

## **Open Heaven Meetings** **(Summary)**

**\*\*\*\*\* Our theme for the Open Heavens meetings > January 4-11, 2026:**

**This is the question that was given to each of the speakers to address:**

**As the Last Days church living in the Laodicean age > What do you see the church (in America) is needing right now? What is the Lord emphasizing be done in the church now?**

### **1) The week of prayer and fasting leading up to the meetings:**

#### **a. Revelation 3 - Laodicean church attitude:**

**"I'm good / fine just the way I am".**

#### **b. 1 Corinthians 11:17-34 - Attitudes with People within the church, and having taken communion with the attitudes. (Division / Strife)**

**The statement that was told to Pastor Vern on 12/26/25:**

**"There are some people who are not being healed because they have attitudes with people in the church, and outside the church, and they've taken communion that way."**

#### **c. Monday - 12/29/25 Prayer Meeting.**

**- As people were praying and asking God to come and move in the meetings, he kept saying to me: (Pastor Vern)**

**"Why? Why should I?"**

**- 2 Chronicles 7:14 (AMP) > If we "Humble Ourselves"**

**d. Tuesday - 12/30/25 Prayer Meeting.**

- **Have we lost the Attitude of Repentance? Have we picked up the Laodicean attitude as a church that says: We're Good - measuring ourselves only with the physical?**

**#2) Corporate inventory and repentance.**

**#3) What do you need from us to make the way for the Lord?**

**#4) Laodicean attitude - reject it personally / corporately.**

**(That there would be a Hunger in people to please him.)**

**e. Saturday - 1/3/26 Prayer Meeting.**

- **We prayed over the individual chairs.**

**2) Brad - Sunday (1/4)**

**a) Pastor Vern dealt with 1 Corinthians 11:17-34**

**- Attitudes towards people.**

**b) Brad Brede spoke on the necessity of the future church continuing to flow in Spirit-Led Intercession. (Romans 8:26)**

**- If this doesn't happen, it will be lost to the following generations.**

**3) Brian Holley - Monday (1/5)**

**a) The church needs Leaders in the last days. But Leaders need people who will follow, support, and do the work. (Matthew 8 - The Centurion)**

**b) God needs people who will do the work, not lazy christians.**

**c) This house will be a house of worship and intercession**

**d) The last days church needs to be passionate about Jesus.**

**- The Laodicean church has become lukewarm/tepid (lacking in passion, force, or zest)**

**e) Revelation 3:19 - Repent. Return to a passion for God.**

**f) Felecia shared her Night Vision about the demon of deceit.**

**- 1/5/26 we addressed Felecia's Night Vision after Brian spoke.**

**- The Vision showed a Deceiver spirit is among us. (Get it out)**

**Felecia's Vision. (1/4/26)**

In my vision I was standing up front in the church (not on the altar) facing the chairs. The lights were all on but the whole sanctuary was empty.

I looked to the front area of the chairs. There was appeared to be a teenage boy sitting in the very right chair (facing the altar). I walked up towards him, and I sat down a couple chairs away from him. He was staring right at me. I knew immediately that he was an evil spirit.

The form the Lord showed me: he looked like he was in his mid-teens. He was black nationality with black hair, but had pale/white skin. Nothing about his clothing, stood out to me. Just his evil stare and smirk and his age.

He had a smirk on his face. He was staring to intimidate me, and I stared back at him to intimidate him.

That is when I woke up.

Then the Lord told me (Felecia): The plan of the enemy:

“It is to take true religion and make it worthless. It is to twist my words against me, and my chosen ones.

Point it out. Point him out. That liar and deceiver has no place amongst my people, and He must be stopped at all costs.

And you are just the people to do this. Point him out. Call him out on the floor. For he is a deceiver and a liar and he has deceived many of my people.”

“Listen carefully for what I am to tell you now.. do not take this lightly for it is not a light matter

He comes even to deceive my most holy ones that are precious to me. He comes to deceive them and turn them against me to stop the change that is coming. That is on the horizon.

Shut him down now while there is still a chance... before he speaks to any more of my people. Shut him down and call him out.

You know his name - he is called deceiver. For he comes to deceive.

**Felecia asked:**

**What is the deception God?**

“You know it ... for it looks like Faith. But it denies me of my power. Rank... it ranks people and things.

Get rid of it!

I will show you in my word.”

