





Our turnover rate is at 16%, the highest it's been in decades.







## Investing in the Wake County Sheriff's Office



Add 4 nurses to oversee detainees with mental health needs



Replace safety equipment for deputies and detention center officers



Upgrade the 911 system in the Wake County Communications Center

### Investing in pre-trial services

#### **Public Safety Assessment**

- Uses 9 evidence-based questions to gauge if the person will re-offend and return to court
- May reduce the number of people in jail, saving money and resources

- Town of Wendell


#### A tax is levied to pay for:



# Investing in Social Services

- Will improve family outcomes and reduce the number of children who enter the Child Welfare System

# Need to provide increased medical care

#### Propose adding:

- 2 school nurses to serve the
   4 new schools opening this fall
- 1 nurse supervisor to create our own training programs for our nursing staff



- More positions for septic system inspections and on-site wastewater permitting to meet demand
- A new post-construction stormwater team to ensure control measures are properly maintained



# Increasing tip fees to fund solid waste operations

#### **South Wake Landfill**

- Increase \$5 to \$37/ton
- First increase in 14 years

#### **East Wake Transfer Station**

- Increase \$8 to \$49/ton
- First increase in 9 years



# Investing in temporary election workers

- Increasing pay for agency administrative staff from \$15/hour to \$18/hour
- Will help attract skilled staff in this tight labor market



# Parks & Libraries









## Investing in our parks and preserves

- Moving forward with construction of Beech Bluff County Park
- Developing plans for 3 new nature preserves
- Will protect 7,500 acres



# Expanding access to our libraries

- Adding 10 hours/week to the schedule
- Will restore the hours cut in FY 2021 due to the pandemic



# Investing in library renovations

- Devoting \$20.5 million over the next 7 years to updating and maintaining library facilities
- These include:
  - Library Administration Building
  - West Regional Library
  - Holly Springs Community Library
  - Oberlin Regional Library



# Facilities, Fleet & Digital Infrastructure

## The cost of maintaining our infrastructure is rising



# 5+ million

square feet of buildings in our portfolio county-wide

- Must keep them safe, secure and well maintained
- More expensive due to inflation, supply chain issues and the war in Ukraine

#### Filling the budgetary gaps caused by increased costs



Propose adding

\$1.6 million for escalating fuel costs



Recommend restoring funding cuts made in FY 2021 to equipment and facility maintenance

#### Propose:


- Shifting **0.21 cents** of the property tax back to debt and capital
- Moved it to the operating budget in FY 2021 as a short-term strategy to meet needs



# Committed to making Wake County the Employer of Choice

We must increase pay to recruit and retain top talent

#### Propose:

- 3.1% cost-of-living increase
- Performance pay
  - At least an additional 2% pay increase for successful contributors
  - Up to a 4-to-6% pay increase for outstanding contributors

# Wake EMS: A pay increase success story

#### In March 2022

- Shifted pay ranges for EMTs and paramedics
- Boosted salaries for most EMS employees



# Education

## Pre-school gives children an academic advantage



#### Investing in Wake County Smart Start

#### Propose:

- Adding \$2.6 million to support Pre-K for incomeeligible 4-year-olds
- \$840,000 funding increase
- Smart Start will use their additional funds to pay their Pre-K teachers more



#### Investing in Wake ThreeSchool

#### Propose:

- Providing \$2 million to Smart Start
- Will use the funding to serve 100 income-eligible 3-year-olds at multiple pilot sites



About 160,000 students in the Wake County Public School System



## **Investing in WCPSS**

#### Propose:


- Providing \$582.5 million to the school district
- \$38 million increase from FY 2022
- This amount is well above what Wake County is statutorily required to fund



# \$1,705,950,000

- Includes a 1.5-cent property tax increase in the General Fund, bringing the property tax rate to 61.5 cents
- First proposed property tax increase in 3 years

#### Fiscal Year 2023 Recommended Budget



The property tax increase will generate an additional \$29.2 million for the General Fund



About \$50 more per year for an average assessed home value of \$337,000
