Percentages of participants who reported an increase in healthy behavior or maintained highest frequency are reflected below:



program was coordinated

between San Juan County Health and Community Services, Senior Services, Orcas Island Food Bank, San Juan Islands Food Hub, and Orcas Island and San Juan Island Libraries. Thanks to One Canoe, Soroptimists of Friday Harbor, and donors through the SJI Food Hub, FMNP clients received 3 to 4 bags of fresh produce this last season. Libraries provided free books and summer reading materials for WIC families and food banks helped pack and distribute bags.