*The Spirit explicitly says that in later times some will fall away from the faith, paying attention to deceitful spirits and doctrines of demons. 1 Timothy 4:1 NASB*

**What the Lord told Pastor Vern about it. (Monday, January 5th)**

One thing you need to do to counteract it and what it's trying to accomplish is to begin to call the people to be hungry for, want, desire, etc. - the things of the Holy Spirit and the Supernatural. We need to call the opposite of what this spirit is trying to do.

The spirit is lying to them about it. It's deceiving them. By faith we need to begin calling people to the truth about it.

Call the people (in the church, visitors, and the people of the community) to be curious about and have a desire for the Supernatural and The Things of the Holy Spirit. To want these things / to want the fullness of the Spirit - to crave them.

By simply accepting the statistics at face value without coming against them, I (Pastor Vern) am playing into the deceptive spirit's hand (accepting the statistics as final), rather than taking a stand against it and by faith calling people out of the deception. Change your posture to stand more in Faith, rather than accepting the statistics as final.

**8) Vito - Saturday (1/10)**

**a) Building altars corporately.**

- Need 2-3 people.
- Doing what he wants when we gather - traps his power / presence.
- Its how we take territory. (Example: Muslims taking an area)

**b) AMOS 9:11-12 - It's how to take territory. (Worship and Prayer)**

**c) The Davidic priesthood was a picture of our day. It's an end time message.**

- David set up 24 Hour Worship and Prayer (Davidic tabernacle)

d) When prophecy and tongues leave the church, you know that the manifest presence of God has left the house - Revelation 19:10.

e) Prophetic singing and playing of string and wind instruments - opens up the heavens.

- Saul prophesying (1 Samuel 10; specifically v. 5-6)

f) Why does Starbucks, Target, etc, offer millions of dollars to demonic causes?

- Because the demonic authority over them demands it.  
(For their demonic altar)

g) Territories are won or lost by the altar. (Good or bad)

## 9) Brad - Sunday (1/11)

a) The Corporate Anointing

b) Numbers 20:2-12

- Leaders must believe what God says to do.

- What God has said must be treated as Holy by the leaders & people.

c) Numbers 20:22-29

- Disobedience cost them.

d) 1 Corinthians 10:1-11

- End times message (v. 11)

- There were things that also kept the people out of the promised land.

- They experienced the supernatural like no other, but they never entered the promised land.

**e) Hebrews 3:7-19**

- Disobedience and unbelief.
- They were hearing the vision / here is God's plan > they failed to believe it and do it.

**f) Hebrews 4:11**

- Let's not do what they did.

**g) The children / next generation went in to the promised land.**

- WHY? WHAT did they do that the older generation did not do?

**h) Joshua 1:10-11, 16-18**

- Joshua is communicating vision and commanding

**l) Every revival that's taken place has had prayer and the corporate anointing.**

**m) We asked Brad to Pray over the leadership and congregation, so we don't mess things up in either group of people.**

**Brad's comments on Saturday Night.**

I watched Part 2 of Saturday evening. Very, very good!!! It moved me greatly to see that kind of worship again. Definitely signs of revival. I played with a worship team many years ago in which we flowed like that. We didn't rap but it was a different era. We reached that place in worship. But as far as the Saturday evening service? Awesome!!!

**Conclusion:**

**Now we have Marching Orders.**

- They are summed up in the Summary of each night.**
- It will require mindset of Unity, Servanthood, and Obedience.**

## **ADDITIONAL MATERIAL:**

**My current research on % of christian's who accept the fullness of the Spirit appears to produce close to the same statistics as when I researched it in the early 2000's. It may be a few % points higher in some applications.**

**When it comes to the moving and fullness of the Spirit, there are no specific statistics concerning it. So my approach was: if you don't accept Speaking in Tongues, you won't accept the fullness of the moving of the Spirit. (The 2 are inseparably linked). So I came at it from that perspective.**

**If you simply research how many people in the US believe in the supernatural: it's around 82%. But that now includes all forms of the Paranormal, Psychics,**

**Ghosts, Astrology, etc. (That doesn't help with the topic). So I asked the question 2 different ways:**

**Here is the first way I asked the question:**

### **What is the percentage of christian's in the US that speak in tongues?**

The **percentage of U.S. Christians** who speak in tongues (or have ever spoken in tongues) is relatively low overall and varies depending on the survey, exact wording (e.g., “ever spoken,” “regularly,” or “as evidence of Spirit baptism”), and the sample (all Christians vs. evangelicals or practicing believers). No major nationwide survey from 2023–2025 provides a single definitive figure for all self-identified Christians, but reliable data from key sources points to the following ranges:
