the herdsmanship superintendent of specific barn rules and schedules.
4. Herdsmanship superintendents will examine and judge animal displays daily, between the hours of 10am and 8pm. At least one youth 4-H member and two adults must be on duty during these hours. One of the adults must be an officially enrolled 4-H volunteer. Between 8pm and Fair closing each evening, older members and adults must be on duty with exhibits to answer questions from the general public.
5. 4-H herdsman and adults on duty must be identified in an obvious fashion.
6. Daily evaluations will be posted.
7. The following criteria will be used to establish a base for evaluation of all animal displays and their herdsman.
 - A. EXHIBITORS: Appearance, Attitude, Courtesy, Conduct, Skill and Identification as a 4-H'er. Exhibitor must be properly attired. Boots or sturdy shoes must be worn when on herdsmanship duty.
 - B. ANIMALS: Arrangements, Cleanliness, Grooming, Bedding and Regularity of Feeding and Watering. Proper and safe techniques must be used to keep animals from getting loose. All beef and dairy must be double tied.
 - C. STALLS, CAGES, PENS: Should always be free of manure. They should be cleaned, and new bedding applied as needed. Stall cards will be visible and readable.
 - D. ALLEYS AND GROOMING AREAS: Kept free of manure, cleaned and swept. All equipment must be stored safely and used in a safe manner.
 - E. TACK AREA: Swept, Supplies, Feed and Buckets kept orderly and clean.
 - F. OVERALL DISPLAY: An additional score will be given reflecting the evaluator's overall impression of the entire display.
8. All animal exhibitors will participate in Herdsmanship. Parents of exhibitors will be asked to serve as "adult in charge". All adults who will be assisting as "adult in charge" are required to be a WSU Certified Volunteer or submit a WSU Volunteer Application to the 4-H Office by July 1.

Fitting & Showmanship:

- The definition of a *showman* in the Merriam-Webster dictionary is a person having a special skill for presenting something in a dramatic way. Showmanship is the skill or ability of a showman, so when we think about understanding the basics of showmanship when showing animals, we must think about the person doing the showing.
- Showmanship is about the person handling the animal, presenting and showing the animal to the best of a person's ability. It is about making sure the showman is always looking at the judge. Showmanship is about how hard a person has worked, prepared, and presented their animal to the judge.
- Judges may be looking at your animals to evaluate them, but in showmanship, they are evaluating the showman and how he or she is working with their animal and handling themselves. Showmanship is about teamwork, an

important life skill, where the youth and animal learn to work together and demonstrate their hard work for a judge.

- Here are some important things to know about showmanship:
 - Parts of the animal. During showmanship, many judges will ask participants about different body parts. A showman should know their animal and where the different body parts are. Younger youth should learn the basics, but older youth should know all the parts. Before a show, practice identifying all the body parts.
 - Position of the animal. The judge wants to see the animal, so, during showmanship, the judge should always see you and the animal. Each species has different ways of being presented for the judge, so know how to position your species for the show. Most of the time, you want to keep the animal between you and the judge.
 - Keep an eye on the judge. One of the most important things in showmanship is knowing where the judge is and always keeping an eye on them. If the judge signals you to do something or tells you to stop, it is important to be paying attention.

4-H Cats Department Rules:

1. Equipment required - H style harness, leash, approved cat carrier, cat first-aid kit, and cat grooming kit and cooling equipment (fan/cooling pad).
2. Member must attend a minimum of 50% of all club meetings from date of enrollment to be eligible to participate in the Thurston County Fair.
3. Exhibitor must provide an educational poster about their project animal. Posters may be entered under Educational Displays.
4. Cats must be kept in a show cage except when being shown unless permission is given by Superintendent. Cats must be harnessed and leashed at all times.
5. Health Requirements:
 - a. Each cat must have been vaccinated against rabies with an approved vaccine within 12 months as per label directions. The 3-year rabies vaccine will be accepted as per the label instructions. **Exhibitors must present proof of current rabies vaccination by a licensed veterinarian during vet check.**
 - b. Cats should be vaccinated against feline panleukopenia, rhinotracheitis, calicivirus and leukemia **viruses** and chlamydia, based on their local veterinarian's recommendation.
 - c. Cats must be free of fleas, lice, ticks, ear mites and come to fair in show condition.
6. Cats must be inspected and deemed healthy by the fair vet at the scheduled time on the first day at county fair.
7. A litterbox with litter is required for each cage. Cleaning of the litterbox is individual exhibitor's responsibility. A reasonable effort shall be made to ensure litterboxes are kept clean and free from waste during the fair.
8. Food and water dishes are required for each cage. Food will be provided and maintained by the exhibitor. Exhibitors on herdsman duty may refill water unless prohibited by individual cat exhibitor.

