PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to all. It's been a good summer with a lot of accomplishments. We finally convinced the City to open the back unpaved road to Eddy Street as an emergency exit. The August Bar-B-Q was well attended and nicely staged by the Hospitality committee. Thanks to a large group of volunteers, the drain grates in our streets have been cleared out, the front of the Clubhouse landscaping has been done, and the front doors were painted. As well, a professional firm has been contracted to thoroughly clean the carpet. Six mailbox kiosks have been repaired or replaced and 36 new mailboxes installed.

Best of all, our finances are in good condition and we are within budget; but next year's dues will have to be raised to stay in this condition considering rising costs and inflation. As you may know, we are required by law to maintain a reserve fund of some size, which is in compliance. The date for the annual budget meeting will be posted on the website, plus a mailing soon.

I feel our communication needs are not quite satisfactory as I'd like more feedback from residents. Also needed is the ability to send out messages in a more timely manner. Email is our primary method of communication so I will be setting up a listserv system soon which will allow better two-way conversations. Please give the Office your email to be included. More details in the next few weeks, but know that you will be able to opt out if you desire. You can pick up hard copies of the newsletter in the Clubhouse, and request copies of the CC&Rs, bylaws and handbook from the office manager; but doing so will not keep you updated on new, current, or pressing changes.

The web site **www.townepoint.org** remains a source for upcoming events and meetings. Note that the Board does not use any social media accounts, although there is a Facebook group run by a non-Board member.

The two documents on the TPOA website called "Owner's Handbook" and "Supplemental Handbook ..." are

being rewritten to be clearer about the standards and penalties that govern our community. Owners will have the opportunity to comment on these changes before they are approved by the Board. Much more on this topic will follow, but we intend to move ahead firmly because there are a few problems with home appearances and parking that need to be addressed sooner than later. Many owners have commented that we need to tighten up some standards, and I am confident this will do that.

FACILITIES REPORT

The front door to the Clubhouse was repainted. The Clubhouse windows were washed inside and out and now sparkle! We hired 5 Star Windows – a youth owned window cleaning service, and they did a fabulous job. We removed a hazardous tree next to the Clubhouse. The Clubhouse received brand new pool cues for the pool table, thanks to a member's kind donation.

HOSPITALITY REPORT

We've had good turnouts to all of the social events this year. The next event is the Christmas Holiday Party and Dinner at the Clubhouse on **Saturday, December 13 from 5-7pm.** Santa will be there, and the Wild Rose Chorale will entertain with their beautiful harmonies. TREASURER'S REPORT

In the month of October, the Board is reviewing the expenses anticipated for 2026. A budget proposal has been presented to the Board for review and revision. The budget proposal for 2026 will be presented to members at the November 5, Special Budget meeting.

At the 2024 budget meeting, members were notified that it is likely that there will be dues increases in each of the subsequent annual budgets. We are all experiencing increases in utilities, insurance, and other services, the Association is no exception. Utilities are being raised a minimum 3% to 5% for 2026 as are insurance costs. Other vendor services are also affected as their costs rise, they pass those increases onto their customers.

Your dues pay for grounds maintenance, clubhouse utilities, street light electricity, property and liability insurance, road paving and repair, and other services. In 2025, 37% of dues paid are being transferred to reserves for future road paving and maintenance. Towne Point owns its streets and this is the largest expense

paid out of reserves. Dues will be increased to cover these expenses and hopefully avoid a large one-time assessment which so far, Towne Point has been able to avoid.

In 2026 one of the cul-de-sacs will be paved, and the cost is expected to be approximately \$55K to \$60K, depending on which one is paved. It is expected by the end of 2025 there will be \$150K+/- in reserves. The paving expense will bring the Reserve Fund down to \$97K in March or April of 2026, while planning to add at least \$36,260 to reserves by the end of 2026 if the budget proposal is approved by the membership.

The Board approved budget proposal for 2026 will be presented to members at the 11/05/2025 meeting and the ballot for approval will be mailed to members mid-November and must be returned by the December 3 meeting when ballots are counted. If members approve, the budget will be ratified at that meeting.

Towne Point Residential Emergency Preparedness





October 2025

Towne Point's Emergency Preparedness group put together a JUMBLE SALE in mid-September to raise money for emergency/disaster preparedness projects, supplies and events. Thank you to all that donated to the eclectic mix of items we were able to sell. Proceeds go toward communication devices and Tuck-It Bucket starter kit supplies. It was such a success that we plan to do it again next year!

We are coming to the end of canvassing all of the households in Towne Point, gathering information about what people's needs might be during a shelter-in-place emergency scenario, along with skills and equipment that can be accessed during or after a crisis. If one of our volunteer information gatherers has missed you and you wish to be included, please make your request to **overman1107@gmail.com**.

That email address can also get you a free Tuck-It Bucket, which keep all of your small emergency prep items together in one place. A starter kit costs \$15 and contains an emergency blanket, whistle, latex gloves, matches, hand towel, first aid kit, N95 mask, and a flashlight with batteries. The bucket itself can be used as a toilet, and biodegratable bags are included.

Other items that augment this initial collection are leather gloves, nylon tarp, rope, duct tape, knife, extra batteries, can opener, vial of bleach, toiletries, energy bars, and a bottle of water. All of these will fit into the bucket, which is marked *Emergency Supplies*.

TPREP (Towne Point Resident Emergency Preparedness) is looking into the future and planning some winter programs focusing on Emergency Preparedness. We hope you will join us.

The Jefferson DEM Incident Management Team is a group of both professionals and volunteers who work together to staff the Emergency Operations Center during incidents.

Volunteer IMT members support emergency operations by working in either Operations, Planning, Logistics, or Finance under the Incident Command System model.
