
#### Event 201

The Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security in partnership with the World Economic Forum and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation hosted Event 201, a high-level pandemic exercise on October 18, 2019, in New York, NY. The exercise illustrated areas where public/private partnerships will be necessary during the response to a severe pandemic in order to diminish large-scale economic and societal consequences.

Bill Gates Plan to Vaccinate the World
In January 2010 Bill and Melinda Gates announced a \$10 billion commitment to launch a 'Decade of Vaccines' which would save 'eight million lives', in line with one of its core funding areas, that of 'vaccine development and surveillance

This led to the development of the following:

- •A global vaccine action plan administered by the Gate's Funded World Health Organization
- •The foundation of <u>Gavi the vaccine alliance</u> with the aim of establishing 'healthy markets for vaccines'



In September 2015, countries adopted a set of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure prosperity for all.

Immunisation is one of the best buys in global health and has a crucial role in achieving 14 of the 17 SDGs. As one of the most far-reaching health interventions, it closely reflects the ethos of the SDGs: "leaving no one behind".



#### HEALTHY CHILDREN & FAMILIES = INCREASED PROSPERITY

Immunisation provides a platform for delivering nutrition interventions and work hand in hand with good nutrition to help reduce child mortality. Vaccine-preventable diseases could tip children into a malnourished state as they impair the absorption of essential nutrients. Malnourished children are more likely to die from infectious diseases such as diarrhoea, measles and pneumonia, many of which can be prevented by vaccines.

Immunisation is one of the most cost-effective ways to save lives and promote good health and well-being. Every year, vaccines save 2-3 million lives, and millions more are protected from disease and disability. It routinely reaches more households than any other health service and brings communities into regular contact with the health system. This provides an effective platform to deliver other primary health care services and upon which to build universal health coverage.



#### VACCINES = IMPROVED LEARNING

Immunisation increases educational attainment since vaccinated children learn more while they are able to go to school and perform better, positively impacting on cognitive development as well as long-term productivity.

Moreover, schools are a platform for health promotion, delivery of vaccines and other health services. The benefits flow both ways: children of educated parents have a greater chance of being immunised and well-nourished and thus enjoy better health.



#### IMMUNISATION = EMPOWERED WOMEN AND GIRLS


Immunisation is a gender-equal intervention. Globally, girls and boys are immunised at similar rates. However, there are varia- tions at sub-national levels and in some countries because a range of different barriers inhibit women's ability to access healthcare for their children. Gavi supports countries to make focused efforts to identify and address gender-related barriers to immunisation services, such as through training female health workers, as empowering women is critical to improving child vaccination coverage.



#### WASH + VACCINES = LESS DISEASE

Vaccines, along with clean water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), are proven interventions to prevent diarrhoeal diseases, a leading cause of child mortality in developing countries. Investments in oral cholera and rotavirus vaccines, WASH and health systems form an integrated approach to help eliminate diarrhoeal disease.

Dr. Antony Fauci, "respected" epidemiologist, immunologist, and member of <u>Gates's Leadership Council</u>, issued many directives based on available data, only to modify them later, with the media adding to the hysteria. <u>Dr. Stephen M. Smith</u>, a widely respected infectious disease specialist, called hydroxychloroquine (HCQ) a "game changer," a safe, effective treatment for COVID-19. The FDA had ruled it safe for the last half-century. In April, a poll of <u>62,000</u> <u>physicians</u> in 30 countries found HCQ to be the best drug available to treat this virus – used in conjunction with azithromycin, zinc and Vitamin D. But Fauci endorsed remdesivir, which was shown to be a failed antiviral drug that had significantly <u>higher mortality rates</u> (5%), but also a significantly higher profit margin.

- •To date, the majority of vaccine doses (56%) have been purchased by high-income countries, who only represent 16% of the global population, locking in much of the market. In addition, while many high-income countries have started to vaccinate their populations, as of February 8, fewer than 100 doses have been administered in low income countries.
- •COVAX, an international partnership led by the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, and the World Health Organization (WHO), was created to respond to this challenge. Its goal is to distribute 2 billion doses of a safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine to themost vulnerable by the end of 2021.
- •While virtually all countries are participating in COVAX, until recently, the U.S. was one of only a handful to sit out formal participation, when the Trump administration decided not to join, although Congress did provide \$4 billion in emergency COVID-19 relief to Gavi in support of COVID-19 vaccine access, which Gavi says it will use to support the AMC. Gilead Deal With Generic Pharmaceutical Companies To Produce Remdesivir Could Hinder Access For Some Countries; Gavi Advance Market Commitment Aims To Improve Access To Coronavirus Vaccines

"Amid global conversations to ensure equitable access to future drugs and vaccines for COVID-19, Gilead Sciences, Inc. made its own side room deal. Over the past month, the U.S.-based company made an agreement with generic pharmaceutical companies in Egypt, India, and Pakistan to allow them to produce its drug remdesivir, an injectable antiviral medication, and currently the most promising drug for the treatment of the coronavirus. The deal allows these generic manufacturers to distribute the drug in 127 countries. ... The deal allows Gilead to transfer knowledge to chosen companies in the three countries so that they can begin producing the drug, but it excludes over 70 countries, who will then be dependent on Gilead's prices and supply or will have to work to overcome the company's patent. #### WHO recommends against the use of remdesivir in **COVID-19** patients

#### WHO recommends against Gilead's Veklury, in break with US guidelines

•Published Nov. 20, 2020

•The World Health Organization on Thursday recommended against the use of Gilead's Veklury in hospitalized COVID-19 patients, saying there is no evidence the drug prevents death and calling data showing it improves outcomes "weak." The WHO cited the SOLIDARITY study, which, in contrast to a major U.S. government-sponsored trial, found no clear difference in patients' recovery time.

·Veklury, also known as remdesivir, has been approved or otherwise authorized for use in roughly 50 countries. Its uptake has exceeded Wall Street analysts' expectations, with Gilead reporting \$873 million in sales in the third quarter.

•The WHO's advice could add uncertainty for nurses and doctors treating COVID-19 patients, as repurposed drugs like dexamethasone and newer antivirals like Eli Lilly's bamlanivimab have data of varying quality supporting their use. 




Understanding the role of the Muslim Brother in North America:







(iv)encourages or induces an <u>alien</u> to come to, enter, or reside in the <u>United States</u>, knowing or in reckless disregard of the fact that such coming to, entry, or <u>residence</u> is or will be in violation of law; or

An unaccompanied child is defined by U.S. law as someone who enters the United States: **Under the age of 18 years old**, Without lawful status, and. Without an accompanying parent or legal guardian.

Internal <u>CBP policy</u> dictates that all migrants, especially unaccompanied minors, should be transferred out of the agency's custody within 72 hours of apprehending them.

Once in the custody of the refugee office, migrant children have access to lawyers and, in some cases, child advocates. The agency is bound by law and a landmark federal court settlement to continuously pursue the release of these minors to sponsors who are willing to care for them.



#### WHO ARE UNACCOMPANIED CHILDREN?

In 2017, 69% of unaccompanied children who entered the U.S. were 15-17 years old, with an additional 13% of children aged 13-14 years, and 17% aged 0-12 years. 68% of unaccompanied children were male, and 32% were female.

#### WHAT COUNTRIES ARE THEY LEAVING

95% of unaccompanied children entering the United States in 2017 came from three Central American countries known as the Northern Triangle – Honduras (23%), Guatemala (45%), and El Salvador (27%). The remaining unaccompanied children arrived from Mexico (<3%) and all other countries (3%).

#### Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota Selected As A State Community Hub

While Community Resource Hubs through Lutheran Social Service will be physically located in Brainerd, Duluth, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Willmar – services will be virtual until offices open to serve Minnesotans in person. Hubs will focus on kinship caregivers, refugees, families at risk of homelessness and others who need support.

Minnesota received a three-year, \$26.7 million grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to help remove barriers and more effectively connect families to life-changing early childhood programs.

Through Lutheran Social Service, three lines of service that provide youth and family support, help with housing stability and support to refugees will combine efforts to partner with families through this initiative. Services will be culturally-sensitive as families determine the support they need to ensure their children thrive.

Pay extra attention to the vaccination record. The vaccination record shows all of the immunizations the child received while in shelter care to help protect them against diseases like measles, hepatitis, and varicella. When you enroll the child in school, the school will request to see this vaccination record as part of the enrollment

Your child may need to continue a series of vaccinations to keep them safe from certain diseases after they come home. You will need to help the child access medical care to receive those vaccines in your community.


#### How does UN Agenda 21 get implemented in America?

Inference #1) Considering the potential 10 year Incremental Revenue gain of over half a million dollars, it seems Mayor Kleis has a serious conflict of interest in regards to his tacit approval of refugee resettlement.