9. Cloverbud & Junior exhibitors may enter only one cat. Intermediate and Senior exhibitors may enter two cats if space is available. Each cat will be placed in its own cage.
10. Pregnant and nursing cats are not eligible for entry in the fair.
11. EM 4810E (the "4-H Cat Fitting and Showmanship Guide") will be used as a guide for cat fitting & showmanship
12. Care, training and grooming of the cat is the responsibility of the 4-H member.
13. Cage and display decorations must be in place by 9pm the Wednesday before the fair begins, unless prior approval is granted by superintendent, and will be set up for entire fair.
14. Cage decoration and costume must be completed and designed by the 4-H member. No premium points will be awarded for decorations or costumes.
15. Cage curtains, are required and must cover the two sides, back, and top of the benching cage. Material may be used to frame the front of cages but should not block cats from view.
16. 4-H members are expected to present a clean, and neat appearance, adhering to 4-H dress code at all times.
17. Members must wear an apron and members/adults must wear identification of project while on duty. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure someone is on duty at all times when cats are on display.
18. Parents of exhibitors will be required to participate with a 4-H member on herdsmanship, unless prior arrangements have been made with Superintendent. Expected Herdsmanship hours are 10am-9pm on Thursday; 10am-10pm Friday and Saturday; and 10am-7pm on Sunday.
19. Exhibiting 4-H members must perform their own Herdsmanship chores. Herdsmanship done by non-exhibitors can result in forfeiture of all awards and premiums from the exhibitor(s) involved.
20. All clubs and individual exhibitors will be entered in and judged for Herdsmanship. See [Herdsmanship Contest Rules](#).
21. 4-H members are encouraged to participate in the Judging Contest. See [Judging Contest Rules](#).
22. 4-H members are required to stay through post-fair Peterson Barn clean-up until dismissed by the superintendent.
23. It is the responsibility of each member to keep the tack area behind the Peterson Barn clean and neat at all times.

4-H Dog Department Rules:

WA State 4-H Dog Program Policies will be followed, along with the following:

1. Care and training of project animals must be the responsibility of the member. A member may enter a maximum of two project dogs in all Qualifying/Fair events each year. Members may carry more than one dog as a project but must keep records on each. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age to enter.
2. Dogs should be crated or benched at all times except for when they are being shown, exercised, or by permission of the superintendent(s) or club leader(s). Dogs are at no time to be on the Fairgrounds except going to or leaving the benched area. Dogs are not allowed in exhibit buildings, concession area or restrooms.
3. All dogs will be benched or crated by 9:30 am Thursday through Sunday. Dogs will be released Wed. through Sat. at 8pm (EXCEPT for those dogs assigned to participate in the 8 - 10pm exhibit time). The Dog Project will provide live dog exhibits or demonstrations during the official hours of the fair until 7pm on Sunday. Those who do not comply with these times, except in an emergency approved by the superintendent(s), will forfeit all premium awards, and ribbons. Prior arrangements must be made for Equipment - six foot lead (leather or nylon) and a training collar (chain or nylon). Dogs must be crated with leather/nylon buckle. Dogs without proper benching equipment or that cannot be crated without causing a problem with other members and dogs will be excused from the Fairgrounds.
4. Dog should be clean and groomed. Handlers must abide by the current Washington State 4-H Dog Project dress code. Club uniforms are not allowed during competition, with the exception of team competition.
5. Rabies Vaccination Certificate - Each animal entered must show proof of Rabies vaccination. A veterinarian signed certificate of Rabies Vaccination must be provided either on paper or a digital copy. All dogs must be in good health and free of FLEAS, LICE, TICKS, and EAR MITES.
6. Member shall attend at least 50% of all club meetings from date of enrollment to be eligible to go to fair. This will be evaluated May 1 and again prior to fair. Individual clubs may have stricter requirements.
7. At the discretion of the superintendent(s) any dog causing problems will be disqualified and excused from the fairgrounds. No head-collars, muzzles, or pronged spiked collars.
8. All clubs and single exhibitors will be entered in and judged for Herdsmanship. Herdsmanship Contest Rules will be followed. Individual clubs may have stricter requirements.
9. Champion and Reserve ribbons will only be awarded to blue ribbon winners. A Champion may be given when a minimum of 2 blue ribbon contestants are present or at the judge's discretion.
10. Participation in Showmanship and Obedience at the Thurston County Fair are required in order to be eligible to qualify for State, regardless of participation at State Qualifying Events.
11. All members must read and sign the Thurston County Dog Project Membership Agreement.

SHOWMANSHIP RULES:						

Showmanship classes will be conducted in accordance with the Washington State Guide to Showmanship. To be eligible to qualify for State Fair in showmanship, any dog entered in showmanship must be entered in an obedience class at the Thurston County Fair.

Showmanship will be divided into 4 lots:

- Cloverbud
- Junior
- Intermediate
- Senior

Each lot (except Cloverbud) will be divided further into sub lots;

a. **First Year**

First Year sub lot is open to all first year members and/or first year participating in 4-H dog performance classes. First year Junior exhibitors who were previously in the Cloverbud class will also be eligible to show in the first year sub lot. All first year members/exhibitors may stay in this lot during their first year, regardless of their wins. Members, who place first at a qualifying match, within their first year, have the option to move up into the standard sub lot "b" immediately or wait until the next 4-H year. First Year members that have moved up voluntarily to the standard sub lot, however, will not be eligible for Specials until their second year.

b. **Standard**

Standard sub lot is open to all 4-H dog members. A member who wins first place at a State Qualifying Match or county fair will NOT be required to move into Specials until the next 4-H year unless they choose.

c. **Specials**

Specials sub lot shall be composed of:

1. Members who receive Champion or Reserve Champion in the standard sub lot "b" at the prior year's county fair. Wins at a State Qualifying Match, other than county fair, do not apply.
2. Members who qualified for the State Championship Weekend in Showmanship at the prior year's state fair.
3. Members who have achieved Open Showmanship status in the American Kennel Club or like organization, regardless of their wins or lack thereof in 4-H.
4. Additional state qualifying events may be offered prior to the fair. Contact the 4-H Dog Superintendent for more details.

Note: When a member moves into the next age level, he or she will return to sub lot "b" for Showmanship competition unless item 3 applies to him or her.

OBEDIENCE RULES:

In addition to those represented in the WA State 4-H Dog Program Policies

1. The classes are based on the ability of the dog. Member, leader, and superintendent(s) must decide on which class to enter according to level of training.
2. Introductory Obedience will be offered to Cloverbuds and first year members. First year junior exhibitors who were previously in the Cloverbud class will also be eligible to show in the Introductory Obedience class. Introductory Obedience is not a state qualifying class and will be the only obedience class offered to Cloverbud exhibitors.
3. All blue ribbon winners at COUNTY QUALIFIER(S), COUNTY FAIR, OR STATE FAIR of the previous year(s) must go on to the next class. Utility, Versatility, and Veterans/Modified, may repeat their class.
4. Each member and dog who does not receive a blue ribbon, as specified in Obedience Rules #3, may stay at the same level of obedience for 3 years; additional years must have prior approval from the general club leader and the superintendent.
5. Class advancement shall be completed in accordance with the Standardized Thurston County Progression Chart. Members who wish to exhibit in another obedience class who have not met the requirements set forth in Obedience Rules #3 or #4 must receive parent, leader, and superintendent approval.
6. To enter the Versatility class, the dog must have qualified in Utility.
7. To enter Veterans/Modified class the dog must be 7 years or over or have some physical problem that prevents it from jumping and/or retrieving. Dogs under 7 years of age must have a note from their veterinarian.
8. Team to consist of 4 members and 4 dogs. Brace to consist of 2 dogs, both need not be handler's dog. Teams and Brace are not required to be from the same club. Teams and Brace will perform at the level of the dog entered at the lowest level.
9. Additional state qualifying events may be offered prior to the fair. Contact the 4-H Dog Superintendent for more details.

RALLY RULES:

In addition to those represented in the Washington State Guide to Rally

1. Currently Rally Obedience is not a State Qualifying event.
2. The classes are based on the ability of the dog. Member, leader, and superintendent(s) must decide on which class to enter according to level of training.
3. Members participating in the Introductory, Sub-Novice, Pre-Novice and Beginner Novice obedience classes shall

compete in the Beginner Rally Class. All other classes shall compete in the Advance Rally (off leash) class.

4. Each member and dog who does not receive a blue ribbon, as specified in Rally Rules #3, may stay at the same level of rally for 3 years; additional years must have prior approval from the general club leader and the superintendent.
5. Members who wish to advance to another Rally class who have not met the requirements set forth in Rally Rules #3 or #4, must receive parent, leader, and superintendent approval.

AGILITY RULES:

In addition to those represented in the Washington State 4H Agility Rules

1. In order to be eligible to qualify for State Fair, any dog entered in Agility must also be entered in a regular Obedience class at Fair.
2. The classes are based on the ability of the dog. Member, leader, and superintendent(s) must decide on which class to enter according to level of training.
3. All blue ribbon winners at COUNTY QUALIFIER(S), COUNTY FAIR, OR STATE FAIR of the previous year(s) must go on to the next class. Standard Excellent and Jumpers Excellent may repeat their class.
4. Each member and dog who does not receive a blue ribbon, as specified in Agility Rules #3, may stay at the same level of agility for 3 years; additional years must have prior approval from the general club leader and the superintendent.
5. Members who wish to advance to another agility class who have not met the requirements set forth in Agility Rules #3 or #4, must receive parent, leader and superintendent approval.
6. For health and safety purposes, any dog entered in the Veterans/Modified Obedience class must provide the written consent of a veterinarian in order to participate in agility classes.
Clover buds will not be eligible to compete in 4-H agility.
7. Additional state qualifying events may be offered prior to the fair. Contact the 4-H Dog Superintendent for more details.
8. All members must read and sign the Thurston County Dog 4-H Agility Agreement.

Pocket Pet Department Rules:

(Pet rats, hamsters, gerbils, mice, reptiles, birds, and exotics)

1. Animals entered in this class will be exhibited in the Peterson Barn and/or 4-H Still Life Building, Sharp Building depending on the environmental needs of the animal.
2. Exhibitors will provide their own escape-proof cages, aquariums, or containers for animals being exhibited.
3. Each exhibit must provide an educational poster about their project animal. Posters may be entered under Educational Displays.
4. Fair spectators are not allowed to handle the animals in this division. Animals will be handled by exhibitors only as necessary to care for the animals and to participate in fitting & showing.
5. Cages and pens should always be free of manure. They should be cleaned out daily, before the fair opens at 10am, and new bedding applied. The area around the cages will be kept free of manure and bedding, cleaned and swept. All equipment must be stored safely and used in a safe manner.

6. Each 4-H member exhibiting in this class will be responsible for herdsmanhip shifts in the building/barn where their animal is housed. These shifts will be scheduled by the Superintendent in charge of the building/barn housing the animals.
7. Superintendent reserves the right to limit small animal entries to one exhibit per youth if necessary due to space constraints.
8. Youth must be enrolled in the 4-H Self-Determined Animal Project, Explore the World of Small Animals, or Pets Project by April 15 to exhibit in the Small Animal Division.

4-H Rabbit Department Rules:

1. All exhibitors are responsible for feeding and cleaning cages of animals each day of the Fair.
2. All entries must be permanently tattooed in the left ear prior to the Fair.
3. All rabbits are to be shown by breed or in pet class (except meat animals). Specify variety on entry form. The same animal MAY NOT be entered in type and meat or Market Sale Class.
4. All exhibitors and parents must sign up for Herdsmanship duty (hours to be determined by the Superintendent). Please see the Exhibitor's guide for Herdsmanship rules
5. Suitable water and feed containers must be presented by the exhibitor at the vet check prior to the animal being allowed to enter a cage.
6. Only crocks (plastic or ceramic) of adequate size will be allowed. Crocks must hold two (2) cups of water. No water bottles except for wool breeds. Carry cages may NOT be left at Fair. Exhibitor is responsible for their own feed.
7. No rabbits under 10 weeks (except fryers) will be allowed. Rabbits must also make minimum breed weights. Refer to ARBA Standard of Perfection.
8. Angora wool is to be entered under Division O – Fleece & Fiber, Class 1, lot I – Angora Rabbit. Refer to ARBA Standard of Perfection.
9. Animal Limit - rabbit exhibitors are limited to 20 exhibits in the animal type/breed conformation classes. Cloverbuds are limited to two (2) animals. Superintendent may further limit entries based on space.
10. The ARBA standard of Perfection will be used for all judging and entering purposes. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that rabbits are entered into the correct breed, variety, and class. No changes to breed, variety, or class will be accepted after vet check.
11. All animals will be required to go through a vet check. Animals should be in show condition. Any animal found with any external parasites or other diseases or illnesses will not be allowed entry to the fair. The veterinarian's decision is final.
12. All animals need to be entered into [4HOnline](#). A 4-H Rabbit and Cavy Certificate must also be submitted to the 4-H Office on or before June 15 of the current 4-H year to assist with animal entry.

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4-H & Open Youth Poultry Department Rules:

1. All poultry must pass through a vet check between 4 pm-8 pm Wednesday, the day before the Fair opens and not be removed before 7 pm Sunday, closing day of the fair.
2. All poultry must pass a disease and parasite inspection upon arrival and during the Fair. Be sure to dust poultry before entering them. **Caution** - Market poultry (TCYMAS auction participants) need to follow label on poultry dust products when treating animals intended for human consumption (make note of any withdrawal times). Poultry having lice, showing signs of sickness or are excessively dirty will be refused entry by the superintendent and/or vet.
3. Poultry will be identified by a leg band on each bird. Leg bands will be provided at vet check/haul-in if youth does not have a leg band(s).
4. All birds must have any state mandated blood test(s) prior to fair. Proper paperwork must come with bird (receipts or certificates). Due to young age, market birds may be exempt from blood tests. Youth to follow Poultry Superintendent instructions regarding any WSDA avian health mandates to be eligible for fair exhibit.
5. No late entries will be accepted.
6. Fowl will be exhibited in cages provided by the fair. Entries are subject to space availability. Feed and shavings will be provided for all entries during the course of the fair. Exhibitors are responsible for providing their own feed if a specific brand/type is required.
7. Exhibitors may be limited on entries by the Superintendent depending on space available.
8. Cloverbuds may enter no more two (2) animals.
9. Transportation cages shall be removed from the fairgrounds between time of check-in/vet check and the removal of the exhibits.
10. Birds shown in a trio or pen cannot be shown as individuals.
11. A trio is two females and one male; a pair is one male and one female. All birds must be of the same breed and variety.
12. A pen is three birds of the same sex, age, breed, and variety.
13. The words "old", "hen", and "cock" mean birds over one year of age. The words "young", "pullet", and "cockerel" mean birds under one year of age.
14. All birds exhibited must show maturity and be completely feathered.
15. The judge may consider an entry not worthy of an award. All judges' decisions are final.
16. All entries will be classified by breed and variety recognized by the American Poultry Association (APA) Standard of Perfection except for crossbreed classes and market TCYMAS classes. Crossbreeds will be judged on appearance, condition, and cleanliness. TCYMAS auction market poultry will be judged for meat type.
17. All exhibitors will be required to perform assigned barn duty or premium money will be withheld. The number of shifts required will be determined by the number of participants.
18. There will be no cross-exhibiting between 4-H, FFA, and Open Poultry.
19. Cloverbud exhibitors must always have a parent present.
20. All animals need to be entered into [4HOnline](#). A 4-H Poultry Certificate must also be submitted to the 4-H Office on or before June 15 of the current 4-H year to assist with animal entry
21. Poultry themed Arts & Crafts may be entered under Division U - Expressive Arts.
22. All exhibitors must participate in Fitting and Showing/Showmanship to receive premiums earned on exhibits.

23. All exhibitors will be responsible for cleaning their own cages, feeding, and watering their own birds DAILY before 10:00 a.m. Market Chickens/Fryer Pens must be checked regularly throughout the day and their shavings changed out completely (shavings removed and new shavings added) twice a day (morning and again in the afternoon/early evening) to avoid a build-up of droppings and to keep the birds clean.

24. All poultry should be properly groomed prior to check in. No whole-body bathing will be allowed on fairgrounds.

1. Horn policy will follow [Washington State 4-H Policy](#). Goats with horns are allowed except in Dairy classes and Market Sale. **Horn tips must be covered with horn guards at all times.** Horn scurs less than 1/2 inch in length may be permitted at the discretion of the Market Sale Committee Chair.
2. Goats may be clipped at Fair - but this must be done in a supervised "fitting" area only.
3. Tentative stall and/or pen assignments will be made based on the number of entries. All animals need to be entered into [4HOnline](#). Final stall and/or pen assignments will be made by the superintendent by 2pm Wednesday, entry day of the Fair. Limitations of two (2) animals per lot will be allowed. However, the superintendent has the authority to limit the total number of goat project animals that a 4-H member may bring to Fair.
4. For the animal's safety, no netting style hay sacks will be allowed in the goat pens.
5. The Goat Superintendent has the authority to request that the Fair Veterinarian examine a goat. The veterinarian will refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of a communicable disease. Any cost of vet care is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
6. Milk-out times will be directed by superintendent.
7. Only dairy animals that obviously do not conform to any breed by appearance will be entered in the Crossbreed Class. Final decision as to class will be the decision of the superintendent.
8. The superintendent may combine classes if there are not enough entries to make a competitive class.
9. Cloverbud exhibitor for pygmy or miniature goats may only enter one (1) animal.
10. All exhibitors will participate in herdsmanhip. Parents of exhibitors will be asked to serve as adult in charge of herdsmanhip.
11. Regarding all pack goat project goats, any pack goat shown, regardless of age, must have done at least 5 miles of hiking with the exhibitor during the current 4-H year in order to show at the fair.
12. All exhibitors are expected to attend all four fair days.
13. If there are concerns or questions, please refer to the 4-H Resolution Procedure.
14. Round Robin participants from the Goat Department will be chosen as follows: A) The Champion and Reserve Champion of Int. & Sr. Pygmy Showmanship will participate in Small Animal Round Robin. B) The Champions from Int. & Sr. Dairy, Utility Pack, Utility Draft, Meat, Fleece, and Pet Showmanship will participate in a Champion Run-Off. If a Champion chooses to not compete, (or to represent another class) the Reserve Champion from that class will compete in their place. In no case will a 3rd place showman go to the Run-Off. The top 2 showman from the Run-Off will participate in Large Animal Round Robin.
15. Companion goats for display only if space allows.
16. Exhibitors participating in the Market Sale are required to participate in pre-event staging for at least 2 hours prior to and 30 minutes after the Market Sale event.

17. Only goats awarded blue ribbons in Class 895 (Market Sale Goat Type) will be eligible to participate in the Market Sale.
18. No Goat may be cross entered in more than 1 Class each of Fitting & Showing and Type (exception: Dam & Daughter).
19. Dam & Daughter is limited to 1 entry in dairy and 1 entry in pygmy per exhibitor. State Fair does not offer a Dam & Daughter lot.

Dapper Sheep Crew Contest Class 625

When: Saturday, 11 am in the West Arena. No premium points

Purpose: The purpose of this contest is to provide 4-H and FFA members an opportunity to have fun and demonstrate their ability to work together in a safe and humane manner to groom and prepare a sheep for show.

Eligibility: This contest is open to all 4-H and FFA Sheep show persons. The crew will be composed of a combination of three 4-H and FFA project members: i.e., 2 4-H and 1 FFA; 2 FFA and 1 4-H.

General Rules:

Each crew will be provided a sheep and all grooming equipment and supplies:

- Sheep stand
- 2 Hand shears (1 large, 1 small)
- 2 Wool Cards
- 1 Soft bristle brush
- 1 Hard bristle brush
- Groom rags—dry, with no grooming aids added
- 1 Gallon of water and a Bucket—no other water is allowed
- Hoof trimmers
- Halter

Not Allowed:

- Electric equipment (electric shears, blowers, etc.)
- Commercial products (soap, hoof black/Sharpie marker, whiteners, etc.)
- Razor blades or any items containing any type of razor blade
- Scissors
- Spray containers

Procedures:

1. Register crew. (At time of written quiz).
2. One crew member will complete a written quiz prior to beginning of the arena event. Resources for questions will be all be in Cooperative Extension publications: EM3125 4-H Member Manual Advanced Livestock Science; PNW 679 Judging Sheep and Oral Reasons 101; K-State publication Market Lamb Showmanship from Start to Finish.
3. Thirty (30) minutes will be allowed for grooming the sheep.
4. Following grooming, crew members will have 15 minutes to practice showing the sheep. All members may assist, but only one will be selected by the team to do the final showing.
5. The second member will do final showing.