Inference #2) Considering there are now possibly close to 3,000 students from the refugee demographic in ISD 742, this represents potential revenue nearing \$1,500,000 for Mayor Kleis. This too may be incremental revenue as the historical students who have transferred out of the district possibly still reside in the city and will require drivers training.

## Immigrant Households Receive 41% More Welfare than American Households

A new report by the Center for Immigration Studies revealed that immigrant households receive 41 percent more annually in federal welfare benefits than native-born households. (Breitbart, May 9, 2016) The average household headed by an immigrant (both legal and illegal) in 2012 consumed \$6,234 in federal welfare benefits, while the average native-born household consumed only \$4,431 in benefits, said the report. (Id.) The report, which was based on U.S. Census Bureau data, follows up on an earlier study that looked at the rate of welfare use and found that 51 percent of immigrant-headed households used at least one welfare program. (See Welfare Use by Immigrant and Native Households, September 2015)

Broken down by category of benefits, households headed by immigrants consume on average 33 percent more cash benefits through Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI), 57 percent more food assistance through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and several other programs, and 44 percent more Medicaid dollars. (Breitbart, May 9, 2016) Both groups, however, use housing assistance in the form of rent subsidies and public housing at similar levels. (Id.)


#### II. General Overview

#### A. ORR New Eligible Populations by Immigration Status

In FY 2014, ORR New Eligible Populations totaled 138, 842 persons, including:

- 69,985 refugees admitted under Section 207 of the Immigration and Nationality Act.
- 31,952 Cuban and Haitian (C/H) Entrants under section 501 of the Refugee Education Assistance Act of 1980.
- 24,324 Asylees admitted under Section 208 of the Immigration and Nationality Act.
- 12,581 Afghan and Iraqi Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) Holders admitted under Section 525 of Title V of Division G of Public Law 110161.

During the past five years, ORR New Eligible populations totaled 564,048 (see table below), of whom those who arrived since 2011 (480,393) will remain eligible to access ORR funded social adjustment services (including employment, English Language training and case management) in FY 2016.

#### B. Funding

In FY 2014, ORR funded 21 programs in 49 states. Funding data included in this document covers 17 of the 21 programs availed to grantees ranging from state government organizations, to volags and several other non-profit organizations. 
#### C. Employment outcomes

ORR collects data on employment outcomes from two different sources: the Annual Outcome Goal Plan (AOGP) and the Matching Grant (MG) program. Employment outcomes for clients served through the MG program are not reported through AOGP employment outcomes and vice versa.

#### 1. AOGP

ORR collects refugee employment outcomes data to fulfill the requirements of the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) established in FY 1993, as reauthorized in 2010 under Government Performance and Results Act-Modernization Act (GPRA-MA).





#### 2. The Matching Grant Program


The MG is an alternative program to the public cash assistance with a fast track (180 days) approach to self-sufficiency. Enrollment must occur within 31 days of ORR eligibility.

#### a. FY 14 Program Highlights

- Approximately 21% of refugees were enrolled in the MG Program during FY14.
- Refugees constituted 72% of MG client caseload, totaling 21,234 individuals or 30% of all refugee new arrivals.
- · 4012 CH were enrolled in MG in FY 2014
- Asylees made up 5% of the MG caseload in FY14 with 1,532 asylees enrolled in FY14.
- Average case (family) size has remained consistent with FY 13 at 2.3 individuals.
- 76 percent of MG participants were self-sufficient at 180 days from their Program eligibility, an increase of 7 percentage points over FY 13.





#### E. Refugee Assistance (RCA & TANF)

As U.S.-citizens-in-waiting, refugees qualify for mainstream federal public benefit programs, including Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. As a state- and county-administered program, TANF is subject to state- and county-specific policies. By becoming familiar with the state or county-specific policies that apply in a given community, refugee placement and resettlement stakeholders can more effectively partner with TANF programs and assist refugees in accessing TANF support.

- Diversion programs are used by some states to assist TANF-eligible participants with immediate needs rather than providing them with ongoing monthly cash assistance. Typically, diversion comes to the participant in the form of cash payments for specific non-recurrent needs and families that receive diversion payments agree not to receive regular TANF payments for a specified period of time.
- Sanction policies are monetary penalties that TANF programs use when participants do not
  comply with program rules. Most often sanctions are an iterative reduction in benefits when a
  participant fails to comply with work requirements. Sanctions differ from state to state and
  vary in the amount which the benefit is reduced; whether just the non-compliant individual or
  their entire family is affected; how long the sanction will be in effect; when the non-compliant
  person can again receive full benefits; and additional sanctions for repeated non-compliance.
- Time limits are policies that determine when an individual can no longer receive some or all
  TANF benefits. Federal TANF dollars can be used to provide assistance for no more than 60
  months. Some states provide TANF for fewer than 60 months, and some continue to provide
  assistance with only state dollars after 60 months. There are also differences between states as
  to whether time limits apply to only to adults within the recipient household or the entire
  household unit.
- Asset limits specify if and how assets should be taken into account when determining whether
  an individual qualifies to receive TANF benefits. Asset limits differ from state to state and
  vary in what is counted as an asset (most states with asset limits look only at some set of liquid
  assets such as savings and cash): the maximum limit to the asset; and exceptions to the limits
  (including family size, and if a person is elderly).

3. Refugee Medical Screening (RMS)

Upon arrival in the US, refugees are recommended to complete a domestic medical screening to identify health conditions that could adversely impact a refugee's ability to successfully resettle Domestic medical screenings are usually refugees' first experience with the U.S. health care system, and are, therefore, an opportunity to link refugees to primary care providers for ongoing health care needs.

In 2012, ORR issued the Revised Medical Screening Guidelines for Newly Arriving Refugees to create a minimum standard of care across States and to establish a framework for reasonable medical screening reimbursement costs. ORR continues to work closely with the CDC/DGMQ to revise the medical screening guidelines as necessary and provide technical assistance to State refugee programs.

A total of 6,726 Syrian refugees have arrived in the United States since the beginning of fiscal year 2016, which began last October 1. However, of this number, 6,625 (98.4 percent) were Sunni Muslims, and a mere 23 (0.3 percent) were Christians. The figures for Christians included 15 whose denomination was not specified, five Catholics, two unspecified Orthodox, and one Greek Orthodox adherent. Another 49 refugees

were described in government data simply as Muslim, with 17 specifically being identified as Shi'a Muslims,

and 10 were listed as being Yazidis (an ethnically Kurdish religious sect).

The United States pledged last year to resettle 85,000 refugees from all over the world during fiscal year 2016, which runs from October 1 through September 30. That number will include at least 10,000 Syrian refugees. However, the *Wall Street Journal* reported on July 13 that by March 31, which was halfway through the fiscal year, only 1,285 Syrians had arrived. After that, the pace rapidly increased. By June 30, the number of Syrians had jumped to 5,211, and the total number of refugee admissions had reached 49,791. CNS News, which reported this story on July 25, citing State Department Refugee Processing Center data, stated that as of that date, 1,515 Syrian refugees had been admitted since the beginning of July, and a total of 6,726 since FY 2016 began.

Similar figures were reported in a July 1 article posted by *Breitbart News*, which noted that of more than 2,300 refugees admitted by the United States in June, 99 percent were Sunni Muslim and just eight were identified as Christian. The report observed that the breakdown of refugees from Syria has drawn criticism because the percentage of Sunni Muslims among them is far greater than that of the Syrian population as a whole, which is about 75 percent Sunni.

That report quoted from a July 1 article by Robert Spencer, director of Jihad Watch, who stated: "This is social engineering, not humanitarian relief. Syria was 10 percent Christian before the war. The Christians have been targeted and persecuted by several jihad groups. The refugees, then, should be at least 10 percent Christian and probably more than that."

We made similar points in our article last November, "Plight of Christian Refugees Ignored During Refugee Crisis Discussions," noting:
Some conservative political leaders in the United States have pointed out that only three percent of the refugees coming to the United States from Syria are Christian, although Syria is 10 percent Christian. This figure is suspiciously indicative of discriminatory policies on the part of the current administration because Christians in the Middle East have been the victims of widespread terrorism and violence and are especially deserving of refugee status.

In that article, we observed how the plight of Christians in Syria mirrored what happened in neighboring Iraq. Christians had freedom of religion and freedom from persecution under Saddam Hussein. However, since the 2013 U.S.-led invasion that deposed the Iraqi strongman, that was no longer the case, and the country became inhospitable for Christians, with more than half of them fleeing to neighboring countries. The exodus has continued in recent years as thousands of Christian refugees fled from ISIS terrorists in northern Iraq in 2014 and went into exile in the autonomous Kurdistan region. As we noted in our article:

Since the fall of Saddam Hussein in Iraq and the rise of ISIS in both Iraq and Syria, Christians in those lands have been driven from their homes, threatened with death unless they convert to Islam, have had their homes, businesses,

and churches burned down, and have even been killed, sometimes by being beheaded. Few of these terrorized Christians have been afforded the opportunity to seek refuge in the United States.

Former Florida Governor Jeb Bush, who was a presidential candidate at the time, proposed on a CNN program last November 15 that U.S. assistance to Middle Eastern refugees should focus primarily on Christians fleeing the violence: "We should focus our efforts as it relates to refugees on the Christians that are being slaughtered."

Such suggestions prompted a strong, adverse reaction from President Obama, however. When speaking at the G20 summit in Antalya, Turkey, the next day, Obama condemned those who want a "religious test" for admitting refugees from Syria, labeling the idea as un-American. "When I hear political leaders suggesting that there would be a religious test for which a person who is fleeing from a war-torn country is admitted, when some of those folks themselves come from families who benefited from protection when they were fleeing political persecution, that's shameful, that's not American," Obama said. "That's not who we are. We don't have religious tests (for) our compassion."

In response to Obama's statement, Representative Dana Rohrabacher (R-Calif.) replied: "To my political colleagues and all who wag their tongues in the public discourse: The religious test has already been imposed. It was imposed by radical Islamists—not, to be sure, by the entire Islamic world—but impose it these extreme religious misfits unmistakably did."

Recognizing the unique plight of Christians and Yazidis in the Middle East, Rohrabacher continued:


I have introduced legislation that would require the State Department to designate Christians and Yazidis as targets for genocide, a step creating priority refugee status for them. Doing so imposes no religious test. It saves identifiable victims from religious persecution.

The Obama administration has other priorities, however. It has committed to admitting 10,000 Syrian refugees by the end of September and is certain to reach its goal. And if Christians are disproportionately excluded, that seems to be of little concern to this administration.





FAIR's research found that of the \$1.8 billion annual cost of resettling refugees in the U.S., about \$867 million was spent on welfare.

The findings include:

- The cost per refugee to American taxpayers just under \$79,600 every year in the first five years after a refugee is resettled in the U.S.;
- In 2016, the State Department spent nearly \$545 million to process and resettle refugees, including \$140,389,177 on transportation costs;
- Of the \$1.8 billion in resettlement costs, \$867 billion was spent on welfare alone;
- In their first five years, approximately 54 percent of all refugees will hold jobs that pay less than \$11 an hour;
- \$71 million will be spent to educate refugees and asylum-seekers, a majority of which will be paid by state and local governments.
- Over five years, an estimated 15.7 percent of all refugees will need housing assistance, which is roughly \$7,600 per household in 2014 dollars.



#### The High Cost of Resettling Middle Eastern Refugees

By Karen Zeigler, Steven A. Camarota November 2015



For what it costs to resettle one Middle Eastern refugee in the United States for five years, about 12 refugees can be helped in the Middle East for five years, or 61 refugees can be helped for one year.

UNHCR reports a gap of \$2.5 billion in funding that it needs to care for approximately <u>four million Syrians</u> in neighboring countries.

The five-year cost of resettling about <u>39,000 Syrian</u> refugees in the United States is enough to erase the current UNHCR funding gap.

The refugees (and the illegal aliens flooding the southern border from Central America) are "resettled" by taxpayer funded "Voluntary Agencies" or VOLAGS

There are nine of them, six nominally religious, but all are in it for the money and top staff make high six figures. Together the VOLAGs are paid close to \$1 billion in taxpayer dollars to resettle refugees.

The volags that "resettle" refugees also maintain significant lobbying offices and advocacy programs, where public policy and politics are the coins of the realm. Because money is fungible, the more dollars these groups collect from the government the more private monies can go toward other purposes like political advocacy and lobbying. These groups certainly have a First Amendment right to petition the government, but they have no right to force taxpayers who may disagree with those agencies' agenda to pay for their advocacy.

This insensitive practice by volags and their associated agencies imposes a significant burden on unsuspecting host communities. As the Senate report said: "These newcomers place demands, sometimes significant, on local schools, police, hospitals, and social services. Local governments are often burdened with the weight of addressing the unique assistance refugees require, yet they rarely have an official role in influencing how many refugees are resettled by local voluntary agencies and often are not even informed in advance that new residents will be arriving."


As the resettlement groups persist in their revenue-producing refugee activities, their purported love of neighbor gets palmed off on others to see through and deal with for the long term. As the Senate Foreign Relations Committee report concluded: "While offering safe haven to persecuted populations throughout the world remains a humanitarian imperative, the administration should avoid biting off more than local communities are capable of chewing. Especially in a difficult economic climate, force-feeding refugees into a broken system is proving to be detrimental to the longer-term interests of refugees and to the cities that receive them."

A good deal of attention has been paid to the importance of sharing the medical information of refugees with resettlement agencies so that they can better prepare for their arrival and anticipate specific needs. One area that has not received as much attention is mental health. The emotional and psychological trauma that many refugees experience can have a long lasting impact on their well-being and the ability to integrate. A recent study noted that as many as 75 percent of traqi refugees brought to the United States suffered from some form of mental illness. In many cases, illnesses have gone untreated. In other cases, treatment has been delayed. In addition, some community health professionals report that medical records can be illegible or inadequate for diagnostic






CAIR promotes a radical Islamic vision, as evidenced by the fact that its co-founder Omar Ahmad told a Fremont, California audience in July 1998: "Islam isn't in America to be equal to any other faith, but to become dominant. ## Refugee Resettlement Program Overview

- Refugee Act of 1980 written by Teddy Kennedy & Joe Biden fundamentally changed refugee program
- UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) refers refugees
- Overseas Refugee Processing Centers send referrals State Department selects
- U.S. resettlement contractors, called "voluntary agencies" (VOLAGs) decide weekly where to place refugees

In other words, the Muslim ambassador openly proclaimed that the Qu'ran teaches that Muslims have a *duty* to wage war against those who have not accepted the authority of Islam (by paying the tribute), enslave the infidels, and if they were killed in the process they would go to heaven. July 22, 2015 (Washington Times) – U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services on Tuesday said it will no longer require incoming U.S. citizens to pledge that they will "bear arms on behalf of the United States" or "perform noncombatant service" in the Armed Forces as part of the naturalization process.

A 1992 survey in Jordan found that 32% were married to a first cousin; a further 17.3% were married to more distant relatives.[20] 67% of marriages in Saudi Arabia are between close relatives as are 54% of all marriages in Kuwait, whereas 18% of all Lebanese were between blood relatives.[21][22]

It is estimated that 55% of marriages between Pakistani Muslim immigrants in the United Kingdom are between first cousins, [23] where preferential patrilateral parallel cousin marriage (where a boy marries the daughter of his father's brother) is often favored.



















### What can we conclude?

Back in June, 14 Democratic U.S. senators called for America to accept 65,000 Syrian refugees. They quickly earned the nickname "Jihad Caucus." The UNHCR had called on Western nations to take 130,000 Syrians, and since the U.S. resettles half of all refugees recommended by the U.N. (yes we do -- more than all other resettlement countries combined), our magic number should be 65,000.

But it wasn't even the senators who actually fronted that number. It originated with the Refugee Council USA, the lobbying arm of the out-of-control, serially corrupt U.S. refugee resettlement industry. And yes it is an industry. There are nine so-called "voluntary agencies" (VOLAGs) that contract with the federal government to resettle refugees. While they are classified as tax-exempt non-profits, this is a massive profit center -- earning them close to \$1 billion in 2014. That comes out to almost \$8,000 per-head. And since the current annual refugee cap is 70,000, double the refugees, double the income -- it's simple math.







President Theodore Roosevelt expressed his ideas on immigrants and what it means to be an American in a speech in 1907.

"In the first place, we should insist that if the immigrant who comes here in good faith becomes an American and assimilates himself to us, he shall be treated on an exact equality with everyone else for it is an outrage to discriminate against any such man because of creed, or birthplace, or origin. But this is predicated upon the person becoming in every facet an American and nothing but an American ... There can be no divided allegiance here. Any man who says he is an American, but something else also, isn't an American at all. We have room for but one flag, the American flag ... We have room for but one language here, and that is the English language ... and we have room for but one sole loyalty and that is a loyalty to the American people."

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Supremacy law

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

#### Naturalization Oath of Allegiance to the United States of America Oath

"I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty, of whom or which I have heretofore been a subject or citizen; that I will support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform noncombatant service in the Armed Forces of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by the law; and that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; so help me God."

Otherwise known as the McCarran-Walter Act, the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 was meant to exclude certain immigrants from immigrating to America, post World War II and in the early Cold War. The McCarran-Walter Act moved away from excluding immigrants based simply upon country of origin. Instead it focused upon denving immigrants who were unlawful, immoral, diseased in any way, politically radical etc. and accepting those who were willing and able to assimilate into the US economic, social, and political **structures**, which restructured how immigration law was handled. Furthermore, the most notable exclusions were anyone even remotely associated with communism which in the early days of the Cold War was seen as a serious threat to US democracy. The main objective of this was to block any spread of communism from outside post WWII countries, as well as deny any enemies of the US during WWII such as Japan and favor "good Asian" countries such as China. The McCarran-Walter Act was a strong reinforcement in immigration selection, which was labeled the best way to preserve national security and national interests. President Truman originally vetoed the law, deeming it discriminatory; however there was enough support in Congress for the law to pass http://library.uwb.edu/static/USimmigration/19






## CAIR NAMED TERRORIST ORGANIZATION BY UAE

#### **WOTCTax Credit Amounts**

#### How are the tax credits calculated?

Employers generally can earn a tax credit equal to 25% or 40% of a new employee's first-year wages, up to the maximum for the target group to which the employee belongs.

- •For all target groups except the long-term TANF recipient, employers will earn 25%, if the employee works at least 120 hours, and 40%, if the employee works at least 400 hours.

#### What are the maximum tax credit amounts?








## Newly Arrived Immigrants & Refugees



Newly arrived refugees may have received little or no medical care for several years prior to resettlement. Refugees' overseas situations vary, with most having minimal, if any, access to health care facilities. While all refugees are required to have a health exam overseas before entering the United States, this exam is very basic, meeting federal requirements. The exam remains valid for up to six months prior to departure. Thus, it is possible for health concerns to develop or worsen in the interim.






#### Once in the United States

The Department of State has cooperative agreements with nine domestic resettlement agencies to resettle refugees. While some of the agencies have religious affiliations, they are not allowed to proselytize. The standard cooperative agreement between the Department of State and each of the domestic resettlement agencies specifies the services that the agency must provide to each refugee. All together, the nine domestic resettlement agencies place refugees in about 190 communities throughout the United States. Each agency headquarters maintains contact with its local affiliated agencies to monitor the resources (e.g., interpreters who speak various languages, the size and special features of available housing, the availability of schools with special services, medical care, English classes, employment services, etc.) that each affiliate's community can offer.





However, the United States Constitution's Tenth Amendment bars the Federal Government from writing laws that dictate local policy. To by pass this roadblock, NGOs encourage Congress to include special grants to help states and communities to fund the new policy, should they want to "voluntarily" comply.










# Minnesota Ecosystems RecoveryProject

On Monday, Northfield Public Library staff signed residents up for Northfield municipal IDs. It's the first ever city ID program in the state. After months of development from local advocacy group, Neighbors United, the idea was brought to the City Council and Human Rights Commission in August. The council made the program official with a unanimous vote in December

Applicants also need proof of residency, a document with the applicant's name and a residential address within city limits. This can include utility bills, pay stubs, bank statements and more. The documents must be dated within the last 30 days.

The cards are \$15 for adults and \$10 for ages 16 and under. The city can offer financial aid.

# 1. Purpose of comprehensive planning

A comprehensive plan is an expression of the community's vision for the future and a strategic map to reach that vision. Comprehensive planning is not mandatory in cities outside the seven-county metropolitan area. However, comprehensive planning is an important tool for cities to guide future development of land to ensure a safe, pleasant, and economical environment for residential, commercial, industrial, and public activities. In addition, planning can help:

• Preserve important natural resources, agricultural, and other open lands. • Create the opportunity for residents to participate in guiding a community's future. • Identify issues, stay ahead of trends, and accommodate change. • Ensure that growth makes the community better, not just bigger. • Foster sustainable economic development. • Provide an opportunity to consider future implications of today's decisions. • Protect property rights and values. • Enable other public and private agencies to plan their activities in harmony with the municipality's plans. For many cities creating a comprehensive plan is the first step in adopting zoning and subdivision regulations for the city.

case management services that last for 90 days after arrival in the U.S. Moreover, refugees are free to move among states (like any U.S. resident), and they are not required to notify state officials when they move. Minnesota's refugee resettlement coordinator told us that the only reliable source of information on the state's number of refugees is for primary— not secondary—refugees.

While the data on secondary refugees are incomplete, they suggest that significant numbers of refugees have moved to Minnesota from other states. The most recent data formally published by the federal Office of Refugee Resettlement (in a 2015 report) indicated that 3,387 secondary refugees migrated into Minnesota from another state within two years of arriving in the U.S.; this was much greater than the state with the next highest reported in-migration (Florida, with 1,367).22 Minnesota's state refugee coordinator told us that Minnesota's high reported number of secondary refugees may reflect (1) that many refugees do, in fact, move to Minnesota and (2) more complete reporting by Minnesota compared with other states regarding the number of secondary refugees. She said there is no consistent methodology by which states report to the federal government on their number of secondary refugees. Further, she said most states have reported only those persons using federal refugee programs; in contrast, she said, Minnesota's numbers have also included refugees that used a variety of other federal and state programs offering cash, food, or medical assistance.

During fall 2007, Minnesota's Clean Energy Resource Teams (CERTs) held regional listening sessions around the state to discuss community-based energy opportunities and the state's Next Generation Energy Act of 2007. The idea was raised of creating a sustainable cities program, free to cities, that would challenge, assist and recognize cities that were "green stars." This idea was taken up by the 2008 Legislature, which directed the MPCA, the Division of Resources at the Minnesota Department of Commerce, and CERTs to recommend actions cities could take on a voluntary basis.

Those recommendations are contained in the report <u>Minnesota GreenStep Cities</u>. Representatives from dozens of cities, non-profit organizations, businesses and state government agencies provided the outline for what has been developed as the Minnesota GreenStep Cities program, which began in June 2010.

the GreenStep Cities was vetted not only by the Pawlenty administration working with representatives from area non-profits and business groups, but by the state legislature as well. 



#### In Paris, the Stakes Could not be Higher: Mayors Represent MSR at COP21

IN PARIS, THE STAKES COULD NOT BE HIGHER - OUR FOOD AND WATER
LAY IN THE BALANCE

This week, two dozen Mississippi mayors are meeting in Dubuque to discuss the economic importance of the river. They heard statistics which indicate that revenue generated along the upper river is \$253.2 billion and supports 755,000 jobs. The lower part of the river generates 151.7 billion and supports 585,000 jobs. The main contributors to those numbers — derived from counties directly adjacent to the river — are manufacturing, tourism, and agriculture.

Under the Agreement, participating cities commit to take following three actions:

Strive to meet or beat the Kyoto Protocol targets in their own communities, through actions ranging from anti-sprawl land-use policies to urban forest restoration projects to public information campaians:

Urge their state governments, and the federal government, to enact policies and programs to meet or beat the greenhouse gas emission reduction target suggested for the United States in the Kyoto Protocol — 7% reduction from 1990 levels by 2012; and

Urge the U.S. Congress to pass the bipartisan greenhouse gas reduction

The Paris Agreement came out of the **COP21**, the 21st Conference of Parties of the UNFCCC (**United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change**), held in Paris from November 30th to December 12th, 2015. The agreement was adopted on December 12th, 2015.

The Paris Agreement, like the Kyoto Protocol and the Doha Amendment, falls under the framework of the UNFCCC. Article 7 of the UNFCCC established a Conference of Parties (COP), which acts as the supreme body of the convention, and meets annually unless otherwise decided. It is at these annual meetings, the UN Climate Change Conferences, where negotiations and decisions on behalf of the state parties are made.

A mayoral delegation representing the Mississippi River Cities &; Towns Initiative (MRCTI) is conducting global river talks during COP 21 the United Nations meeting for the Framework Convention on Climate Change being held in Paris.

These mayors, in partnership with the UN Environment Program, the International Network of Basin Organizations, the International Society for River Science, and eco America, are meeting with representatives from food-producing river basins in pursuit of an international agreement to mitigate climate impact to the world's food and freshwater supply. The U.S. delegation will announce the results on December 8.

MRCTI is a mayoral-led effort comprised of 68 river mayors committed to creating a coordinated voice for the Mississippi River, according to the group. The group in Paris is:

#### Civil penalty.

Establishes a civil fine of up to \$10,000 for violations related to discrimination or disseminating data related to a driver's license or identification card for which the person has not demonstrated lawful presence. The Department of Human Rights is authorized to impose the civil penalty after investigation and determination that a violation occurred.

This is different from an individual's ability to file a claim with the Department of Human Rights for administrative assistance or filing a civil action in court under the Human Rights Act.







Illegal Immigration Costs Minnesota Taxpayers More Than




















a <u>prior analysis</u>, we estimated that the average net fiscal cost (taxes paid minus services used) of an immigrant was \$65,292 <u>during their lifetime</u> — <u>excluding</u> their U.S.-born children. This came to \$65.3 billion per million illegal immigrants. The figures were expressed in 2016 dollars. Adjusted to 2018 dollars, it would be \$69,570 per illegal immigrant, or \$69.6 billion per million illegal immigrants.

A second caveat is that the above cost estimates are only for the original illegal immigrant, and exclude descendants. Using the NAS net cost estimates for the descendants adds \$18,112 (2018 dollars) to the net fiscal drain per immigrant. A third caveat is that the estimate for deportation costs does not include the costs of the immigration courts run by the Department of Justice. Dividing the court's budget in 2016 by the number deportations in that year adds \$1,864 to the average cost of a removal or it adds \$820 to the 2012 cost — in 2018 dollars. Finally, the NAS's long-term fiscal estimates by education use the concept of "net present value" (NPV), which is commonly employed by economists. This approach has the effect of reducing the size of the net fiscal drain that unskilled immigrants create because costs or benefits years from now are valued less relative to more immediate costs. If the NPV concept is not used, the actual net lifetime fiscal cost of illegal immigrants is likely \$125,000 to \$135,000 per illegal alien, or nearly twice the cost when the NPV concept is employed.

A new study by the Federation for American Immigration Reform (FAIR) reveals that annually, foreign refugees are being given about \$867 million in welfare benefits that U.S. tarpavers pay for. Every year, taxpayers are billed about \$1.8 billion for the full cost of resettling foreign refugees, and after five years, American taxpayers will have spent about \$8.8 billion on resettling foreign refugees.




#### Club of Rome



For what it costs to resettle one Middle Eastern refugee in the United States for five years, about 12 refugees can be helped in the Middle East for five years, or 61 refugees can be helped for one year.

UNHCR reports a gap of \$2.5 billion in funding that it needs to care for approximately <u>four million Syrians</u> in neighboring countries.

The five-year cost of resettling about <u>39,000 Syrian</u> refugees in the United States is enough to erase the current UNHCR funding gap.





# Report to Congress on Proposed Refugee Admissions for FY 2020

Today, the Department of State, along with the Department of Homeland Security and Department of Health and Human Services, submitted the President's annual Report to Congress on Proposed Refugee Admissions for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020. The official Presidential Determination on Refugee Admissions Numbers for FY 2020 will be issued following consultation with Congress.

The United States anticipates receiving more than 368,000 new refugees and asylum claims in FY 2020. Of them, 18,000 would be refugees we propose to resettle under the new refugee ceiling; we also anticipate processing more than 350,000 individuals in new



- The estimated cost for refugee resettlement totaled \$976 million in FY 2019 and should amount to \$892 million in FY 2020. This means that each of the 30,000 resettled refugees in FY 2019 cost American taxpayers an estimated\$32,533. And each of the 18,000 refugees to be resettled in FY 2020 is expected to cost American taxpayers\$49,555. Admitting fewer refugees can ensure that they receive the appropriate, personalized help necessary to build a successful life in the United States by focusing on better and longer-term care for each one.
- Starting the end of this month, states and localities can opt out of the refugee resettlement program altogether. This is bound to change the current mapping of states receiving resettled refugees.



"A minimum of 100 refugees must be served by an affiliate. However, for affiliates in locations where there are no other open affiliates within the placement radius, a minimum of 50 refugees may be served. The radius for placement by affiliates is restricted to 100 miles within the same state for predestined cases [1] and cases with U.S. ties, and 50 miles within the same state for cases with no U.S. ties. If an applicant proposes to place predestined or cases with U.S. ties outside the 100-mile, in-state radius, provide a rationale and a list of such sites. Placement of cases allocated with no U.S. ties beyond the 50-mile, in-state restriction is not permitted."


## **Refugee travel expenses:**

The average loan per person is \$1,100, and that amount can quickly increase when considering a full family. Meanwhile the resettlement agencies, including World Relief, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and the International Rescue Committee, all of which collect the travel loan payments but have nothing to do with granting them to begin with, retain up to 25 percent of the total payments.

According to the most recent <u>data from the State Department</u>, in 2017, <u>refugees</u> made over \$66 million in loan repayments. Of that amount, a bit over \$14 million went to the resettlement agencies.

Some advocates think that these agencies should not be taking money from those they are trying to help. The nonprofits involved claim that these fees go toward their administration costs and programming, all of which is focused on giving refugees long-term financial security.

# Newly Arrived Immigrants & Refugees

Newly arrived refugees may have received little or no medical care for several years prior to resettlement. Refugees' overseas situations vary, with most having minimal, if any, access to health care facilities. While all refugees are required to have a health exam overseas before entering the United States, this exam is very basic, meeting federal requirements. The exam remains valid for up to six months prior to departure. Thus, it is possible for health concerns to develop or worsen in the interim.

In Minnesota, the Minnesota Initial Refugee Health Assessment exam fulfills the requirements for the Domestic Refugee Health Assessment described in the "Refugee Health Program" section. This exam differs significantly from the medical examination completed overseas in both its purpose and scope. The overseas examination is intended to identify medical conditions which will exclude a person from coming to the U.S. The domestic refugee health assessment is designed to reduce health-related barriers to successful resettlement, while protecting the health of Minnesota residents and the U.S. population.

The overseas examination is typically valid for up to six months, if there are no Class A or Class B TB conditions, so there is potential for a lengthy lag period between medical clearance and arrival in Minnesota. The possibility exists for an individual to develop medical conditions, such as active tuberculosis, after the overseas exam, which may remain undetected until the Minnesota Initial Refugee Health Assessment is administered.





# Q: Why did the US decide to conduct DNA testing of some nationality groups applying for resettlement in the US?

A: PRM and DHS/USCIS jointly decided to test a sample of refugee cases due to reported fraud in the P-3 program, particularly in Kenya.

This pilot program later expanded to test applicants in other parts of Africa. (See questions and answers below.)

#### Q: What rate of fraud did you discover?


A: The rate of fraud varied among nationalities and from country to country, and is difficult to establish definitively as many individuals refused to agree to DNA testing.

We were, however, only able to confirm all claimed biological relationships in fewer than 20% of cases (family units). In the remaining cases, at least one negative result (fraudulent relationship) was identified, or the individuals refused to be tested.

#### Q: Which refugees are being tested? From which countries?

A: We initially tested a sample of some 500 refugees (primarily Somali and Ethiopian) in Nairobi, Kenya under consideration for U.S. resettlement through the P-3 program. After that sample suggested high rates of fraud, we expanded testing to Ethiopia, Uganda, Ghana, Guinea, Gambia and Cote d'Ivoire. Most of the approximately 3,000 refugees tested are from Somalia, Ethiopia, and Liberia, as these nationalities make up the vast majority of P-3



Summary

The Committee on Legal Affairs and Human Rights considers that the 1990 Cairo Declaration on Human Rights in Islam, whilst not legally binding, has symbolic value and political significance in terms of human rights policy under Islam. However, it fails to reconcile Islam with universal human rights, especially insofar as it considers Sharia law as its sole source of reference and does not recognise certain rights. The committee considers that where human rights are concerned there is no room for religious or cultural exceptions. Member States and partners for democracy should bolster religious pluralism, tolerance and equal rights of all. The committee also stresses that the European Convention on Human Rights is an international instrument binding on all States Parties.

In 2020, the top five recipient **countries** for **remittances** inflows in current USD were India (83 billion), China (60 billion), Mexico (43 billion), the Philippines (35 billion), and Egypt (30 billion) (ibid.). India has been the largest recipient of **remittances** since 2008

In the fourth quarter of 2020, the average costs of sending USD 200 to LMICs remained high at 6.58 per cent, well above the target of 3 per cent of the Sustainable Development Goal 10.c.1

Remittance flows in 2020 to low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) were projected to fall by 7.2 per cent to USD 508 billion because of the economic crisis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic which negatively affected wages and employment for migrant workers. Instead, remittance flows fell by only 1.6 per cent to USD 540 billion, defying projected declines that would have been the sharpest in recent history (World Bank, 2021). According to the World Bank, the decline in recorded remittance flows in 2020 was smaller than the one during the 2009 global financial crisis (4.8%) (ibid.). Remittances flows also surpassed the sum of Foreign Direct Investments (USD 259 billion) and overseas development assistance (USD 179 billion) in 2020 (ibid.).

# Refugee Resettlement

Resettlement to a safe third country is considered for only a small fraction of refugees: those whose conditions are so perilous or whose needs cannot be met in the country where they first sought protection. Only a small number of states take part in resettlement programs—among them are the United States, Australia, Canada, the Nordic countries, and increasingly some countries in Europe and Latin America.







- \* Ethiopian Community Development Council receives 93 percent of its \$17,448,992 budget from taxpayers. Their president, Tsehave Teferra, received \$171,683 in salary and \$104,730 in additional compensation.
- \* Episcopal Migration Ministries is 99.5 percent funded by taxpayers. They did not disclose how much they pay their executives and lobbyists.
- \* Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS) has 57 percent of its \$40,565,891 [in 2015] budget funded by taxpayers. HIAS CEO Mark Hetfield was paid \$358,718.
- \* International Rescue Committee is 66.5 percent funded by taxpayers. In 2015 they received \$688,920,920. Executive Director David Miliband's annual salary was \$591,846.

- \* World Relief Corporation (National Association of Evangelicals) is 72 percent funded by taxpayers. Financial officer Barry Howard, was paid over \$250,000, more than their president and CEO.

# Biden administration spending \$60 million per week to shelter unaccompanied minors

The Biden administration appears to be spending at least \$60 million per week to care for the more than 16,000 migrant teenagers and children in shelters operated by the Department of Health and Human Services, The \$60 million per week HHS spending estimate does not include the costs of the tent sites. The largest, in Donna, costs about \$16 million per month Last month, the Administration for Children and Families received \$47.5 billion in funding through the \$1.9 trillion coronavirus relief bill approved by Congress. The HHS secretary has authority to reprogram discretionary spending for the unaccompanied minors program.

The facilities are overseen by HHS but generally operated through contracts with nonprofit groups and faith-based.





A commitment is made In 1992, the United States and nearly 180 other nations met at the "Earth Summit" in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and agreed that sustainable development should be the goal and operating principle for governments, businesses and individuals around the world. At this meeting, heads of state from more than 150 nations, including the United States, committed to an ambitious plan called Agenda 21, which asks each country to develop a national strategy for sustainable development. In the United States, that commitment led to the establishment of the President's Council on Sustainable Development, a group of corporate executive officers, Cabinet members and other civic leaders who have produced a blueprint for action. Sustainable development may best be achieved through collaboration among role, in part, from enforcer to catalyst, Governor Arne H. Three Pequot Lakes teachers - Sheri Levasseur, Karen Rubado and Deanne Trottier - attended week-long training conferences last summer and returned home to share their experiences and newfound knowledge.

"It's a 'train the trainer' kind of thing," Rubado said. "People attend a really intense week-long training, and then the expectation is for them to go back to their home school district and lead a cohort of a similar type of training. The idea is to promote inclusivity in our classrooms and broaden our perspective on diversity through exploring our own biases and stories with each other."

Levasseur spent time training in Seattle, while Trottier and Rubado went to San Anselmo, California. The three described sessions as very intense, sometimes lasting more than 12 hours, and it made them look inward and discover how they came to have the beliefs they have.

"Iwent there expecting a sort of 'tool box' to fill - different ideas and practices to come back and use with teaching - and when I got there, I realized that that is not what SEED is about," Levasseur said. "It is really about self-exploration and your current belief system and how those were instilled within you. This is really more 'heart work.' You have to figure this out within yourself before you go out and practice it."

During their training, the three were encouraged to look for "windows" and "doors" in their interactions - what they see in the stories of others, and how it reflects back onto themselves and their beliefs.



- 4. Will identify a short list of best practices for initial implementation by September 24, 2012; and

Will claim credit for having implemented and will work toward implementing at least eight required and optional GreenStep best practices that will result in energy use reduction, economic savings and reduction in the community's greenhouse gas footprint. #### MINNESOTA TAKES ACTION

Community leaders advocated to the Minnesota State Legislature for concrete and culturally-tailored solutions to reduce education and employment disparities. In response, Governor Mark Dayton recommended \$100 million to address these disparities. During the 2016 Legislative session, the Legislature and Governor Mark Dayton approved the Equity Article, a one-year, \$35 million supplemental package of strategic investments to fund programs. The 2017 Legislature continued most of this funding for State Fiscal Year 2018, awarding an additional \$24.3 million to equity-related programs for a total of \$59.3 million.<sup>3</sup> Known as the **Equity Grants**, these programs focused on people of color, women, youth and people with disabilities. These grants provided funding for education, training and support services needed to overcome employment barriers, and to build the capacity of organizations to better serve participants. The grants also provided small business development services aimed at increasing business access to capital, job creation and technical assistance.

Organizations received grants either through a direct appropriation or through a competitive grant program.<sup>4</sup> Eligible organizations for competitive grant funds included local government units, tribal governments, nonprofit organizations, community action agencies, business organizations, business associations and labor organizations.

This report provides these organizations' program activities and outcomes for grants executed and participants served in State Fiscal Years 2017 (July 1, 2016-June 30, 2017) and 2018 (July 1, 2017-June 30, 2018). 

Thoughts on building 'One Minnesota'

Gov. Walz's mantra was our theme at the Blandin Foundation in the 1990s. Here are some lessons we learned, plus a few suggestions.

If success has a thousand fathers, and failure is an orphan, we'll have to wait a while to see the results of the Walz governing mantra, One Minnesota.

It's an encouraging opener. At the Blandin Foundation, we used this very theme in all our work during the 1990s. We're pleased the governor has continued it.

But declaring such a goal is easy ... putting it to work is hard. Here are a few "lessons learned" along the way, starting when Gov. Arne Carlson was in office.

There's a third example, and maybe the most important: community leadership across the state. At Blandin we recognized that money wasn't going to do much unless it was backed up by people who could organize their communities to achieve common goals. So we began a leadership-training program that has touched hundreds of communities and thousands of people who care about those communities — and about One Minnesota.




#### City Government

An essential factor shaping the Strategic Plan is the EDA's fit within the overall structure of the City. The economic development functions of the City connect two parts of the organization (see chart on right).

#### **CAPTURING PHILANTHROPIC WEALTH IN RURAL COMMUNITIES**

August 23, 2018

Several months ago, I was pleased to see my hometown of Kiester join forces with five nearby towns to create a new community foundation called Our Town USA. At Southern Minnesota Initiative Foundation (SMIF), we support communities in capturing and retaining philanthropic wealth through community foundations like this. This has become increasingly important as \$7 billion is expected to transfer between generations by the year 2030 in SMIF's 20 counties.

In southern Minnesota, 30% of our 176 communities are home to a community foundation. More than half of these are administered by SMIF. SMIF currently assists in managing 28 small town community funds. These local foundations provide direct support for projects and programming important to their community, ranging from early childhood, tourism amenities and marketing, community events and much more.

Choosing to is an enormous benefit on all fronts: The landowner will receive a tax deduction and bypass capital gains while still being able to maintain a stable revenue source. The tenant can continue to rent and farm the land. The county maintains its tax base. The foundation retains ownership and acts as a steward of this resource to ensure the community benefits long-term from the income generated. Most importantly, the farmer leaves a legacy for their community.

Through this program, retiring farmers can give some or all of their land directly to one of the many community foundations that exist under SMIF's umbrella, allowing farmers to support their individual communities.

Our community foundations and other affiliate funds are doing amazing work and have to date invested \$4.6 million through grantmaking to their communities. They are keeping our rural communities vibrant, providing funding for today and into the future

#### BEST PRACTICE AREA IN SUSTAINABILITY EDUCATION

#### Vision

Sustainability education generates a shared understanding of sustainability, vision, action planning and engagement among all citizens. The Joint Planning District builds on its existing stewardship ethic to engage the entire community in sustainability efforts.

#### Background

According to the United Nations Agenda 21 approved by the U.S. and all the other 177 countries attending the U.N. Conference on Environment and Development:

"Education is critical for promoting sustainable development and improving the capacity of the people to address environment and development issues...Both formal and non-formal education are indispensable to changing people's attitudes so that they have the capacity to assess and address their sustainable development concerns. It is also critical for achieving environmental and ethical awareness, values and attitudes, skills and behavior consistent with sustainable development and for effective public participation in decision-making. To be effective, environment and development education should deal with the dynamics of both the physical/biological and socio-conomic environment and human (which may include speritual) development, should be integrated in all disciplines, and should employ formal and non-formal methods and effective means of communication."

To underscore the need for sustainability education, the United Nations General Assembly declared 2005-2014 as the UN Decade of Education for Sustainable Development.

The Third Minnesota Report Card on Environmental Literacy documents the results of the third statewide survey concerning environmental literacy of adults in Minnesota conducted in 2007. It found that only about 40% of Minnesota adults believe that they are knowledgeable about environmental issues and problems. Almost 38% of the state's adults have a below-average level of knowledge about the environment. While 44% of people thought they were knowledgeable about energy issues, only 13% actually earned an A or B (five out of five correct or four out of five correct respectively) on energy knowledge. And fully one-third (33%) earned a failing grade (0-1 questions correct), and 3% only answered two questions correctly. The vast majority of Minnesotans (93%) wanted schools to provide environmental education.