6. The third member will judge the class and conduct oral reasons for the Judges based on the class. The class will consist of market lambs or breeding ewes (age for breeding ewes is dependent on availability).

Basis of Judging:

1. Grooming: 15 points possible points
Awarded on the method the crew demonstrated to clean and prepare the sheep for show. Use tools correctly.
2. Teamwork: 15 points possible
Teamwork points are based on how well the crew is organized for each member to have their own task to perform, if all participate equally, and if total job is finished in the allotted time.
 - Be well organized. Each crew member should have their own tasks.
 - Space out to work.
 - Be pleasant to fellow crew members.
 - Behavior and appearance that shows pride and respect for yourself and your organizations (4-H and FFA) is expected of all exhibitors. Courteous, appropriate language and clean appropriate clothing is part of your exhibiting responsibility.
 - Do not talk with friends or parents in audience or other teams. Excessive talking outside a crew may be marked down.
3. Safety: 10 points possible
Points awarded for properly following the rules of safety for working around a sheep.
 - All members of the crew must wear closed toe shoes.
 - Never leave the sheep unattended on the stand.
 - Safe handling of grooming equipment (hand shears, cards, hoof trimmers, etc.)
 - Any abuse or harsh treatment of the sheep will result in disqualification of the crew.
4. Written Questions: 20 points possible
Resources for questions: See item 2—Procedures.
One crew member is judged on personal appearance and ability to answer written questions. Types of written questions will be about breeds, cuts of meat, wool characteristics and health.
5. Showmanship: 20 points possible
One crew member is judged on personal appearance and ability to present the sheep their squad has fitted. Will be conducted as an actual showmanship class.
6. Judging: 20 points possible
One crew member is judged on personal appearance and their ability to present to the Judge oral reasons based on a market or breeding ewe class.
Each crew member will receive the ribbons earned by the team.

Alpacas /Llamas Department Rules:

1. Any llama or alpaca unmanageable by exhibiting member will be sent home.
2. Any llama or alpaca showing extreme signs of stress will be sent home.
3. No tranquilizers will be allowed.
4. An exercise area will be assigned for llamas and alpaca. Llamas and alpaca will not be allowed in other areas of the Fairgrounds without special permission from the 4-H Llama and Alpaca Superintendent.
5. Llamas and alpacas must be attended by their exhibitors every day of the Fair.

6. 4-H members may pre-arrange with a Thurston County llama or alpaca rancher to help on their ranch to be able to exhibit a llama or alpaca from that ranch. Arrangements must be made by May 1st.
7. Llamas and alpacas may be used by members of the same family as long as each child is in a different age group.
8. Members may receive premiums in three (3) classes only, one of which must be Fitting & Showing.
9. Eligible llamas and alpacas: Intact males up to 24 months of age, geldings, and females.
10. Llamas and alpacas of any age may compete in any class except packing. Llamas and alpacas younger than 12 months may use a Day Pack with no more than 2 lbs. per side.

3. Judge will separate steers by grade in the ring.
4. All animals will be lined up in the show ring by age and judged accordingly.
5. Steers may be split by weight per judge's discretion.
6. Club Herd: Limit one club herd per club.
7. All animal exhibitors will participate in Herdsmanship.
8. No animals with horns; no scurs over one inch long.

9. Showmanship will be "blow and go" (no "fitting", just showmanship) Guidelines for Blow and Go Shows:
- Animals may be clipped, blown, brushed or combed to enhance their appearance. Grooming of Livestock:
 - Animals will be shown free of any adhesive, glue, paint, or powder products.
 - Any compounds that have adhesive qualities that when applied cannot be combed or brushed through or alter the color of the animal are forbidden. These products include, but are not limited, to commonly used adhesives and colorants such as Prime Time, EZ Comb, Tail Adhesive, Ultra White Touch Up, Black Touch Up, Black Finisher and black show foam.
 - Alcohol, water, oil, foam or any water- or alcohol-based products with no adhesive or glue qualities, or artificial colorings are permitted. These products include conditioner and commonly used sprays such as Kleen Sheen, Revive, Final Bloom and white show foam. Paint will be allowed on the hooves and dewclaws only.