In response to the release of the 2000 Census data, as well as his own community's decade of demographic change, Willmar Mayor Les Heitke, the 2001-02 president of the League of Minnesota Cities, initiated the Building Inclusive Communities effort. Mayor Heitke's goal was to provide all Minnesota cities with the information they need to begin building communities that are welcoming and inclusive of all people—no matter how long they have been Minnesotans, no matter the color of their skin, no matter if they have yet become fluent in English.

#### MINUTES OLMSTED COUNTY HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION THURSDAY, JANUARY 19, 2017

Presentation by Dr. Ellen Kennedy, Hamline University, on the Convention of the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women.

CEDAW requires nations to provide "substantive equity," "non-discrimination" and "state obligation." Very few nations have not ratified CEDAW, including the US, Sudan, Somalia and Iran. For the US to pass, it needs to be reviewed by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and be passed by the Senate

Commissioner Dooley requested a motion to support and promote CEDAW. Commissioner Julius made a motion that the Commission "get behind, educate and promote" CEDAW in the community. Commissioner Mustafa seconded. Commissioner Skolnick questioned what the motion was asking the Commission to promote to the City of Rochester and Olmsted County to "sign on" as supporters. Commissioner Skolnick stated he would like time to read the materials provided, and would "probably support" the measure, but wanted to review CEDAW and related documents. All in favor, Commissioner Skolnick opposed, and requested that Commissioners do due diligence and read materials. Many State parties to the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) assert that they cannot fully implement the Convention because it is in conflict with Shari'ah, or family laws and practices based on the Qur'an. 







Every year, American taxpayers pay nearly \$870 million welfare for foreign refugees who are resettled across the United States by the State Department.



- •The European Court of Human Rights which has jurisdiction over 47 European countries, and whose rulings are legally binding on all 28 member states of the European Union — has effectively legitimized an Islamic blasphemy code in the interests of "preserving religious peace" in Europe.


- 1. Jihad, or "to war against all non-Muslims to establish the religion" and is the duty of every Muslim and Muslim head of state (the Caliph). Violation of the First Amendment
- 2. A Muslim who leaves Islam (apostasy) must be killed. Violation of the Eighth Amendment.
- 3. Honor killing for offenses against Islam are permitted. Violation of the First/eight Amendment.
- 4. A Muslim will not get the death penalty if he kills a non-Muslim. Violation of the Fifth Amendment. Due process
- 5. Sharia law does not abolish slavery. In reality it furthers it. Violation of the First Amendment.
- 6. Non-Muslims are not equal to Muslims and must comply with Sharia poll tax requirements if they are to remain protected in Islamic societies. Specifically, they are forbidden to marry Muslim women, publicly display wine or pork, even reciting their own religious scriptures, or openly celebrating their religious holidays and funerals. Violation of the First Amendment.
- 7. Non-Muslims are forbidden from building new churches or building them higher than mosques. A non-Muslim can be killed if he proselytizes a Muslim away from Islam. Violation of the First Amendment. Freedom of religion
- 8. It is a crime to say anything derogatory about Allah and his Prophet, or expose the contradictory points of Islam. Violation of the First Amendment
- 9. Defiance on the part of the wife invalidates the husband's responsibility to support her. It is also gives him permission to beat her, and keep her from leaving the home. Violation of the Eighth Amendment. Cruel and unusual punishment
- 10. Divorce is only in the hands of the husband and be initiated by simply saying: "I divorce you." Violation of the Seventh Amendmen.t Trial by jury
- 11. The testimony of a woman in court is half the value of a man. Violation of the Seventh Amendment. Trial by jury, confrontation of witnesses
- 12. A woman looses custody of children if she remarries. Violation of the Seventh Amendment.
- 14. To prove rape, a woman must have four male witnesses. Violation of the Sixth Amendment.

4. Refugees and migrants are entitled to the same universal human rights and fundamental freedoms, which must be respected, protected and fulfilled at all times. However, migrants and refugees are distinct groups governed by separate legal frameworks. Only refugees are entitled to the specific international protection as defined by international refugee law. 

# UNDERSTANDING AND CONFRONTING MUSLIM STUDENT

- Recognize that Islamophobia is one of the most widespread, rapidly-growing, and tolerated types of oppression in school and society today.
- Craft anti-oppression policies that protect the rights of Muslim students.
   Identify discourses and practices of Christian privilege and White privilege.

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton on Wednesday ended the "Istanbul Process," a three-day, closeddoor international conference hosted by the State Department on measures to combat religious "intolerance, negative stereotyping and stigmatization."

The conference was intended to "implement" last March's UN Human Rights Council Resolution 16/18, on the same subject. Notwithstanding Clinton's final speech defending freedoms of religion and speech, the gathering was folly.

Resolution 16/18 was adopted in the place of one that endorsed the dangerous idea that "defamation of religion" should be punished criminally worldwide. That call for a universal blasphemy law had been pushed relentlessly for 12 years by the Saudi-based Organization of Islamic Cooperation, an essentially religious body chartered to "combat defamation of Islam." It issues fatwas and other

directives to punish public expression of apostasy from Islam and "Islamophobia."
Leading OIC states behind this campaign — Saudi Arabia, Iran, Egypt and Pakistan — imprison and/or sentence to death "blasphemers."

Resolution 16/18 deplores religious intolerance but doesn't limit speech — the result of a deft State Department maneuver. The administration should have let matters rest there.


Instead, while co-chairing an OIC "High Level Meeting" addressing Islamophobia last July in Istanbul, Clinton invited the OIC to Washington to discuss how to "implement" resolution 16/18.

While the Washington conference ended inconclusively, it should not have been held because:


\* It offered a transnational venue for the OIC to reintroduce its anti-defamation push, just as the issue had been laid to rest at the United Nations. The administration erred in viewing resolution 16/18 as a meeting of minds between the OIC and America on freedoms of religion and speech.



UNHRC Res, 16/18 is modeled on extremist Pakistani Blasphemy Laws used to prosecute imperiled minority Christians for alleged desecration of the Qur'anic canon and Sharia Law. Hanafi – views <u>blasphemy</u> as synonymous with apostasy, and therefore, accepts the repentance of apostates. Those who refuse to repent, their punishment is death if the <u>blasphemer is a Muslim man, and if the blasphemer is a woman</u>, she must be <u>imprisoned</u> with coercion (beating) till she repents and returns to Islam.[21] If a non-Muslim commits blasphemy, his punishment must be a tazir (discretionary, can be death, arrest, caning, etc.).[22][23]

Maliki – view blasphemy as an offense distinct from, and more severe than apostasy. Death is mandatory in cases of blasphemy for Muslim men, and repentance is not accepted. For women, death is not the punishment suggested, but she is arrested and punished till she repents and returns to Islam or dies in custody. [24] [25] A non-Muslim who commits blasphemy against Islam must be punished; however, the blasphemer can escape punishment by converting and becoming a devout Muslim. [26] Hanbali – view blasphemy as an offense distinct from, and more severe than apostasy. Death is mandatory in cases of blasphemy, for both Muslim men and women, and repentance is not accepted. [27] [28]

Shafi'i – recognizes blasphemy as a separate offense from apostasy, but accepts the repentance of blasphemers. If the blasphemer does not repent, the punishment is death.[12][29]

Ja'fari (Shia) – <u>views blasphemy against Islam, the Prophet, or any of the Imams, to be</u> punishable with death, if the blasphemer is a Muslim.[30] <u>In case the blasphemer is a</u>

On April 4, 2017, the US Senate passed Senate Resolution 118, "Condemning hate crime and any other form of racism, religious or ethnic bias, discrimination, incitement to violence, or animus targeting a minority in the United States." The resolution was drafted by a Muslim organization, EmgageUSA (formerly EmergeUSA) and the Muslim Public Affairs Council (MPAC).

Muslims across America were in full celebration mode commemorating the "hard work" of Senator Rubio, where EmgageUSA put out the following public statement:

"Thanks to the hard work of Senator Marco Rubio, Senator Dianne Feinstein, Senator Susan Collins and Senator Kamala Harris we have achieved the approval of Senate Resolution 118, an anti-hate crimes bill drafted by Emerge-USA. It is days like this that Americans are reminded of this country's founding principles: equal opportunity, freedom, justice. We are proud to help support the protection of these rights #amoreperfectunion #theamericandream."

### hostility or ill feeling

Condemns hate crime and any other form of racism, religious or ethnic bias, discrimination, incitement to violence, or animus targeting a minority in the United States. Affirms that the United States stands united in condemning hate and evil in all forms. Rejects hate-motivated crime as an attack on the fabric of society and the ideals of pluralism and respect.

Calls on federal law enforcement officials, working with state and local officials, to: (1) expeditiously investigate all credible reports of hate crimes and incidents and threats against minorities in the United States, and (2) bring the perpetrators to justice.

Encourages: (1) the Department of Justice (DOJ) and other federal agencies to work to improve the reporting of hate crimes and to emphasize the importance of the agencies' collection and reporting of data pursuant to federal law, and (2) the development of an interagency task force to collaborate on the development of effective strategies and efforts to detect and deter hate crime in order to protect minority communities.

Calls on the executive branch to: (1) offer federal assistance that may be available for victims of hate crimes; and (2) enhance security measures and improve preparedness for religious institutions, places of worship, and other institutions that have been targeted because of their affiliation with any particular religious, racial, or ethnic minority in the United States.

Whereas, in the past several years, violent crimes, threats of violence, and other incidents of hate-motivated targeting of religious, racial, and ethnic minorities have increased across the United States;
Whereas, in 2015, hate crimes targeting Muslims in the United States increased by 67 percent, reaching a level of violence

Whereas, in 2015, hate crimes targeting Muslims in the United States increased by 67 percent, reaching a level of violence targeting Muslim Americans that the United States had not experienced since the aftermath of the September 11, 2001, attacks, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation;

Whereas, in 2015, anti-Semitic incidents increased in the United States for the second straight year, according to the Anti-Defamation League's 2015 Audit of Anti-Semitic Incidents, which describes trends such as the tripling of assaults targeting Jews since 2012 and the rise of online harassment and hate speech directed at Jewish journalists and individuals through social media;

Whereas, in 2015, anti-Semitic incidents at institutions of higher education nearly doubled compared to the number of those incidents in 2014, and during the 2016–2017 school year there has been an increase in White supremacist activity on college campuses across the United States, according to the Anti-Defamation League;

Whereas, in 2015, among single-bias hate crime incidents in the United States, 59.2 percent of victims were targeted due to racial, ethnic, or ancestry bias, and among those victims, 52.2 percent were victims of crimes motivated by their offenders' anti-Black or anti-African-American bias, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation;

Whereas, in 2017, there have been more than 100 reported bomb threats against Jewish community centers, Jewish day schools, and other Jewish organizations and institutions in more than 38 States;

Whereas, in 2017, Islamic centers and mosques have been burned in the States of Texas, Washington, and Florida, and Jewish cemeteries have been desecrated in the States of Missouri and Pennsylvania:

Whereas, in 2017, there has been harassment and hate-based violence against individuals who are perceived to be Muslim, including members of South Asian communities in the United States, and Hindu and Sikh Americans have been the target of hate-based violence targeting religious minorities; and

Whereas, on February 28, 2017, President Donald Trump, before a joint session of Congress, acknowledged threats Jewish community centers and the vandalism of Jewish cemeteries, and stated that "we are a country that stands united in condemning hate and evil in all targeting of its very ugly forms": Now, therefore, be it

UN Secretary-General Ban-Ki-moon assured ADL that the UN shares its ambition of international sanctions against nations which do not enforce laws against "intolerance." (ADL is architect of hate crimes laws in nearly all nations of the western industrialized world.)

Christian/conservative authorities and media are loudly warning against the US/Egypt proposal to empower UN condemnation of nations which do not pass federal hate crimes laws.

# NYC threatens \$250K fine for calling someone 'illegal,' threatening to contact ICE

A 29-page directive released by ( NEW YORK ) City Hall's Commission on Human Rights on Thursday outlined "new legal enforcement guidance and actions against discrimination based on immigration status and national origin." Violations of their new "hate" laws are punishable by fines of up to \$250,000 per offense.

"'Alien' — used in many laws to refer to a 'noncitizen' person — is a term that may carry negative connotations and dehumanize immigrants, marking them as 'other,'" the memo says. "The use of certain language, including 'illegal alien' and 'illegals,' with the intent to demean, humiliate, or offend a person or persons constitutes discrimination."

Telling someone to "speak English" or "go back to your country" is also a violation, according to the new guidance.

- 2. Denouncing all acts of hate wherever they occur
- 3. Ensuring public safety while protecting free speech and other basic constitutional rights
- Calling for fully resourced law enforcement and civil rights investigations of domestic terrorism and hate crimes
- 5. Elevating and prioritizing anti-bias and anti-hate programs in our nation's schools
- Supporting targeted communities and bringing together civic and community leaders to build trust
- 7. Celebrating diversity, promoting inclusivity and challenging bias
- Promoting law enforcement training on responding to and reporting hate incidents, hate crimes and domestic terrorism
- Encouraging residents in their communities to report hate incidents and crimes, including using hotlines and online tools
- 10. Maintaining civil rights enforcement and strengthening hate crime laws when necessary

Whereas the first amendment to the Constitution established the United States as a country committed to the principles of tolerance and religious freedom, and the 14th amendment to the Constitution established equal protection of the laws as the heart of justice in the United States;

Whereas adherence to these principles is vital to the progress of the American people the diverse communities and religious groups of the United States;

Whereas whether from the political right, center, or left, bigotry, discrimination, oppression, racism, and imputations of dual loyalty threaten American democracy and have no place in American political discourse;

Whereas white supremacists in the United States have exploited and continue to exploit bigotry and weaponized hate for political gain, targeting traditionally persecuted peoples, including African Americans, Latinos, Native Americans, Asian Americans (ALANA) and Pacific Islanders and other people of color, Jews, Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs, the LGBTQ community, immigrants, and others with verbal attacks, incitement, and violence:

### H.RES 183 Now, therefore, be it Resolved, That the House of Representatives—

- (1) Rejects the perpetuation of anti-Semitic stereotypes in the United States and around the world, including the pernicious myth of dual loyalty and foreign allegiance, especially in the context of support for the Unite States-Israel alliance;
- (2) Condemns anti-Semitic acts and statements as hateful expressions of intolerance that are contradictory to the values that define the people of the United States;
- (3) Reaffirms its support for the mandate of the United States Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Anti-Semitism as part of the broader policy priority of fostering international religious freedom and protecting human rightsall over the world;
- (4) Rejects attempts to justify hatred or violent attacks as an acceptable expression of disapproval or frustration over political events in the Middle East or elsewhere;
- (5) Acknowledges the harm suffered by Muslims and others from the harassment, discrimination, and violence that result from anti-Muslim bigotry;
- (6) Condemns anti-Muslim discrimination and bigotry against all minorities as contrary to the values of the United States;

- (7) Condemns the death threats received by Jewish and Muslim Members of Congress, including in recent weeks;
- (8) Encourages law enforcement and government officials to avoid conduct that raises the specter of unconstitutional profiling against anyone because of their race, religion, nationality, political, or particular social group, including the assignment of blame or targeting members of anentire religious group for increased suspicion, based on the conduct of a single individual or small group of individuals;
- (9) Encourages all public officials to confront the reality of anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, racism, and other forms of bigotry, as well as historical struggles against them, to ensure that the United States will live up to the transcendent principles of tolerance, religious freedom, and equal protection as embodied in the Declaration of Independence and the first and 14<sup>th</sup> amendments to the Constitution.

ISLAMOPHOBIA, A term of abuse invented in the early 1980s by the International Institute of Islamic Thought (IIIT), a subgroup of the Muslim Brotherhood, to characterize as a phobia (ie, an irrational fear or hatred) what is actually a sane, justified and morally correct response to the evil that is Islam.

#### Civil penalty.

Establishes a civil fine of up to \$10,000 for violations related to discrimination or disseminating data related to a driver's license or identification card for which the person has not demonstrated lawful presence. The Department of Human Rights is authorized to impose the civil penalty after investigation and determination that a violation occurred.

This is different from an individual's ability to file a claim with the Department of Human Rights for administrative assistance or filing a civil action in court under the Human Rights Act.

# Once in the United States

The Department of State has cooperative agreements with nine domestic resettlement agencies to resettle refugees. While some of the agencies have religious affiliations, they are not allowed to proselytize. The standard cooperative agreement between the Department of State and each of the domestic resettlement agencies specifies the services that the agency must provide to each refugee. All together, the nine domestic resettlement agencies place refugees in about 190 communities throughout the United States. Each agency headquarters maintains contact with its local affiliated agencies to monitor the resources (e.g., interpreters who speak various languages, the size and special features of available housing, the availability of schools with special services, medical care, English classes, employment services, etc.) that each affiliate's community can offer.





New Study: illegal immigration costs American taxpayers a mind-boggling \$134.9 billion annually, according to a detailed analysis of federal, state and local programs that include education, medical, law enforcement, and welfare. The in-depth probe reveals that state and local taxpayers get stuck with an overwhelming chunk — \$116 billion — of the burden. State and local expenditures for services provided to illegal aliens total \$88.9 billion and federal expenditures \$45.8 billion, the analysis found. For those who claim illegal immigrants contribute by paying taxes, government figures show that only \$19 billion was recouped by Uncle Sam.

While the legislation protects all religions, many OIC member states worked with Clinton on Resolution 16/18 to combat 'Islamophobia.'