4-H Horse Department Rules:

1. Only members enrolled in 4-H Horse projects are eligible to exhibit in this division.
2. Jan. 1st will be considered the birth date of all horses.
3. Age of 4-H members: see 4-H General Rules. Note: 4-H'ers must have reached their 8th birthday by October 1st of current 4-H year to exhibit at the Fair. Cloverbuds may judge, give public presentations, assist in herdsmanship enter record book, participate in horse bowl or enter an educational display. Cloverbuds may assist with herdsmanship (water flowers, rake sawdust, etc.) as long as they do not have hands-on contact with horses (no holding horses while cleaning stalls for example).
4. All horses must pass the veterinary check prior to fair.
5. No stallions are allowed at the Fair.
6. Horses exhibited in yearling, and two-year-old halter cannot be entered in riding classes. Three-year-old horses will be allowed in riding classes.
7. Mares entered in Mare & Foal class are eligible for performance and/or western games provided the foal is weaned 30 days prior to the Thurston County Fair. No lactating mares in any 4-H riding event.
8. A 4-H member may show a different horse in each of the following: Equitation, Halter, Western Games, Dressage, Driving, Small Equine, and Trail-in Hand. NOTE: Huntseat and dressage seat may be exhibited with either equitation or dressage horse.
9. A horse may be exhibited by more than one 4-H member providing they are not in the same age division Each 4-H member must turn in a Horse Certificate.
10. 4-H members entering Classes with more than one horse must enter in Performance Showmanship (Class 1, Lot A) with each animal. 4-H members entering Western Games must also complete the Western Games Showmanship (Class 1, Lot B).
11. Horses stabled in the barns must remain on Fairgrounds at all times as agreed upon according to the Fair schedule. All stalls will remain full. Due to age and safety conditions there may be exceptions. All exceptions must be approved by the Thurston County 4-H Horse Committee Executive Board.
12. Horses will be fed only in the stalls. Water is required to be available to horses at all times.
13. All requests for replacement horses due to injury or illness will be reviewed by the Thurston County 4-H Horse Committee Executive Board in keeping with the Thurston County 4-H policies and the 4-H Equine Program Rulebook (<https://extension.wsu.edu/4h/projects/animal-science/companion-performance/horse/>).
14. No person, other than the contestant may ride or handle a contestant's horse during the Fair unless permission is obtained from a member of the Thurston County 4-H Horse Committee Executive Board. The exception to this is during herdsmanship duty.
15. See 4-H General Rules for State Fair qualification.
16. A 4-H member may draw premiums ONLY in Fitting and Showing and two other Lots (Western Games, Dressage, Jumping, Harness, Equitation, and/or Trail-in-Hand). Entry cards must indicate premium classes.
17. Exhibitor Walk/Trot: Exhibitors entered in Walk/ Trot or Walk/Jog classes cannot cross enter in performance canter classes. They may game if they choose. Classes are for 1st year or walk/jog riders only and are ineligible for state teams.
18. In addition to these rules, all contestants must comply with the General and 4-H Department Rules.
19. Stall decorations and tack rooms must be in place by 9:00 p.m., Tuesday before the Fair.
20. Tack sheds cannot exceed 10'x10' or of equal square feet.
21. Rule acknowledgment & waivers must be turned in prior to receiving exhibitor's number in show office. Refer to

the [Washington 4-H Equine Program Rule Book](#) for all contest rules. Horses must be in the 4-H exhibitor's care and management 90 days prior to the Fair. By May 1st, exhibitors must submit a C0233 4-H Horse Certificate form for each animal they plan to exhibit to be eligible for Fair.

22. EQUESTRIAN HELMETS – All Washington 4-H youths participating in all equine projects and activities must wear American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear when riding or driving. The headgear must have a chin strap and be properly fitted. Additionally, all equestrians (including adults) are strongly encouraged to wear protective headgear at all times when riding or working around horses.
23. Member may exhibit a project animal in the Trail-in-Hand class that is not shown in any other riding classes that requires exhibitors to canter or lope.
24. Exhibitors may enter two Dressage classes.
